THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE of the American Association of Dental Schools appointed Mrs. Suzanne Boundy, Assistant Professor and Director of the Dental Hygiene program here, to serve on the Reference Committee on Council Resolutions during the recent annual session of the AADS in Atlanta.

DR. SAMUEL S PATTERSON, Professor and Chairman of Endodontics, spoke on the topic "Endodontic Surgery" at a continuing education course at the University of Pennsylvania March 22.

DR. RALPH W. PHILLIPS, Assistant Dean for Research and Research Professor of Dental Materials, has been appointed to the Peer Review Committee for the Dental Health Foundation of the American Dental Association. This committee will review research activities of the Foundation, which includes the ADA Research Institute and the Research Fellowship at the National Bureau of Standards. Dr. Phillips has also contributed a chapter to a new book, "Medical Engineering" by Year Book Medical Publishers. During the Chicago Midwinter meeting Dr. Phillips had the distinction of being the first breakfast conference leader to be "sold out."

DR. GEORGE STOOKEY presented a two-day course on Preventive Dentistry stressing fluorides and dental caries control as a consultant to the United States Army at William Beaumont Army Medical Center in El Paso, Texas on January 31-February 1. He also spoke at a meeting of the El Paso Dental Society on January 31.

THE REGIONAL AIDS CENTER of the Agency for International Development is sponsoring a Spanish translation, to be prepared by Dr. Simon Katz, of the Oral Health Research Institute, of the book "Preventive Dentistry in Action," by Dr. Katz, Dr. James McDonald, Jr., and Dr. George Stookey, to be distributed to libraries, universities, technical institutes, key governmental organizations and the dental profession in Latin America.

AS PART OF THEIR FIELD WORK in Dr. Charles Gish's Public Health Practice course, four dental hygienists who are now enrolled in the Bachelor's degree program in Allied Health Sciences appeared on the evening of March 29 at a public hearing on fluoridation in Thorntown. Linda Dock made the main presentation to the Town Board and the Utilities Board, and a vote on whether to fluoridate the community water supply is expected at the next meeting. Other members of the team are Stephanie Erlichman, Marsha Smith Croner, and Laura Stanich. Dr. Gish introduced the students.

Linda noted that a dental survey of Thorntown school pupils which the team conducted showed a decay rate twice as high as the state average, thus pointing to the benefits of fluoridation.

Another group of students is conducting a similar project in the Morgan County Water Corporation district.

In search of fresh perspective for our readers, the NEWSLETTER asked a number of our international students at IUSD for any off-the-cuff comments they cared to make on their impressions of life in this country. Excerpts from their responses follow:

Dr. Sigfus Eliasson (Iceland) --

The U.S. is a good place, better than I thought it would be. This country advertises itself as a bad place in terms of poverty, pollution, racial friction, etc. but it is better than that image,....

People think Iceland is cold (I've even been asked if I live in an igloo) but the coldest weather I've ever experienced was right here. At home the temperature is seldom much below freezing or above 70 degrees, Fahrenheit.

Public transport is poor here -- before I got my car it often used to take me a full day to go grocery shopping.

Dr. Suteera Hovijitra (Thailand) --

The food here is really different from what I was used to, but I think I can take American food as well as Thai food.

I enjoy living over here....the cost of living is very high....sometimes (not very often) I go to a movie or a play or go shopping....I had a chance to talk about my country once in church.

Student-teacher relationships are excellent....I like the school very much: that's why I am here.

Dr. Tario Javed (Pakistan) --

Life in general is busy, costly, but very exciting. Full of new experiences....I think once one is adjusted to the U.S. way of life, he starts enjoying it....

The teachers I have come across up till now have been very helpful and cooperative. I think the IU Dental School is a great institution, offering a lot of opportunity for clinical as well as basic science studies and research. One thing which has extremely impressed me is the audiovisual aids during lecture....

Dr. Declan Thompson (England) --

The climate leaves something to be desired -- the humidity in summer just knocks me out and I am only operating physically and mentally at 1/2 volt.

I don't go bananas over the TV and radio here. The quality of advertising material really precludes any serious watching of TV, even when the product is of such a high standard as an old English movie!....

In general, the people I meet are very friendly and forthcoming and not hiding their stiff British upper lip behind the morning paper on the railway station. To be seen talking is almost a crime there....

I am getting used to the idea that not only policemen have guns and that even attendants at the Museum of Art are armed! (In England they are often World War I veterans half asleep in one corner)....

A misconception I have to straighten out is the idea that there are still big fogs in London....I have seen much bigger fogs here than ever in my life in central London....

Dr. Alias Romero DeLeon (Mexico) --

Since the cost of living is going up very fast, our original budget is not enough now....

We had a wonderful experience in Indianapolis: our little daughter Alicia Arlette was born here. So, we'll take a magnificent souvenir from the States....

Very good Graduate Program in Oral Pathology -- I'll go back to Monterrey, Mexico, very happy to have learned a great deal of Oral Pathology....very nice people in the Department.

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
