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TRADE SMOKES FOR SANDWICH IN CAMPUS SMOKEOUT

Smokeout on Nov. 19, can trade in tobacco or cigarettes for a free turkey sandwich. To help you quit for a day, you can get buttons to brag about your success, get tips from ex-smokers and medical people who deal with the ravages of smoking. If you're a non-smoker willing to "adopt" for one day a volunteer one-day quitter, both of you are eligible to win a whole turkey. You can test your lung function and see an exhibit of how lungs are supposed to look, and how they look when they are diseased and covered with tar and nicotine. If one day free of your tobacco habit isn't good enough for you, while you're browsing through the helpful aids, you can register to stop smoking for good in the Lung Association's Freedom from Smoking program that begins on campus Nov. 23. The program costs \$25 and comes with the promise that if you quit on time and are smoke-free for a while, you get \$15 back, among the other benefits.

NOVEMBER IS OPEN ENROLLMENT MONTH FOR TWO IMPORTANT BENEFIT PROGRAMS

November is the month for enrolling or changing your status with Personnel in regard to group medical/dental insurance, as well as the tax saver plan. Workshops to inform you of your insurance choices and information booklets about tax saver benefits are available before enrollment periods end. During the month staff and faculty can enroll in one of three plans--Blue Cross/Blue Shield Traditional, Blue Cross/Blue Shield Preferred Care, and Metrohealth, which will soon be part of the national MAXICARE Health Plans Network. During the open period you can change from single to family status or vice-versa, drop or add dependents, drop or add dental or switch from one plan to another. This opportunity is given only once a year.

November 30 is the last day to take advantage of the <u>tax saver plan</u> for the coming year. It exempts various out of pocket medical, dental and dependent care expenses from federal, state and county and social security taxes. LOW COST BREAST CANCER TESTING ON CAMPUS

Kathy Staples, RN, wants women on campus to know that, like it was for Nancy Reagan, early detection and prompt treatment is the best defense against breast cancer which will develop in as many as one in 10 women. For \$50, about half what is charged at other places in the city, the St. Margaret's Diagnostic Breast Center will provide a screening mammography, the first of which is critical in setting a baseline for determining future changes in your breasts; a physician's exam and instruction in BSE, breast self-examination. You can ask your doctor to refer you to St. Margaret's, but you do not need a physician's referral. For an appointment any weekday, 8 a.m.-3:30 p.m., call 630-6266.

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FOR THE PROTECTION OF HUMAN SUBJECTS USED IN EXPERIMENTATION, any research involving humans must be approved by the IUPUI Institutional Review Board. Deadlines for receipt of materials to be reviewed through 1988 are Nov. 20 this year, and in 1988 they are Jan. 4, Feb. 1 and 29, Apr. 4, May 2, June 6, July 5, Aug. 1, Sept. 6, Oct. 3 and 31 and Dec. 5. Since the board meets only on the third Tuesday of each month and the review process requires two weeks, researchers are asked to pay close attention to deadlines.
