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## DR. KNOEBEL CHOSEN FOR CHINA TRIP

Dr. Suzanne B. Knoebel, professor of medicine at the Indiana University School of Medicine and senior research associate at the Krannert Institute of Cardiology, is one of eight heart specialists chosen to enter China on April 22 at the invitation of the People's Republic of China.

The trip follows that of a team of Chinese physicians who came to the United States last October. Plans for the reciprocal visit began at that time.

Arrangements for both visits have been conducted through Dr. E. Grey Dimond, provost for health sciences at the University of Missouri-Kansas City. Dr. Dimond, a graduate of the I.U. School of Medicine who completed his internship and residency in the Indiana University Hospitals, will lead the American team.

Dr. Dimond said the Chinese Medical Association (CMA) had invited him and seven physicians to come to China for 14 days to lecture and exchange information. The Chinese selected the speakers and are arranging the details of the program. The American sponsors of the trip are the American College of Cardiology (ACC) and the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs of the U.S. State Department.

Dr. Knoebel, a native of Fort Wayne, has led the development of extensive new clinical programs in cardiology at the Medical Center, Marion County General Hospital and the Krannert Institute of Cardiology. She is a graduate of Goucher College, where she majored in political science and economics, and of the I.U. School of Medicine.

Among the major programs she developed is one using telephone lines for the transmission of electrocardiograms from outlying areas to the Medical Center and the Krannert Institute. A similar program is being inaugurated to equip General Hospital ambulances.

Besides Dr. Knoebel and Dr. Dimond, other physicians on the team are Dr. Eliot Corday of the University of California-Los Angeles School of Medicine, Dr. Donald Brian Effler of the Cleveland Clinic Foundation, Dr. Arnold M. Katz from the Mount Sinai School of Medicine, Dr. Bernard Lown of the Harvard School of Public Health, Dr. Abraham M. Rudolph from the University of California-San Francisco and Dr. H. J. C. Swan, president of the ACC and professor of medicine at the UCLA School of Medicine.

Exploring New Avenues -- Construction will begin soon on a new street for IUPUI. The project, which includes 151 new parking places, will open a new street running parallel to West Michigan Street from Barnhill Drive to Ball Residence. The street, designed to improve traffic flow on West Michigan and improve access to the Medical Center campus, will eliminate entrances to West Michigan at Ball Residence, Coleman Hospital and immediately east of Long Hospital. Access to West Michigan will remain at Clinical Drive and a new drive will connect the new street with West and Middle drives west of Coleman. The project includes extensive landscaping and is scheduled for completion by mid-fall.

CUE Inventory -- The updating of the faculty inventory conducted by the Consortium for Urban Education (CUE) is nearing completion. Tax Note -- Indiana and Pennsylvania have entered into a reciprocal income tax agreement effective January 1, 1973. Pennsylvania is the sixth state to enter into such an agreement with Indiana. (Others are Illinois, Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin.) Legal residents of these states may not be subject to Indiana's adjusted gross income tax. However, the income made from employment in Indiana is taxable in the state of the employee's residence, if it is not paid in Indiana. Therefore, it is permissible for IUPUI employees, who are legal residents in one of these states, to submit to the Payroll Department an affidavit stating their legal residence. Affidavits may be obtained in that department, Allied Health Building, Room 219.

Paper Cuts -- As a result of pollution requirements by the Environmental Protection Agency, many paper mills have closed, thus putting a strain on others to accommodate the nation's voracious paper appetite.
