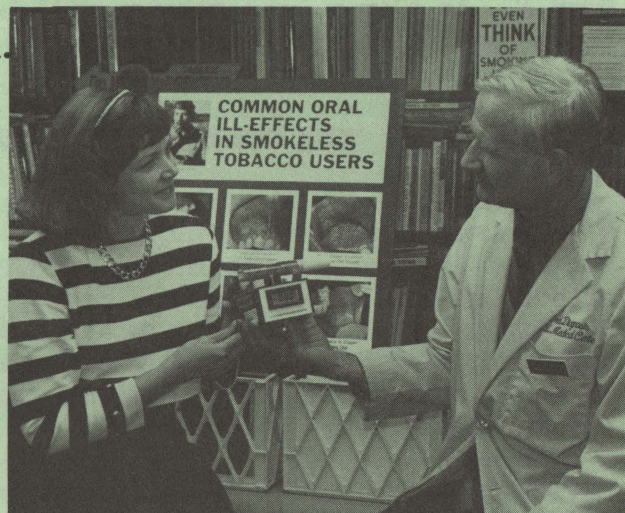
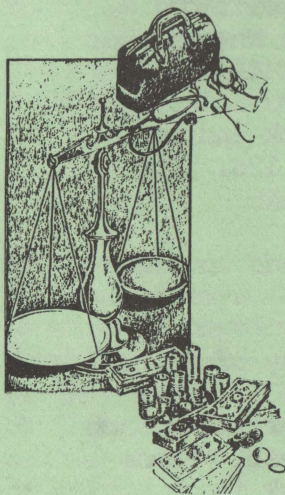


NEW NICOTINE DEPENDENCE PROGRAM READY TO BEGIN

S smokers who hope to kick the habit will have a new alternative available beginning this month. Smoking cessation experts Arden Christen and Chris Guba of the dental school are starting the new I.U. Nicotine Dependence Program (IUNDP), located in the dental school. The IUNDP program will kick off with a Smoking Cessation Update event Oct. 10 at the University Place Conference Center and Hotel, including keynote addresses, work sessions, a dinner and a dance. The IUNDP program will use technology (such as nicotine patches and gum), counseling, education and support groups to help people give up smoking. The three-pronged program will include treatment, research and teaching. The treatment will focus on helping patients directly. The information gathered during treatments will help in future treatment programs and to provide knowledgeable instruction. The teaching aspect will focus on teaching dental and respiratory therapy students how to help their future patients give up the habit.

HEALTH CARE FOCUS OF UPCOMING SYMPOSIUM

Health care, a dominant social and political issue in the U.S. today, will be the focus of a two-day symposium called "Balancing Costs, Care and Compassion: The Dilemmas of Health Care Reform" Oct. 23-24 at the University Place Hotel & Conference Center. Oct. 23 (Friday) events include speeches, discussion sessions and a "town hall" meeting open to the public on "Access to Health Care — Who's Accountable?" 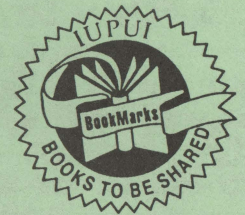
POLITICS IN INDIANAPOLIS ON TAP AT NEXT URBAN AGENDA

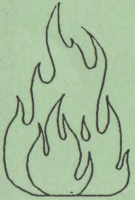

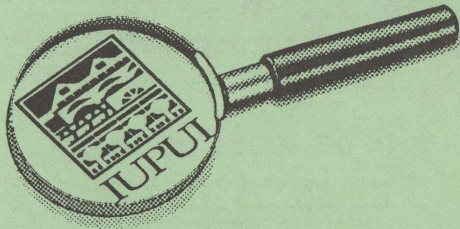

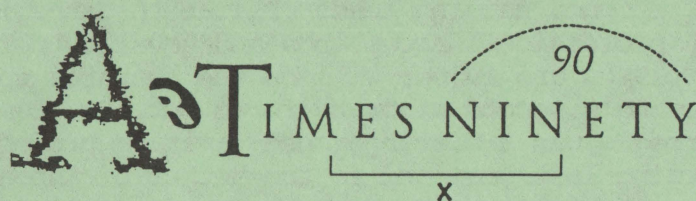

ASSESSMENT WORKSHOPS ATTRACTING NATIONAL ATTENTION



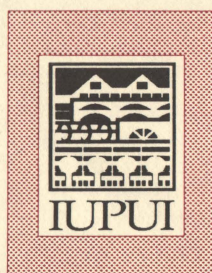
LUNCHEON PROGRAM TO LOOK AT 'GLASS CEILING' INITIATIVE
