Komen receives \$1 million from Oracle

The Komen Tissue Bank at the IU Simon Cancer Center will receive a \$1 million grant from Oracle to support the development of an online resource for breast cancer researchers worldwide.

The Oracle Commitment Grant will help transform fresh frozen tissue samples from the Komen Tissue Bank, the only healthy breast tissue repository in the world, into digital data. The project will enable breast cancer researchers to conduct experiments faster and cheaper from anywhere with only access to an Internet connection. The bank currently maintains tissue specimens from more than 900 volunteer donors.

Transforming this unique resource into digital data will facilitate new insights into the development of breast cancer by creating a free and publically accessible online resource for the comparison of healthy and diseased tissue.

Komen estimates several thousand researchers will use the digitized slides and tissue once the virtual bank is completed.

Breast cancer screening topic of 10th annual Merritt Lecture

The 10th Annual Doris H. Merritt, MD Lectureship in Women's Health will be Wednesday, April 28, in Joseph Walther Hall (R3), room 203 from 8:15 to 10:30 a.m. This year's lecture featuring Carol Lee, MD, will focus on the recent controversy in breast cancer screening guidelines. Dr. Lee, who helped write the ACR's rebuttal to the recent U.S. Preventive Services Task Force guidelines recommending mammograms to start at age 50, will be lecturing on "Screening for breast cancer with mammography, ultrasound and MRI: Who, When, and Why."

Dr. Lee is an attending radiologist at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York and professor of radiology at Weill Medical College, Cornell University. She received her MD degree from Yale University School of Medicine and did her residency in diagnostic radiology at Yale New-Haven Hospital. She has been specializing in breast imaging for more than 25 years and has particular interest in magnetic resonance imaging of the breast. She is currently chair of the Commission on Breast Imaging of the American College of Radiology and is immediate past president of the Society of Breast Imaging.

A panel discussion, facilitated by Lee Learman, MD, chair of the IUSM Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, will immediately follow. The panel will address the broad concepts and principles that influence screening practices from a number of perspectives including women's health primary care, medical ethics, cancer policy research, medical oncology and behavioral research. The panel will

include Victoria Champion, DNS, RN, Thomas Imperiale, MD, Peter Schwartz, MD, PhD, Anna Maria Storniolo, MD, and Ann Zerr, MD.
