Everyone invited to participate in 10th annual Miles for Myeloma

The 10th anniversary of Miles for Myeloma -- an annual bike ride in which a team of cyclists led by IUSM faculty member Rafat Abonour, M.D., will cover 300 miles over three days to raise funds and awareness for the cancer multiple myeloma -- is Oct. 3 to 5.

This year, in celebration of the ten-year milestone, Miles for Myeloma will also include multiple other events leading up to the final ride, with everyone invited to support the cause. These events include:

• **Sept. 20 and 21** -- Eagle Creek Park Rides: The cyclists will ride an eight-mile loop from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Eagle Creek Park, to 7840 W 56th St., Indianapolis, to reach 120 miles each day.

- Sept. 27 and 28 -- Eagle Creek Park Rides: 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Eagle Creek Park, 7840 W 56th St., Indianapolis. The cyclists will ride an eight-mile loop from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Eagle Creek Park to reach 120 miles each day.
- Sept. 29 and 30 -- Decade of Dedication Celebration: A Miles for Myeloma cyclist will be riding a stationary bike in the lobby of the IU Health Simon Cancer Center from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. All are welcome to hop on a second stationary bike alongside the cyclist and show your support for the cause. Patients, friends, family, researchers, nurses and other supporters may sign up to ride on the stationary bike in 15-minute increments.
- Oct. 3 -- Miles for Myeloma 2014 Send-Off: 8 a.m., Fesler Circle on the IUPUI campus. All are welcome to enjoy donuts and coffee at 8 a.m. on Fesler Circle on the IUPUI as they send off Dr. Abonour and the Miles for Myeloma cyclists on their three-day, 300-mile ride. Parking is available in the IUPUI Vermont Street garage. The Fesler Circle is located on the north side of Michigan Street just behind the Eugene and Marilyn Glick Eye Institute.
- Oct. 3 to Oct. 5 -- Miles for Myeloma 2014: The cyclists will travel from the IUPUI campus in downtown Indianapolis to Spencer, Ind. On Saturday, they will continue on to Terre Haute, Ind. On Sunday, they will return to downtown Indianapolis.
- Oct. 5 -- Miles for Myeloma 2014 Finish Line Celebration: All are welcome at the finish line at 4:15
 a.m. at the Scottish Rite Cathedral, 650 N. Meridian St., Indianapolis, as the cyclists conclude their
 1,000-mile mission. Free parking is available at the cathedral. The finish-line celebration will be
 immediately followed by the annual dinner and educational symposium for myeloma patients and
 families.

In addition, everyone is invited to participate in "Your Miles for Myeloma," a way for individuals not participating in these other events to dedicate mileage they cover during a run, bike, swim or walk to the cause. The goal for this year's program is to collect a total of 200,000 miles to honor and remember myeloma patients.

IUSM curriculum reform update

In a message distributed to the IU School of Medicine on Sept. 8, IUSM Dean Jay L. Hess, M.D., Ph.D., announced that implementation of the IUSM curriculum reform process will be moved to fall of 2017.

"When Peter Nalin became our executive associate dean for educational affairs, I asked him to assess where we stood in this key effort, especially in light of our need to prepare for the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) visit in 2016-2017," said Dr. Hess, also the vice president for university clinical affairs at IU.

"After considerable discussion and consultation with numerous faculty members and outside experts, we have concluded that the self-study process required for LCME accreditation needs to be our highest priority and will provide a wealth of information to inform the curriculum reform process. With that, and concerns that more time is needed to address curriculum reform across all our campuses, we have moved implementation of curriculum reform to the Fall of 2017.

"This does not mean the work done to date is being scrapped. Quite the contrary, curriculum reform work will continue in the background and a number of key changes will be implemented earlier.

"I want to thank all who have contributed to the curriculum reform and I look forward to completing the implementation process following a successful LCME site visit."

IU Center of Excellence in Women's Health earns new state grant

The IU National Center of Excellence in Women's Health, a program of the IU School of Medicine and the IU Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, has been awarded its fourth grant in three years from the Indiana State Department of Health.

