## NATATORIUM OFFERS INSTRUCTION

Beginning next Saturday (Jan. 15), the Natatorium will offer a complete instruction program for persons of all ages. Registration for Session I classes will be from 1 to 4 and from 7 to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday of this week at the Natatorium (Office, Room 007). Additional sessions on all classes will be offered beginning March 28 and again on May 16. Registration may be done by mail if postmarked by Jan. 10. A \$5 discount is offered for all mailed-in registrations. Make checks payable to the I.U. Natatorium.

Programs and prices are:

<u>Pre-School Swimming Instruction</u> -- Ages 3 months to 5 years. Parent must accompany each child in the water. Emphasis is on teaching both child and parent the basic swimming progression. Fee: \$30 for ten lessons.

<u>Children's Swimming Instruction</u> -- Red Cross certification in Beginner, Advance Beginner, and Intermediate for 5 to 12 year olds. Parents will not be permitted on the pool deck until the last lesson. Fee: \$25 for ten lessons.

<u>Pre-competitive Swimming</u> -- Participants have an opportunity to learn all four competitive strokes, starts and turns. Fee: \$25 for ten lessons.

Basic Water Safety and Rescue/Advance Lifesaving -- Red Cross Certification classes. Water Safety ages 11-15; Advance Life-saving 15 years and up. Fee: \$25 for six weeks, includes all materials.

Adult Swim Instruction -- For beginner or intermediate interested in improving. Fee: \$25 for ten lessons.

<u>Learn How by Doing Programs</u> -- in Diving, Waterpolo and Synchronized Swimming. Fees: Diving novice, \$15, \$35 intermediate, ten lessons; Waterpolo and Synchronized swimming \$25 for novice or intermediate, ten lessons.

#### LEARNING RESOURCES SYMPOSIUM ANNOUNCED

Dr. Robert Kegan, lecturer on education at the Harvard Graduate School of Education, and co-director of the Massachusetts Clinical-Developmental Institute, will be the keynote speaker at this year's Learning Resources Symposium scheduled for Feb. 11. He will touch on elements of lifelong emotional and intellectual development particularly relevant to the college experience.

Theme of the symposium will be "Responding to Students: Revitalizing Teaching." The keynote session and eight faculty panels will discuss the questions: What do we understand about student learning and development? How can that understanding inform our teaching? An additional feature will be the presentation of the first annual Edward C. Moore Teaching Award. Details later.

## ORIGINAL TEACHERS OF THE HERRON SCHOOL

An unexpected bequest in 1902 from an almost unknown donor, John Herron, led to the establishment of the Herron School of Art, now part of IUPUI, and a museum, now the Indianapolis Museum of Art. An exhibition on display through Jan. 17 at the Museum of Art features paintings of the early teachers who led the Herron School of Art from a local institution to one of national significance.

Shown are works of 13 Indianapolis art teachers from 1877 through 1933, including John Ottis Adams, the first chief instructor, plus William Forsyth, Otto Stark, Clifton Wheeler, and T.C. Steele.

### GERMAN WORK-STUDY PROGRAM OFFERED

A new work-study program in the Federal Republic of Germany is being offered this summer by the Department of Foreign Languages at Indiana University at South Bend.

An opportunity to work in a major German corporation will make foreign study available to those who may be financially unable to enroll in more traditional programs. Participants will be able to reduce their travel costs and earn extra money. Students from all I.U. campuses may apply, but they must have four semesters of college-level German or the equivalent.

The program will open on May 19 with travel to Luxembourg, Cologne and Berlin for an orientation to German culture. Students then will participate in an intensive one-month language course at the Carl Duisberg Language College in Cologne.

### SCHOLAR-DIPLOMAT SEMINARS ANNOUNCED


