## Herron protests save school's art supply store

A recent decision to close or relocate the Herron Main Building bookstore has been postponed by university administrators, pending further evaluation.

Executive Dean Howard G. Schaller said last week that "the store will continue to operate as usual."

Bookstore officials had earlier announced that the store would close effective April 27, and be consolidated with the Learn and Shop Bookstore, at 1830 W. 16th St.

They claimed the move would better serve the needs of faculty and students, by providing a walk-in type operation.

However, Susan Boyles, president of the Herron Student Senate, and other concerned Herron students, protested the move and organized an effort to retain the store's current location.

The group collected the

signatures of more than 300 persons on a petition targeted at preserving the store.

"Closing the store would put a hardship on people without transportation, who need to purchase supplies for classes," Boyles said.

Bookstore Operations Manager, Bill Cassell, said the decision to close the store was "basically a financial one."

Financial records show that the Herron Store has not shown a profit for the past several years, Cassell said.

"Last year alone the Herron store lost nearly \$20,000.

"It came down to a question of how long we were going to let the student body subsidize a money-losing operation," he said.

Sales figures show that the volume of sales at the Herron Store have dropped consistently over the past several years.

Boyles said many students feel

## School board delays radio station's future

The Indianapolis School Board voted recently to postpone deciding the future of a radio station IUPUI is interested in purchasing.

On March 26 the board voted 5-2 in favor of delaying any city actions affecting WIAN-FM, which the city school system owns and operates.

Board members said the postponement would give them time to review a suggestion to allow IPS to retain the station, but give up station management and financial support.

In the March 4, 1985 issue of the *Sagamore*, IPS Superintendent James A. Adams said the school system should relinquish control in favor of a new owner.

Michael Hedges, consultant, named IUPUI, Butler University and WFYI (Channel 20) as three possible alternate owners.

Dr. Glenn W. Irwin, vice-president, Indianapolis, said he hoped the delay would allow the station to continue its programming.

While IUPUI could not financially handle a station at this time, Irwin said the university is conversing with the media to establish linkages that would benefit telecommunication students.

## Dragonette, Anoushiravani victors in assembly race

Controversial issues and a heavy voter turnout produced a close race during the Student Assembly elections.

And when the smoke cleared, Martin A. Dragonette emerged as the winner in the presidential race and Armita Anoushiravani took the victory for vice president.

Dragonette, a junior Psychology student, edged graduate David Cates by a narrow margin of 17 votes. Dragonette claimed 556 votes to Cates' 539, followed by Gary Messplay at 494 and Al Green with 62 votes.

In the vice presidential race, Anoushiravani received 595 votes, Tina Sue Bravard claimed 515 and Gregory Glaze pulled 398 votes.

The newly-elected officers begin their term for the 1985-86 school year May 15.

A close race kept candidates on the edge of their seats until a recount produced the final results.

"We were just verifying what we had," explained Stephen J. Akard, current Student Assembly president.

Akard attributed the close race in part to the heavy voter response.

"Turnout was very heavy,

well beyond last year's turnout, which is very good for the Student Assembly. It shows an increase in support for student government," Akard said.

Dragonette said he is encouraged by this year's heavy voter turnout.

"I'm very pleased. It shows the student body is more concerned about the issues," he said. He also noted that the candidates worked very hard to communicate their feelings on the issues, which helped stimulate the student body to vote "for their candidate."

One of the top priorities on Dragonette's agenda is a seminar on effective commit-

tees, aimed at producing results.

"We would like to have Gordon St. Angleo (former Democratic state chairman) come in and do a seminar on how to be a good committee-person and a good chairman, as well as how to put together an effective agenda," Dragonette said.

Another top priority of Dragonette's is the creation of a book exchange. He proposes sending a group to Ball State University, where a successful money-saving book exchange has been established, to meet with the coordinators of that project.

## Taking notice...

It seems to me that one of the major problems within this university — and, I would think, within any large urban university — is disseminating information. It's the lack of centralization that works against us.

To my mind, that lack of centralization — in other words, the fact that IUPUI is an urban university — is one of the features that makes it so attractive. It's a school that's very much involved in its community. Many members of the faculty are here because they enjoy working with the interesting mix of students drawn from the metropolitan area — young and mature; minorities; people who have the dedication to work for an education even though they have jobs and families and other commitments.

Some years back, during my first incarnation as a college student, there were only two coffee houses near the campus where students could hang out. But it's a fair bet that if you live in Carmel or Greenwood or Speedway, you and I rarely frequent the same establishments.

We, or at least most of us, don't share dorms or cafeteria lines in the union, and we don't live together in fraternity and sorority houses. Our numbers are too large, our schedules too busy, and our interests too diverse to cross paths very often with people outside of our majors. But we do share a campus, and a need to have access to information about that campus.

