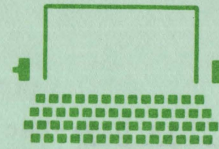

### NATIONAL FIGURE CONTINUES 'RE-VISIONING' SYMPOSIUM

Martin Marty, professor in the Divinity School at the University of Chicago and the foremost chronicler of the nation's religion and culture connections, will be on campus for a free public lecture on Jan. 30 at 8:15 p.m., Lecture Hall 102. He will speak on "20/20 Re-Vision: The Acute Eye on American Religion." The address is part of a continuing symposium on "Re-Visioning America: Religion in American Life," sponsored by the Center for American Studies and the Department of Religious Studies, with support from the Addison Locke Roach Lecture, Lilly Endowment and the Indiana Committee for the Humanities. Prof. Marty is associate editor of the Christian Century Journal and has written more than 30 books, including "Pilgrims in a Promised Land."

### MORE ON HOLIDAY CLOSINGS, OPENINGS, CLARIFICATIONS

### EXECUTIVES OFFERED TAILOR-MADE SEMINAR

For the second year, executives interested in exploring the humanities have a seminar tailor-made for them by the Institute for Humanities Research and the Division of Continuing Studies on campus. "Human Perspectives: A Seminar for Executives" is a non-credit course designed to enhance understanding of values and ethical principles through critical discussion of literary and philosophical writings. ### HAIG TAKES HUDSON STUDY TO PARIS

Results of a recent study by "our" Hudson Institute were discussed in a mid-December conference, "Europe and the World: Is Europessimism Justified?," held in Paris. Chairman of the study, "Europe and the World," Gen. Alexander M. Haig Jr., former secretary of state and Supreme Allied Commander, Europe, stressed that the report runs counter to the prevailing conventional thoughts of Europessimism. The study concludes that "cautious optimism about both the Atlantic Alliance and Europe's economic future is justified." Haig reported, "While many of the European democracies face deep-rooted domestic difficulties, the wells of European vitality, energy and innovation have not run dry." Haig is a Senior Fellow at Hudson.
