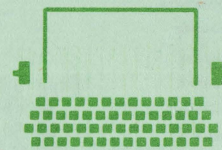


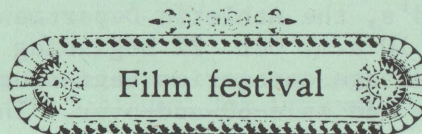

## IUPUI Exposition &



THE GREAT CAMPUS-COMMUNITY OPEN HOUSE will kick-off at 11:30 a.m. Thursday with remarks by Dr. Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., I.U. vice-president for Indianapolis, and Dr. Steven C. Beering, president of Purdue University, on the stage in the entertainment area under the Business/SPEA and Education/Social Work buildings.

An added attraction, the IUPUI Film Festival, will offer continuous showings from 11:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. in Rooms 1000 and 2000 of the Business/SPEA Building. The Festival includes a variety of films, videotapes and slide shows about IUPUI, its departments and programs and its notable medical facilities. A complete schedule will be available at the Festival sites.

Exposition participants may relax and enjoy entertainment ranging from dance, puppet theater and reader's theater, to jazz and folk music, offered by talented faculty and staff members and students of IUPUI. Entertainment will be offered continuously from 11:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. on stage in the entertainment area.

Some of IUPUI's outstanding departments will be opening their facilities for guided tours, including the schools of Nursing, Engineering and Technology, Public and Environmental Affairs, and Physical Education. Information will be available on these and other tours at individual exhibits.

The I.U. calliope will be playing throughout the day, and the Union Building will be serving at the Exposition site. The Exposition is open to faculty and staff members and students and their families as well as to the general public.

### "COLLEGIAL CONVERSATIONS" REVISITED

William M. Plater, new dean of the School of Liberal Arts, will inaugurate this season's series of "Collegial Conversations" at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday in Cavanaugh 537. He will discuss "The Computer as Symbol" and will ask some leading questions about the ways in which computers may be changing the nature of liberal arts disciplines.

The series will continue at noon Oct. 24 with associate instructor Charles DeBow. His reminiscences, called "At the Forefront," will deal with his experiences as one of the first black pilots in the American military during World War II. Of the six original Tuskegee pilots, DeBow is one of three who survive.

The "Conversations" will conclude at 2:30 p.m. Nov. 15 with a "Report from Dubrovnik," dealing with the second American Studies Conference in Yugoslavia.

All interested persons are invited to attend and participate in these informal discussions, which are sponsored by the Center for American Studies.

### OCULAR HISTOPLASMOSIS TREATMENT VERIFIED

In 1965 Dr. Theodore F. Schlaegel Jr., professor of ophthalmology at the I.U. School of Medicine, began experimenting with the use of photocoagulation in the treatment of ocular histoplasmosis syndrome. About 10 years ago he began using the argon laser for this purpose. At that time many ophthalmologists doubted that the disease really existed.

Dr. Schlaegel felt that he was getting good results, but the treatment needed a long-term verification of its efficacy. In 1979 a national collaborative study began supported in 12 centers by the National Eye Institute of the NIH. Dr. Schlaegel was on the executive committee of the study.

Results published last month in the Archives of Ophthalmology by the Macular Photocoagulation Study and outlined at a news conference at the I.U. Department of Ophthalmology on Sept. 20, show that treatment with a laser can prevent serious loss of vision in some people with ocular histoplasmosis syndrome (OHS), an eye disease which threatens the sight of some 2,000 Americans each year. The



laser treatment cut in half the risk of losing all central vision. OHS is believed to be an unusual and late-developing complication of a common airborne disease called histoplasmosis prevalent throughout the Mississippi and Ohio River valleys. About 90 percent of the people in the so-called Histo Belt have been exposed, and about 4 percent of them have tiny scars inside the eyes that may lead to OHS.

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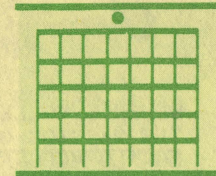
