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Bonewald named first director of Indiana Center for Musculoskeletal Health

Bonewald named first director of Indiana Center for Musculoskeletal Health

Lynda F. Bonewald, Ph.D., an internationally recognized scientific and academic leader in bone research, has been named the first director of the Indiana Center for Musculoskeletal Health at IU School of Medicine.

Dr. Bonewald, whose research focuses on aspects of bone biology, is currently director of the Kansas City Consortium for Musculoskeletal Diseases and Disorders, the UMKC Center of Excellence in Dental and Mineralized Tissue, and the School of Dentistry Bone Biology Research Program.

The Musculoskeletal Center was formed in 2015 to build on a growing cadre of top scientists in the field of bone and musculoskeletal health at IU School of Medicine and the schools of engineering and technology, science, dentistry, and health and rehabilitation sciences at IUPUI.

"The new musculoskeletal center was designed to foster collaborative research and accelerate discovery in Indianapolis. Lynda Bonewald's experience as a researcher and administrative leader make her the perfect choice to be the founding director of this center," said Jay L. Hess, M.D., Ph.D., M.H.S.A, dean, IU School of Medicine and IU vice president for university clinical affairs.

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Indiana Center for Biomedical Innovation to aid life sciences entrepreneurs

A new biomedical business incubator created to help life sciences entrepreneurs bring their discoveries to market -- and to patient care -- marked its official opening Tuesday.

The Indiana Center for Biomedical Innovation is located in the former Methodist Research Institute at IU Health Methodist Hospital, which has been updated with modern laboratories and other research resources, collaboration spaces, and support services.

"ICBI will be a unique place for entrepreneurial researchers to transform their ideas and discoveries into products," said Jaipal Singh, Ph.D., director of the ICBI. "It is not simply a building where you incubate your startup. It's a collaborative ecosystem bringing entrepreneurs, life science experts, and investors together."

The center is joint effort supported by IU School of Medicine, Indiana University Health, the Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute, and a partner initiative to the already-established IU School of Medicine's Industry Collaboration Program.

"This center, along with the IU Research and Technology Corporation, will now create a seamless mechanism for IU innovations to be easily commercialized," said Dean Jay L. Hess, M.D., Ph.D., dean of the IU School of Medicine and IU vice president for university clinical affairs.

"We believe this will be platform for translation of laboratory discoveries that will ultimately improve health and patient care," said Anantha Shekhar, M.D., Ph.D., director of the Indiana CTSI and executive associate dean for research affairs at the IU School of Medicine.

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IUSM's DCI a key focus of April mock visit

For the last year, the IU School of Medicine Continuous Quality Improvement team has been gathering vast

amounts of information needed to complete the Data Collection Instrument (DCI), a critical step in the school's pursuit of re-accreditation in 2017.

Divided into 12 standards, the DCI requires documentation and data collection in a wide range of areas, including mission; leadership and administration; faculty preparation; educational resources and infrastructure; competencies and curricular design; medical school selection; and academic support. In addition to its value as a stand-alone accreditation document, the DCI also informs the school's Self-Study Summary Report, another key Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) requirement.

"Subject matter experts across IUSM have worked diligently to supply the data and detail we need to accurately complete our DCI," says Deb Birnbaum, MBA, manager, continuous quality improvement for educational affairs. "With the DCI temporarily closed to updates, we're working to edit, compile, and submit our DCI data to the evaluators assisting us with our first mock visit in April."

In preparation for submission of the final DCI in January 2017, an experienced editor is reviewing all DCI submissions with members of the LCME team and IUSM leadership to ensure information is communicated clearly, accurately, and with one voice.

IUSM has scheduled three mock visits to increase the school's readiness for the LCME site visit in late April 2017. Mock visit I, April 18-19, will focus on the DCI, the Independent Student Analysis (ISA), and the findings of the self-study. Mock visit II in September will emphasize IUSM's preparation for questions most likely to be posed by LCME surveyors. The final mock visit, Feb. 5-11, 2017, will duplicate, as closely as possible, the actual LCME visit, serving as the final point to make adjustments prior to the April 23-27 site visit.

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McRobbie pens IBJ op-ed in support of recent IBRI funding

This week's Indianapolis Business Journal (March 12 issue) featured a Viewpoint column by Indiana University President Michael A. McRobbie praising a recent \$100 million corporate funding pledge from the Lilly Endowment and the Eli Lilly and Co. Foundation for the Indiana Biosciences Research Institute. Noting the recent appointment of IUSM's Raghu Mirmira as the institute's first Indiana Research Fellow and interim scientific director, McRobbie wrote:

"I'm proud to say Indiana University has been an active partner in IBRI since its inception. For example, IBRI's focus on diabetes and metabolic diseases dovetails with one of the IU School of Medicine's scientific research priorities. We also expect the IU Center for Diabetes and Metabolic Diseases to become a valued research partner to IBRI and anticipate that many of IBRI's researchers will hold faculty positions in the school. Additionally, IBRI should provide valuable internship and research opportunities for IU students."

McRobbie also noted that "the institute -- the first of its kind in the nation -- is poised to be the anchor tenant in the 16 Tech innovation community being conceived just north of Eskenazi Hospital and has been launched in space in the 16 Tech area provided by the IU School of Medicine."

IU researchers pioneer use of 3D bioprinter

Here's a new recipe for creating living tissue: Impale tiny clumps of cells onto needles, much like miniature shish kebab skewers. Instead of heading to a tiny BBQ grill, you wait while the cells grow together to form the tissue you want -- perhaps skin or a section of blood vessel.

IU researchers are among the first in the United States to have direct access to a 3D bioprinter using that innovative technology to create living tissue, now for use in research laboratories, and potentially for use in humans.

Traditional 3D bioprinters create objects in layers by applying a fluid cell-embedding substance ("bio-ink") through a nozzle. The new machine uses a robot to place the tiny spheres of cells on the needles, carefully arranging them by cell type and location. The spheroids are assembled snugly against each other, enabling them to fuse together into the desired form of tissue.

Scientists will be using the instrument, distributed by the Japanese firm Cyfuse, to conduct research in tissue engineering and regenerative medicine projects in fields ranging from vascular and musculoskeletal biology

to dermatology, ophthalmology and cancer, said David B. Burr, Ph.D., associate vice chancellor for research at IUPUI, professor of anatomy and cell biology at the IU School of Medicine and of biomedical engineering at IUPUI.

"We have a large and robust group of investigators in these fields who are interested in 3D bioprinting for aspects of their work," Dr. Burr said. "Having this device positions us, and these investigators, to conduct research and obtain grant funding in new areas that many universities are simply not able to compete for yet."


