DENTISTRY CAPS SECUL AGREEMENT

Plans announced last summer in the Republic of Korea to create an international agreement between the IU School of Dentistry and Yonsei University College of Dentistry in Seoul were completed during a visit to campus by Dr. Young Kyu Ryu, dean of the Korean school. He and School of Dentistry Dean William Gilmore completed the agreement which encourages faculty exchanges and collaborative research between the schools. Dean Gilmore plans to travel to Seoul later this year to further develop professional endeavors. Two of his faculty members, Dr. Kichuel K. Park, associate professor of preventive dentistry, and Dr. David R. Avery, chairman and professor of pediatric dentistry, have already lectured to dental organizations and universities in Korea. Dr. Han Won Paik, associate professor of physics at IUPUI, is president of the Yonsei University Alumni Association-Indianapolis Chapter, which supports ties between the two schools.—J. Grim
