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Under construction: Glick Eye Institute

Winter's cold weather has not affected construction on the Eugene and Marilyn Glick Eye Institute. The construction team has been hard at work since ground was broken in late October.

The blue tower now on site is a tower crane that helps the contractor move equipment and materials around the construction site. Workers have excavated the basement and are building the concrete foundations. The steel framework will soon follow.

Located on the north side of Michigan Street, the Glick Eye Institute has been designated to achieve Silver LEED status from the U.S. Green Building Council. LEED - Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design – is a voluntary consensus-based national rating system for buildings designed, constructed and operated for improved environmental and human health performance.

The LEED certification means the building has used state-of-the-art strategies in sustainable site development, water savings, energy efficiency, materials and resources selection and indoor environmental quality. The Eugene and Marilyn Glick Eye Institute will be the first building on the IUPUI campus to achieve LEED certification.

To meet the U.S. Green Building Council's Silver specifications, the project will use recycled and locally extracted building materials, as well as an indoor air monitoring system that will track changes in air quality to help minimize the burden on HVAC systems. Highly efficient mechanical systems include low flow fume hoods in laboratory spaces, and heat recovery wheels that will capture heat from exhaust systems and exchange it for energy to power the building.

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Adolescent Substance Abuse Prevention

Student volunteers participating in the Adolescent Substance Abuse Prevention (ASAP) project completed a required training session during the fall semester and currently are leading classroom sessions at several elementary and middle schools around the Indianapolis area.

According to Smita Mahapatra, MS2, and Stephanie Martin, MS2, the project coordinators for this Office of Medical Service-Learning sponsored project, fourth-through sixth-grade students are targeted with a goal of teaching them to make informed decisions not to use drugs and alcohol.

This two-hour program teaches youth the normal physiology of major organs such as the heart, liver, brain and lungs. Medical students work in small groups, spending 15-20 minutes on each organ. Basic organ physiology is covered, highlighted by preserved organs for the youngsters to observe. A discussion of the pathophysiology of drugs, alcohol, and toxins follows which includes actual samples of diseased organs including a cirrhotic liver and anthracitic lung for the youth to experience.

IUSM students also act out different peer pressure situations that the youth may experience offering advice and suggestions when faced with these tough dilemmas. At the end, a quiz is given to assess what the class has learned which allows an opportunity for questions and an open dialogue among the IUSM students and adolescents.

"This program is different from other drug prevention programs in that it gives students concrete examples of the long-term consequences of smoking, drugs and alcohol. It also is a wonderful and fun way for medical students to learn pathology and to learn how to teach members of the community about their health," said Stephanie Martin.
