## TRAUMA CENTER FOR YOUNG OPENS AT MED CENTER

rauma, physical injury caused by accidents or intentional violence, is the leading cause of death in children 1-14 years old. To better treat children from all over the state who have trauma injury, the IU Medical Center last week opened the state's first trauma center for children. The Pediatric Trauma Center will be directed by Dr. Jay L. Grosfeld, the Lafayette F. Page Professor of Pediatric Surgery, chairman of the IU Dept. of Surgery and director of the section of pediatric surgery. Assisting him will be Dr. Dennis W. Vane, assistant professor of pediatric surgery, and Dr. Thomas A. Broadie, associate professor of surgery at IU and chief of surgery at Wishard Hospital. Our pediatric trauma center is the first in the nation to meet all guidelines established by the American College of Surgeons and other national medical groups. The program will be based primarily in Riley Hospital and in the Dunlop Building, the medical center's emergency facility. Dr. Grosfeld said that the trauma center is one of the new programs that are possible because of the expansion of Riley. Teams of specialists and support services will be able to accommodate children with a variety of injuries, from burns to spinal cord injuries. In addition to high-quality emergency and follow-up care for young patients, the program will help university researchers study the various aspects of severe injuries to children. "We know about the loss of life (more than 200 Hoosier children died from trauma last year), which is disturbing, but we don't know much about those who don't die--what happens to them?" Dr. Grosfeld asks.-TW

#### PROF. JEGEN'S TAX TIPS: TAX BREAKS FOR COLLEGE GIVING

Giving money to a college or university, our own if possible, has its obvious rewards, but in addition, Indiana law allows an income tax credit each year to individuals who make contributions to Hoosier colleges and universities and the gift is deductible for federal income tax purposes. The Indiana credit is equal to 50% of the contribution, but the amount of credit is limited to \$100 for a single taxpayer, or up to \$200 for taxpayers filing jointly. So, a contribution of \$200 by an individual or \$400 by married couples will obtain the maximum credit. The following examples show the approximate net savings that can result from a \$400 gift by married couples filing joint tax returns:

If taxable income is \$15,000, the net cost of a \$400 gift after tax credits is only \$132. If taxable income is \$25,000, the net cost of a \$400 gift after tax credits is only \$108. If taxable income is \$40,000, the net cost of a \$400 gift after tax credits is only \$60.
