Similarly, when I met a couple of families in Syedpur who have been empowered through our micro-financing projects, I was amazed to see the changes in their lives. The women in these families were not only successful in establishing, profitably maintaining and improving their businesses but some of them have also bought land and are planning to build their first homes. Meeting with the youth and self-empowered women was evidence of our vision becoming a reality. By the grace of God, this is just the beginning; there is a long way to go, and the only way to make it is with your help and support.

# In the Pipeline....

Always looking for ways to increase the living standard of the stateless and unfortunate Biharis, OBAT aims to launch a new project for the literacy of children and women living in the camps of Syedpur. At the end of the proposed three year term of the "Non-formal Education Project", 900 women will have acquired basic math, accounting and banking skills; and 900 children will be able to enter the mainstream education system by acquiring basic elementary school education. The skillbased knowledge will empower the women to own and run their own businesses.



On February 26<sup>th</sup>, 2011, OBAT shared an evening with some of its friends. Anwar and Azher Khan, the president of OBAT and the president of SOL respectively, were keen to share details about their recent trips to Bangladesh. The event was attended by distinguished citizens of Indianapolis who were very generous with their support. Funds were raised through donations by the attendees as well as a silent auction and a raffle drawing. The event highlighted Anwar Khan's recent trip to the Bangladesh camps. He shared his experience with the audience through a moving film and an equally heartrending and inspiring speech about his encounters with the destitution that plagues the people residing in these camps for more than 39 years. Among other things, Azher Khan spoke about meeting the camp children; his talk about his experiences was very touching and made the tragedy very palpable.

# Buzz from Bangladesh

Ever heard of the word, "Jamdani"? It means a vase of flowers. It is also an exquisite woven fabric, a testament to the fine workmanship of Bangladeshi craftsmen. The fabric is hailed for its texture and quality which is supposed to be so fine that it is described as being woven with the "thread of the winds." Jamdani was the apparel of choice of nobility in the past; it still is very expensive due to the delicate, embroidered patterns. Usually worn in the form of a saree, (a six yard garment for women) a red jamdani is an integral component of a Bangladeshi bride's trousseau.