The diversity that helps make IUPUI such an attractive institution also makes disseminating information difficult. It's not that nobody's trying. Every building on campus is plastered with bulletin boards that are plastered with announcements. Signs and announcements are everywhere. I know I get regular and informative newsletters from both my school and department.

The university news bureau keeps up a steady flow of news releases in more areas than one can almost imagine, although most students never see those directly.

The central vehicle for information, at least for students, is the *Sagamore*. And to my mind one of the most essential services the *Sagamore* offers is the "Notices" page.

The "Notices" section of the *Sagamore* has been stuffed pretty full, pretty regularly, with announcements from groups, committees and departments that put it to good use.

I sometimes wonder, though, about all the stuff that never makes it into the "Notices" because no one thought of it or the information arrived too late.

The amount of extracurricular activity that goes on around here is phenomenal. So many things take place over at the Department of Communications and Theatre, to name only one example, that some days you can almost see the sparks flying off the top of the Mary Cable Building.

It wouldn't surprise me a bit to learn that all the other schools and departments that I have next to no contact with are just as active. And that some of their activities — speakers, seminars, interest groups — would surely be of interest to me if I only knew about them — if they showed up in the "Notices."

## Letters — Student aid crisis letters needed

To the editor:

A major crisis exists for all IUPUI students. The 1985-1986 federal budget proposed cuts in student aid will effectively eliminate the majority of financial aid available to students.

If these proposals are passed, over one-third of the approximately 14,000 IUPUI students currently receiving financial aid will lose the majority of their financial aid.

The proposed cuts includes:

### Guaranteed Student Loan Program

All students, whether independent or not, would be ineligible for GSL funds if their family incomes exceed \$32,500 per year. This is automatic ineligibility and any student under age 22 would be considered a dependent student whether or not he lived at home.

Currently all dependent students with family incomes under \$30,000 per year are

automatically eligible for GSL, dependent students with family incomes between \$30,000 and \$75,000 are eligible for GSL if their ability to pay (based on the family size and adjusted gross income) is less than the cost of attendance at the school. Cost of attendance include living expenses and goes beyond the mere payment of tuition! No student, either undergraduate or graduate, would be able to receive more than \$4000 per year in a federally subsidized loan program.

Undergraduates may now borrow \$5,000 per year in GSL to a maximum of \$15,000 (in addition to other loan programs, grants or work study).

### Pell, NDSL & Work Study

All students with family incomes above \$25,000 would be ineligible for Pell Grants, National Direct Student Loans or work study programs.

IUPUI's women's softball team swept DePauw last week to raise its record to 13-5.

The Metros will host Indiana Central Wednesday night, Grace Friday night and play at Huntington Thursday night and Indiana State-Evansville Sunday. The ICU and Grace games will start at 4 p.m.

Theresa Murray pitched a shut out in the first game as the Metros used an unearned run to defeat DePauw in the first game 1-0.

The Metros offense opened

up in the second game for Maureen Bowen and the Metros won 9-3. Bowen raised her record to 5-1 with the win. Murray raised her record to 4-3 with the first game win.

Through the Metros first 18 games, four players are hitting over .300 led by freshman Cindy Reese with a .400 average.

Senior Chris Nichols is hitting .364, freshman Vicki Levensky is hitting .333 and senior Judy DeVoogel is hitting .306. DeVoogel, the Metros leadoff hitter is also the leader in walks. Levensky is the Metros'

Reese and Levensky have each picked up six extra base hits. Reese has three doubles, two triples and a home run while Levensky has two doubles, three triples and a home run.

It was reported on April 5 that basketball player Winston Morgan may be leaving Indiana University. Morgan saw only :58 of playing time in IU's last ten games.


He has been in brief contact with Metro coach Bob Lovell concerning his eligibility to play for IUPUI, but has not enrolled in the university or visited the

campus.

According to NAIA rules, if a player competes in more than three NCAA games and then redshirts, he is considered to have completed a full season. Morgan played six games for IU last season before redshirting, and may be considered ineligible to play for an NAIA school next season,

But a report from the NAIA District 21 office said that eligibility issues are handled case by case.

According to Lovell, "We're going to look into this but absolutely nothing is definite. It is only in the preliminary stages and we will have to wait and see."



**Africans benefit from IU dentists**

A group of IUPUI dentists and students who recently returned from a charitable tour of Africa, say their efforts to bring dental care to people there were successful.

Dr. Charles E. Hutton, professor and chairman of oral and maxillofacial surgery at the IU School of Dentistry, headed a team which treated as many as 350 patients a day.

