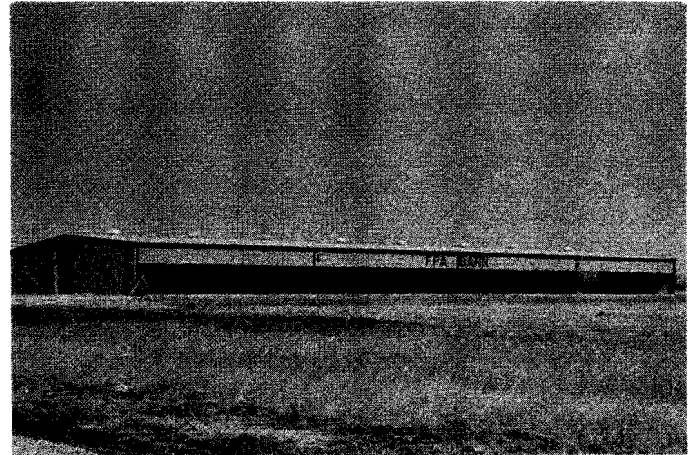

1981 WASHINGTON LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

The Washington Conference Program is operated by the National FFA. The conferences are designed for FFA Officers and Advisors to gain appreciation for our nation's great heritage and to participate in leadership and personal development workshops. This year the National FFA Alumni has offered twenty-four scholarships valued at \$225 each to cover the total registration fee for this conference. States are awarded one scholarship for each 500 active Alumni members. States receiving scholarships for 1981 are Wisconsin 9, Oklahoma 4, Ohio 3, Missouri 2, Illinois 2, Nebraska 1, Minnesota 1, Virginia 1, and Kansas 1.

OWASSO ALUMNI DEDICATED SHOW BARN



On February 27, the Owasso, Oklahoma, Alumni dedicated an 80- by 200-foot metal building on a 10-acre site. The barn will house FFA project animals and serve as a show arena for FFA events. The FFA Alumni received the land as a donation and raised over \$60,000 for the building. Owasso Alumni President, E. J. Cook, stated that everyone had an opportunity to be a part of this project. The Alumni members are now raising money for the construction of pens and stalls on their 10-acre site joining the Owasso High School.

SUMMER INTERN SELECTED

The FFA Alumni Committee on Government Summer Intern for 1981 will be Keith Coble from Missouri. After reviewing a number of excellent applicants, he was selected for this outstanding educational internship. The summer internship of eleven weeks is designed to give the intern experience with Congress, U. S. D. A., and the Department of Education. Congressman Wes Watkins of Oklahoma and Chairman of the Congressional Rural Caucus has cooperated with the FFA Alumni in allowing the intern to serve as a Rural Caucus intern on a part-time basis. This gives the Alumni intern the benefits of Congressional seminars and other Congressional educational activities. The FFA Alumni intern program has not only proven to be an outstanding educational activity but has given vocational agriculture additional visibility in Congress and around Washington, D. C.

FALL INTERN PROGRAM APPROVED

A fall intern program in the governmental affairs area for 1981 has been approved. The program will offer a \$750 scholarship to the individual selected to serve as the fall intern. The individual may receive college course credits for the intern activities. The intern program, starting in September, will be in cooperation with the Congressional Rural Caucus giving the intern all Congressional intern educational benefits. Anyone interested in the FFA Alumni fall intern program should contact the National FFA Alumni Office immediately. The Alumni Committee on Government hopes to make its selection by June 1.

NATIONAL COUNCIL VOTES TO GIVE MORE SCHOLARSHIPS

The National FFA Alumni Council voted at its last meeting to give one scholarship for each 250 active Alumni members in a local affiliate to cover the Washington Leadership Conference registration fee for an FFA member. The scholarship, presently valued at \$225, will be based on 1981 affiliate membership. The scholarships for affiliates are in addition to the ones being provided to State Associations.

FFA ALUMNI AFFILIATE IN ACTION

The Silver City, New Mexico, FFA Alumni Affiliate, chartered in September 1979, has accomplished many support activities. According to Chet Brown, their President, the following have been achieved. A one-acre tract of land was donated by Alumni members for FFA members to use for their livestock projects. Alumni and FFA members built pens, feed sheds, feeders and supplied water and fencing for this great support activity. The Alumni also raised approximately \$1,200 from a raffle to purchase a livestock tilt table for the FFA. The FFA and Alumni joined together to run the concession at the County Fair which gave another \$700 to the FFA. The FFA Alumni gave \$600 for the FFA delegation to attend the 1980 National FFA Convention and \$310 to their chaperon. This money was raised by the Alumni at a concession held each month at community ropings. Other activities have included providing refreshments for a local dance, providing two scholarships of \$200, sponsoring a surprise pizza party following the FFA caroling activity, assisting with judging of FFA contests, providing local awards and challenging the FFA to a baseball game. In summary Mr. Brown states, "We have had a most enjoyable and profitable year. We have exceeded our goals."

This affiliate is only one of hundreds of local affiliates which are proving the value of FFA Alumni support.

GRANTON FFA ALUMNI HELPS WITH FFA WEEK CELEBRATION

The 108 FFA Alumni at Granton, Wisconsin, sponsored an all-school assembly program featuring a live orchestra and called it "Fun After Farming." A half-hour dance followed the concert. This most unusual event was a great success, according to vocational agriculture instructor and FFA Alumni member, Francis Steiner.

ACTIVE AFFILIATE STATUS

A new constitutional amendment stipulates that local affiliates are eligible to maintain affiliation status provided they have at least ten paid national members. This constitutional amendment, approved last fall by a membership vote of 661 to 89, becomes effective this year. All affiliates not maintaining at least ten paid members (including life) will lose their affiliation with the National Association at the end of 1981.

States must maintain at least fifty members as established in this same constitutional amendment.

The non-profit tax exempt group exemption status offered to all active FFA Alumni chartered affiliates can only be extended to groups maintaining the above minimums.

ESTATE PLANNING

The disposition of your estate is primarily *under your control*. To plan your estate—outline your objectives.

Four objectives you might consider:

1. *Financial security* for the owner of the estate. You should carefully guard against moving into a position where insufficient assets are available for your current and future expected uses.
2. *Provide for* the orderly transfer of assets. While financial security is perhaps the overriding objective, the next generation should be provided an opportunity to take over the going business intact in an orderly fashion.
3. *Be equitable*. Equitable division does not necessarily mean equal division. Some heirs may have contributed much more than others to the creation of an estate, while others, due to age or some handicap, need special attention.
4. *Minimize death tax and probate costs*. Holding these costs to a minimum will result in the maximum conservation of the estate. Gifting can be a good tool to reduce the estate, thus lowering taxes, and promote the financial security of the donee.
