

FROM THE DEAN

Greetings of the new year from the School of Physical Education of IUPUI, formerly known as the Normal College. At the time of writing we are deeply involved with registration and enrollment procedures and that keeps everyone busy. Our enrollment is up this semester from last and so we have added additional courses and additional sections. This semester, for the first time in many, many years we are offering a course in Wrestling. Mr. Randy Galvin will be teaching this course. He is eminently qualified, having been a Big Ten Champion during his college days. He not only teaches the two Speech classes but is the owner of the Black Curtain Dinner Theater. He is a busy and talented person who has excellent rapport with the students. Another new course this semester is Sports Officiating for the men. Although this is an elective course we have 29 men signed up already. Most of these men will later become qualified by the IHSAA and will be able to earn a considerable amount of money as certified officials. Mr. Nick Kellum will teach this course.

I am pleased also to announce that Mr. LaMar "Pete" Peterson has accepted an additional responsibility to those he already holds as Director of Recreation in the Rehabilitation program at Central State Hospital. He will now supervise a number of students enrolled in Recreational Field Experience at the Hospital. Pete is on the faculty of the HPER School in Bloomington in the Department of Recreation and will have a number of interns from that department also. We look forward to a long and mutually beneficial program with him. Those of you who went to school with Pete will remember him as the "Old Man!"

Other students will again be working in the Recreational program at the Indiana State School for the Blind under Mr. Ron Gacsco who is now an Adjunct Assistant Professor on our staff. Ron has proved this to be a highly successful program. Look elsewhere in this Bulletin for his account of the program.

We are pleased to have Dr. George Bellshaw as an Adjunct Associate Professor with us now. He is a practicing physician in Indianapolis who has a great desire to be of service to IUPUI and has undertaken the development of a competitive Wrestling program here. It has just barely begun, but we look forward to the growth of that program.

Other students have been involved with teaching as a part of their class work. Mrs. Barrett, in the course,

Teaching of Individual Sports, arranged for pupils from Holy Angels elementary school to be instructed in bowling by her students. It was a most interesting experience, often hilarious. These youngsters had no previous bowling experience but this was no barrier to their enthusiasm.

Mr. Dickison has been hard at work with the IUPUI basketball team, the Metros. We now hold associate membership in the NCAA and faced a tough schedule for such a young team. They suffered a number of reverses, but played so well in the first annual Indy Classic that they came out in first place. This tournament is sponsored by Sertoma Northeast with the profits going to the Indiana State School for the Deaf. Just today Nick Kellum took the beautiful trophy down to Chancellor Irwin's office so that others could admire it, too.

Both Delta Psi Kappa and Phi Epsilon Kappa have been very active this year. Mrs. Barrett sponsors the girls and Mr. Dickison sponsors the men. The fraternity sponsored a Basketball Clinic which was scheduled prior to the start of the basketball season. The Clinic was well attended and speakers included some outstanding coaches on the collegiate and high school levels. The fraternity also took as a project the contribution of canned goods for a needy family during the Xmas holidays. The sorority hosted a two day session of representatives and their sponsors from the Midwest district which is made up of 6 states. The visitors were housed in the homes of members. The meetings were held at the school with CLARA HESTER as a principal speaker. The sorority also provided a catering service during the week of final exams which was much appreciated by students.

Mrs. Teegarden has proved to be a great help on the faculty this year, teaching the Methods class and Physical Education for the Elementary School and supervising Student Teachers. She has also assumed Counseling responsibilities like a veteran. She has found that job opportunities for graduates are opening up. The Indianapolis Schools, for example, report numerous anticipated vacancies in Art, English, Vocal Music and Physical Education for both Men and Women.

Dr. Schreiber, who is the Director of the counseling program at the School, now has four counselors to help him. He and his staff really worked hard this past semester and counselled 95% of the students who could then go through Pre-registration without incident. He did his work so well that the people assigned to

The story is always the same: "I sat down and read it straight through even though I didn't know all the names." The dance program under the direction of Mary Kimball has been reorganized to be more consistent in terminology and to be a little easier to schedule. She has worked this out well and the students are now finding it easier to plan their schedules which sometimes take them to three or four different locations. The students are asking for additional dance classes which, as yet, can not be accommodated on our already overcrowded floor. Mrs. Kimball has been highly successful in her dance work.

Mr. Lienert has been working with a men's volleyball team which plays in a 10 team league with games on alternate Sundays. On January 28, the first IUPUI Invitational Volleyball Tournament will be held at our school with 5 teams. Last year our team won the 10 team statewide tournament, defeating Ball State in the last game. We are looking forward to another successful season.

As for myself, well, I go to meetings, write reports, dream up problems and projects for others to solve, and try very, very hard to keep track of the students and faculty and to know what is going on. We all take time now and then to dream of what should be and of what one day will be. But in the meantime, the School prospers and grows. You would be as proud of these students as you have been in the past. Some are older, many are married, almost all work to help themselves through school and they share the same kinds of hopes and aspirations that you held when you were in school. Although many people say that young people are quite different today, I believe they are basically the same, although perhaps more aware of their options. But they are still the same outgoing, extroverted, activity-minded young men and women who will make us proud just as you have done.

This is still a challenging and rewarding place to work. Paraphrasing what the King said to Anna, "It's been a good place to put our lives." - and a good place for you to put your loyalty.





BOB PEGEL complains that snow shoveling hasn't kept his weight down. Too many parties and not enough snow!



Students Earn Credits At Blind School **BY:RON GACSKO**

Our program involving students from the IUPUI School of Physical Education as leaders in our recreation program started a little over three years ago. The program was created to provide a more expansive and in-depth recreation program for our blind students. Initially the recreation program was manned by myself and two or three interested citizens. Only one activity at a time could be offered to the students and the choice of activities was very limited.

It was decided that more qualified leaders were needed to develop the type of program needed by our school population. In order to have a diversified program with special interests, we looked to the School of Physical Education to provide the trained manpower. In return, we believed we could provide a unique opportunity for the college student to broaden his knowledge and to test his teaching skills. We realized that more opportunities are needed throughout a student's college career, to test and to put to use what he is learning in the classroom. We felt that if we could involve the student in our proposed program as early as the sophomore year, the material presented to him in the classroom would be more challenging and more interesting.

I and Mrs. Lee, Coordinator of School Activities, met with Dean Lohse to discuss the idea. We identified the benefits the program could offer to both school populations and reviewed the paper work and mechanics involved in providing the accredited program. After several weeks we met again to work out the final details. Similar meetings were held with the administration of the School for the Blind. The program was reviewed and approved by Mr. Hutchinson, the Superintendent, and by Mr. Haralson, the Principal. A few weeks later, six students were enrolled in the course, Field Experience in Recreation. Since that first group, the program has grown and improved and now a student may earn up to three hours of credit in this program.

Other Schools for the Blind have started similar programs. The structure and working mechanics of the program may vary, but the purposes and results are the same. All are producing better programs for the blind and enriched experiences for the college students.

Because of the working alliance between the Indiana State School for the Blind and IUPUI's School of Physical Education, the recreational future for the blind student is brighter. We

believe that the recreational skills he develops today will help him in his leisure time pursuits as an adult. On the other hand, the patience, ingenuity and understanding attitude of the college student will help to enhance his ability to do a better job of teaching, wherever his job may be.

In closing, I should mention the growing interest of the college students in pursuing a career in Physical Education for the Handicapped Child. Our program, thus, is also serving the Profession.
