## DISTINGUISHED PROFESSORSHIP NOMINATIONS SOLICITED

The most prestigious academic appointment Indiana University can offer an individual is a Distinguished Professorship. Nominations for this title may be made by faculty members, alumni, students and any other worthy and knowledgeable source. The president's office now is receiving nominations for Distinguished Professors to be appointed next year.

The individual nominating a faculty member is responsible for compiling an appropriate dossier. In general, evidence is needed of significant recognition by peers based on scholarly research or creativity or distinguished influence on students. It should be clearly understood that Distinguished Professorships are not intended to be rewards for long and satisfactory service in administration or teaching.

Appointments must be evaluated by the dean of the appropriate school, recommended by the University Distinguished Ranks Committee, then approved by the president and the board of trustees. Distinguished Professorships may or may not be endowed.

Announcement of appointments normally will be made at Founders Day, but the announcements also may coincide with the dedication of a new building, commencement, or other significant events. Nominations, with full supporting evidence, should be submitted to the president's office prior to Dec. 1, 1981.
