The Dean of the School of Medicine will coordinate the various activities of the Medical School and the hospitals, and will work with the Deans of the Schools of Dentistry and Nursing as their activities are involved in programs, personnel and facilities of the School of Medicine and the teaching hospitals. The Dean of the School of Medicine will continue to report to and coordinate all school and hospital activities with the Chancellor of IUPUI.

The assignment of space and use of facilities identified with the Medical School and the teaching hospitals will be the responsibility of a committee with representative from the office of the Hospital Director, Dean of the School of Medicine, and the Chancellor.

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LEGISLATIVE REPORTS I

The Indiana General Assembly and the election campaign for 1972 will both begin in January. The major legislative issues -- all of them complicated by the threats and promises of the November elections -- will again revolve around the double problem of taxes and budgets.

A tentative bipartisan movement seems to be developing to pass a general tax increase despite the Governor's opposition and despite the election. If taxes are substantially increased, the pressures to amend the 1972-73 budgets will become irresistible.

A series of bills has been introduced to lower from 21 to 18 the minimum age for a variety of civil rights and pleasures, including the right to drink, borrow, receive occupational and professional licenses. If these bills pass into law, the final versions could have substantial impact on the universities' relationships with students. Virtually all students would become fully franchised adults in law.

The Green Sheet has again subscribed to the Indiana State Chamber of Commerce legislative reporting service and will use the service to report bills which seem interesting and important to the university. The Green Sheet Legislative Reports will appear weekly when the legislature convenes in January. -- HJU

SENATE -- New Bills

- SB 8 - (Orr, Hayes) Would establish a University of Southern Indiana at Evansville. Referred to Education Committee.
- SB 27 - (Bosma) Would provide for interpreters in administrative proceedings for those who cannot speak or understand English. Referred to Public Health Committee.
- SB 47 - (Bainbridge) Would establish a regional hospital affiliated internship and residency program and an expanded continuing medical education program, with a \$5.2-million appropriation. Referred to Education Committee.
- SB 53 - (Gubbins) Would prohibit psychometric, psychological or psychiatric testing of school children except to determine whether a child should be assigned to special education classes; parents with incomes over \$3,500 would pay for such tests. Referred to Education Committee.
- SB 86 - (Benjamin, Konrady) Would require premarital tests for sickle cell anemia. Referred to Judiciary Committee.
- SB 89 - (Benjamin, Park) Would require test for sickle cell anemia in Negro children in first grade unless parents have religious reasons for opposing such tests. Referred to Education Committee.
- SB 112 (Harrison) Would provide for training and certification of physicians' assistants. Referred to Public Health Committee.

HOUSE -- New Bills

- HB 1007 - (Bodine, Campbell) -- Would add a student member to the Indiana University Board of Trustees. Assigned to Education Committee.
- HB 1008 - (Zirkle, Bodine) -- Would add a student member to the Purdue University Board of Trustees. Assigned to Education Committee.
- HB 1031 - (Jessup) Would require medical school graduates to reimburse the state for the difference between the actual costs of their medical education and the amount paid by tuition in certain circumstances. Assigned to Public Health and Environmental Affairs Committee.
- HB 1034 - (Allen, Bales) Would authorize any hospital to conduct a pilot program to provide emergency medical care using mobile intensive care units, paramedics and nurses; allows paramedics to perform certain services; frees physicians and nurses from civil liability for instructing a paramedic at scene of emergency. Assigned to Public Health and Environmental Affairs Committee.
- HB 1055 - (Hric, Mertz) -- Would shorten teacher tenure period to three years. Assigned to Education Committee.
- HB 1082 - (A.Hayes) -- Would lower from 21 to 18 the age for obtaining professional and occupational licenses. Assigned to Judiciary Committee.
- HB 1083 - (Walsh) -- Would require parents or guardians of pupils in grades 7-12 to provide proof that pupils do not have infectious venereal diseases; would require parents of pupils to state whether they have been tested for tuberculosis. Assigned to Public Health and Environmental Affairs Committee.
- HB 1096 - (O'Connor) -- Would enable children 12 and older to seek treatment for drug abuse without parental consent. Referred to Judiciary Committee.
- HB 1109 - (Bales, Hall) -- Would establish Certificate of Need Commission within State Board of Health for construction, expansion, conversion of health care facilities. Assigned to Public Health and Environmental Affairs Committee.
- HB 1125 - (Nelson) Would establish a State University of Indianapolis from existing IUPUI facilities. Referred to Education Committee.
- HB 1127 - (Nelson) Would permit persons 65 and older to attend state universities and occupational schools without tuition charges. Referred to Education Committee.
- HB 1132 - (Harden, Crowe) Would authorize Bartholomew County to establish a community college; appropriates \$250,000. Referred to Education Committee.