The grants, which total over \$835,000, provide funding to improve access to health care, increase awareness of healthy lifestyle behaviors and connect women -- particularly those age 14 to 24 -- with local resources for optimum health. Using the Center of Excellence's outreach program, which includes a mobile health unit called the Women's Wellness on Wheels (WOW) Bus, they provide free screenings for body mass index, blood sugar and blood pressure, plus individualized consultation and education on activity levels, nutrition and reproductive health. Those with abnormal findings are paired with a health coach to help women overcome barriers to leading a healthier lifestyle.

The center also convenes partnerships in the state toward the fulfillment of its mission to improve the health of Indiana women. The director of the IU National Center of Excellence in Women's Health is Theresa M. Rohr-Kirchgraber, M.D.

IU research explores sexual risk factors in teenage girls

An IU researcher who combed through 80,000 daily reports written by 14- to 17-year-old girls has revealed a relationship between skipped classes, failed tests and risky sexual behavior in teenage girls.

The IU study published Sept. 9 in the Journal of Adolescent Health is the first to examine the day-to-day relationship between teenage girls' reports about school-related events, how they felt and the sexual behaviors they participated in. The findings are based on a 10-year study of the development of 387 teenage girls' romantic/sexual relationships and sexual behavior. During the study, the teens entered their daily activities and mood into a log. The study demonstrated that young women's weekday reports of skipping school and failing a test were significantly linked to more frequent vaginal sex, less frequent condom use and different sexual emotions on the same day.

The lead author on the study is Devon J. Hensel, Ph.D., assistant research professor of pediatrics in the Section of Adolescent Medicine at the IU School of Medicine and an assistant professor of sociology at IUPUI. The study was supported by the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health and Human Development.

Free campus flu shot clinics to begin in October

Editor's Note: Due to additional delays, IUPUI Campus Health now expects to receive its first order of flu shots by Oct. 31. Because of these unforeseen circumstances, Campus Health will postpone its outreach clinics, rescheduling them from October to November. The new dates will be shared on the Campus Health website and via InScope.

Free flu vaccinations will be available at IUPUI Campus Health starting in late September. All IUPUI faculty, staff and students, including members of the IU School of Medicine, can obtain a flu shot at Campus Health (Coleman Hall), IUPUI Campus Center Student Health (students only) at this time.

In addition, IUPUI Campus Health will hold a number of outreach flu shot clinics starting in October. Flu shot clinics at IUSM locations include:

- Oct. 6: IUSM Neurosciences Research Building, Room 4235 -- Noon to 2 p.m.
- Oct. 16: Health Informatics and Translational Sciences (HITS) Building, Lobby -- 10 a.m. to noon
- Oct. 21-22: VanNuys Medical Science Building Atrium -- 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Oct. 23: IU Health Methodist Hospital Emergency Department -- 11 a.m. to noon (residents only)
- Oct. 29: Glick Eye Institute, Spitzberg Conference Room entrance area -- 7 to 9 a.m.

IU School of Medicine faculty, staff, students, fellows and residents considered employees, affiliated physicians, volunteers, students, contractors and vendors at IU Health and Eskenazi Health -- or who provide care or interview patients, perform any clinical research or whose primary office is located in an IU Health or Eskenazi hospital -- are required to receive an influenza vaccination this flu season. Richard L. Roudebush VA Medical Center employees are encouraged, but not required, to receive an influenza vaccination.

A valid JagTag ID is required to receive a free flu shot. IUPUI students with insurance through Aetna or Anthem are asked -- but not required -- to provide proof of insurance. IUSM house staff and students who opt to receive vaccination from IU Health, a personal physician or elsewhere must submit their flu shot consent form to IUPUI Campus Health at healthsv@iupui.edu or via fax at 317-278-6929.

Mark your calendars -- Spinal Cord and Brain Injury Research Fund

In 2007, the Indiana established the Indiana Spinal Cord and Brain Injury Research Fund (login required), which releases a request for proposals each December.

The overall objective of this request for proposals is to foster and encourage research for the prevention, treatment and cure of spinal cord and brain injuries, including acute management, medical complications, rehabilitative techniques, and neuronal recovery.

The Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute supports this initiative for PIs and/or collaborators from its affiliated institutions (IU, Purdue and Notre Dame) by providing assistance with successful proposal development via its Project Development Team program. The Project Development Teams are teams comprised of members with a wide variety of expertise who can provide feedback on study design, protocol development, biostatistical design and grantsmanship, as well as facilitating collaborations and networking.
