DORMITORY RULES, NORMAL COLLEGE, N. A. G. U.

Rising bell, 6:15 a.m.

Breakfast, 7:00-7:30 a.m. Sundays, 8:00-9:00 a.m.

Lunch, 12:15 p.m. Saturdays, 12:45 p.m.

Dinner, 6:00 p.m. Sunday dinner, 1:00 p.m. Sunday supper, 6:00 p.m.

Mrs. Boos should be notified if any one will not be present for a meal.

No dressing sacks or kimonos to be worn on first floor at any time. Five seniors and five juniors at each table, all changing every two weeks.

Girls at the head of the table serve. - Girls at the head change each week.

Maid sweeps and washes floors, makes beds, and empties baskets. Other things girls must attend to.

Girls must make their own beds on Sundays.

Quiet after 8:00 p.m., except Saturdays and Sundays. No piano playing after 8:00 p.m.

Girls coming in after quiet hours should go immediately to their own rooms.

Lights to be turned out, 1) when girls are out of their rooms; 2) when finished in bath room.

Doors locked at 9:00 p.m.; keys after that. Keys lost must be replaced by looser.

Callers on Saturday and Sunday evenings. Other evenings girls are not to sit in front of the house with their friends. Callers are permitted to stay until 10:00 p.m.

Girls should come in as soon as they return home in the evenings and not stay outside to talk.

Girls leaving the building after dinner or for any place during the day except to school, must register stating where they are going.

Dressing room: Freshmen, Thursdays; Seniors, Saturdays.

Telephone for business only. No telephone calls during meals.

Tubs and basins must be washed out after use.

No baths in the morning after 6:15.

No books or wraps to be left anywhere on first floor.

Notify matron when a guest is expected.

Girls must replace anything broken on water tank.

Proctors on each side of house on each floor, change every two weeks.

Impressed with the desirability of a dormitory for the women students of the College, the Trustees of the Normal College are pleased to announce that they have closed a lease for a building well suited to the purpose, known as the Trenton Flats, No. 516 North New Jersey street.

The new dormitory, which is most conveniently located diagonally across the street from the College, will be a decided improvement over the rooming and boarding houses where the women students of the College have found accommodations heretofore. The building is equipped with every modern convenience, and is in excellent condition. Important alterations will be made on the ground floor to secure spacious reception room and dining hall.

The Trustees have acquainted themselves with the governing rules and the business management of dormitories in universities and colleges of other cities.

The business management of the new dormitory will be in charge of a matron to be appointed by the Board of Trustees. To encourage student self-government, the trustees will appoint a governing board of five students (three seniors, two freshmen), to hold office during the first semester; thereafter such board shall be elected by the women students of the College from among their number. The Student Governing Board will be intrusted with the internal management of the dormitory under rules and regulations to be established by the students.

The cost of room and board will be approximately from \$6 to \$7 per week according to size and location of the rooms. The food will be carefully prepared and wholesome. The furniture in the sleeping rooms and throughout the building will be new and adapted to the practical needs of the students.

It is expected that all students, excepting only those whose parents reside in this city, will make the dormitory their home, and that they will co-operate with the Board of Trustees to make this undertaking a success in every detail.

The Women's Dormitory of the Normal College will be ready for occupancy in time for the opening of the College in September next.

The Trustees reserve the right to rent rooms to women students of other colleges or schools of this city, in case there should not be a sufficient number of the Normal College students for the occupancy of the whole building.