"Each village we visited had different health problems and economic states," Hutton said.

"The high glucose content in their sugar cane results in an increased incidence of tooth decay," he added.

The dental team traveled over 1,500 miles, from the Indian Ocean to Lake Victoria and Nairobi. They visited remote areas, examining and treating both children and adults.

"Most of the procedures I per-

formed were tooth extractions, while students cleaned the patient's teeth," Hutton said.

Using only instruments and medication they could carry with them, the team held their clinics outside to take advantage of sunlight, since there was no electricity.

"The lack of sanitation in several areas was the main cause of citizen health problems," Hutton said. "In Lake Victoria, over 50 percent of the population suffered from malaria."

Over 80,000 Africans living in a two-mile square ghetto in Nairobi were treated in the final two days of the relief effort.

The country of Kenya has approximately 300 dentists to serve its 20 million people.

The trip was organized through DePauw University to assist the Institute of Cultural Affairs (ICA). The group of

dentists and students were joined by missionaries and construction and medical teams, which worked in a small village near Mombasa in the district of Kilifi.

The ICA is an international organization that sends dental and medical teams into Third World countries to aid the destitute.

Hutton has traveled on seven ICA projects in the past, but this journey to Africa was a first.

Kenya's newspapers and television stations, along with dental leaders, asked the various teams to return.

An East African Dental Congress is currently scheduled to be held in Nairobi in October 1986 as a result of cooperations between Indiana University and the Kenyan Dental Association.

# 'Caring students' visit Appalachia

While caravans of adventurous students left for the sun and surf of Florida over Spring Break, a group of 20 students from IUPUI left on a different type of journey.

Unlike their counterparts heading to the "developed" areas of touristy east Florida, the group was en route to an escape back into nature, to experience an environment different than the normal college vacation.

Instead of hot, sandy beaches, the group drove 500 miles to the northeast, toward chilly mountain air in the heart of coal-mining country in Clearfield County, Pennsylvania.

The trip, sponsored by the Catholic Student Center, was advertised as a "Spring Break Alternative."

A promotional brochure described the trip as a work week in Appalachia, where volunteers would be put to use aiding the needs of the underprivileged, handicapped and elderly in the poorest county in Pennsylvania.

Jeff Godecker, Chaplain at IUPUI and a three-year veteran of the program, described it as "a pilgrimage."

"The trip will be different for everyone. What you may experience will not be the same as someone else," he said. "Be open, be accepting and try to adapt to the challenges of the week."

After a ten-hour journey, the group arrived at the Young People Who Care Center, a nine-year-old out-reach mission. Sister Therese Dush of Sisters of Mercy founded the mission, which is staffed by young adult volunteers from around the country.

"The first response many volunteers have upon meeting the poor is to clean them up. They feel that if a poor person smells good, they will feel good. Many short-term volunteers expect to find instant solutions and immediate results," she said.

The week that followed proved to be one of many "firsts" for many in the group.

Shovelling coal, chopping

wood, carrying water from wells and streams, as well as cleaning coal-blackened walls and mud-encrusted floors were just a few of the chores the group members endured.

For one student washing laundry for an elderly resident was a new experience.

"My mom always does ours at home," she said.

In retrospect, most of the IUPUI volunteers agree that the most heart-rendering experiences were those in adapting to the physical, mental and spiritual hunger of the rural area.

"While working on a high school retreat for sophomores in a neighboring town, I found out just how much pain those teenagers have, even though all of their material needs are taken care of," said Jerry Koleski, senior engineering student.

Stacey Wiley, a freshman in occupational therapy, experienced a strong combination of feelings throughout the week.

"I was scared at first. I had no idea of what to expect. I spent my first day cracking black

walnuts and had serious doubts whether the whole trip was worth the bother," she said.

A two-day trip to a nearby mission center in Coalport, however, provided Stacey with a different perspective on the week.

"We visited and ran errands for a lot of people," she continued. "I saw a lot of pain and a lot of poverty."

One home, belonging to an 86-year old woman named Gerie, was located next to a large strip-mining area.

"The sulfur in her water was

so strong that she had to boil the water before using it. She had to use Calgon in her bath water or else it would leave a heavy film."

According to Reverend Jeff Godecker, the coordinator of the trip, the greatest benefit of the week was not the service rendered to the area but the opportunity of experiencing a different lifestyle.

"Hopefully, this type of experience creates some level of commitment to remain involved with the poor and needy," he said.

Schaller said alternative methods of operating the store, include creating a walk-in store in one of the Herron Buildings. He also said the store could possibly moved across the street.


"We will exploring the various options," Schaller said. He noted a lack of space on the Herron campus, and security concerns as major obstacles that must be overcome.




