From the Desk of the EAD/ADFA

This past month, busy as usual, was marked by some innovative events here at the school. Given that around 40% of our full time faculty are age 60 years or more, we held a "Retirement Workshop" with a focus on how to think about and plan retirement, and what actually happens in the event. To start off, we heard from Dr. Sherry Queener, former Campus Dean for Graduate Education and now President of the Senior Academy, as to how retired faculty can maintain active links with the university and one another. The very next day, Drs. Chris Guba and David Brown hosted a calibration session designed specifically for clinical adjunct faculty. The attendance was impressive, and gratifying, as these colleagues participate as invaluable members of our educational team. They also provided extremely helpful feedback related to our clinical activity as it relates to the education and training of the future dental and dental hygiene workforce.

Dean Williams and I attended the annual ADEA Dental Deans' Conference in San Francisco. As customary, there was a fascinating array of presentations by national leaders in medical and dental education. New models of competency-based education, visions of health care to come, workforce modelling, science fiction come to light as technology in diagnosis, monitoring and treatment, and much more. As usual, such a meeting of deans and associate deans, hosted by ADEA staff and the Board of Directors, offers great opportunity for networking. In doing so, one theme emerged for me, through many intertwined conversations: that there are nationally many senior administrative posts (deans, associate/assistant dean, department chairs) for which well-qualified applicants are scarce. We need to be mindful of this as we proceed with our succession planning over the coming months and the next few years.

On the international front, Chancellor Paydar returned from a very successful visit to Tehran and the university with which IUSD is already in discussion. Not only does he want us to progress with our


joint conversations, but this has attracted the attention of The President's Office in Bloomington. Consequently, things may start to move even faster, global politics permitting.

Faculty Annual Summary Report

As the new year approaches so does the deadline for the Faculty Annual Summary Report (FASR). The submission date for the 2016 faculty activity report is **Friday, February 3, 2017 at 5:00 pm.**

Beginning this year, the Faculty Annual Summary Report will be completed using the **Digital Measures** reporting platform. Activity Insight can be accessed via One.IU at <https://one.iu.edu/>. First do a search for Activity Insight and then sign-in using your Central Authentication Service (CAS) log-in. Although the system is generally user-friendly and intuitive, it is a new one. As such, it will take a time to explore and navigate the system before uploading data. The good news is that once the data has been entered, it will not have to be entered again. To reduce stress in meeting the deadline, it is best to start sooner rather than later.

One approach to begin the process is to download and review the [Faculty Guide](#) and/or [View Tutorials](#) on how to enter data or [Manage Activities](#) in the major

sections of the report which include: General, Teaching, Research/Creative Activity, Service/Engagement and Supplemental.

There are several areas which are already populated with data from University systems. These include: Personal and Contact Information, Unit Affiliation-Yearly Data, IU Appointment Data, Courses for which you serve as the *Instructor of Record*, and Grants managed by Office of Research Administration for PIs and Co-PIs. The remaining data is input by the faculty member. Required documents to append in the supplemental section are your:

1. Curriculum Vitae
2. Individual Faculty Career Plan

Remember that the information provided by the faculty member is used in completing the Annual Review, which is an IUPUI mandated annual review for all faculty. This review is normally conducted by the principal administrative officer of the department in which the faculty member holds an appointment. The purpose of the annual review is to provide input on the faculty member's progress in the areas of teaching, research, and service, leading to the tenure review year

or, for non-tenure track faculty, to reappointment on a long-term contract and to promotion. Annual reviews also provide information for use in salary recommendations, awards or bonuses if offered, and providing reports to school, campus and university administration on faculty achievements.

[Trustees' Teaching Award 2017](#) information is available via this link. To be eligible for the award, the faculty member must complete the FASR by the deadline (February 3 by 5 pm) and append the required CV and Career Plan documents to the report as stated previously. Self and/or peer nominations will be accepted by e-mail notification to Shelley Hall shall@iu.edu on or before 5 pm on February 3rd.

The TTA honors individuals who have a positive impact on learning through the direct teaching of students. Award recipients must have demonstrated a sustained level of teaching excellence in the form of documented student learning and must have completed at least three years of service at IUPUI. Faculty who received this award in 2014 and 2015 are not eligible for the current award cycle. Each awardee will receive \$2,500 for the TTA.

Dr. Shaw Co-PI on NSF Grant



Chancellor Nasser Paydar is leading a \$4.8 million initiative to significantly increase the number of African Americans, Hispanic Americans and other historically underrepresented minorities in Indiana receiving baccalaureate degrees in science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Dr. Paydar serves as the principal investigator on the NSF grant with co-principal investigators Kim Nguyen, UCASE Director of Operations, School of Education; Pamela Shaw, Associate Dean, Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, School of Dentistry; Stephen Hundley, Senior Advisor to the Chancellor for Planning and Institutional Improvement from IUPUI and Patricia Lang, Acting Associate Dean of the Honors College from Ball State University.

The National Science Foundation awarded the grant to IUPUI as the lead institution of

the Indiana STEM Louis Stokes Alliance for Minority Participation, which was formed to achieve that goal. Other alliance partners are IU Bloomington, Ball State University, IU Northwest, IU South Bend and Ivy Tech Community College Indianapolis.

The alliance will implement an array of measures to double the number of STEM degrees awarded to minority students at alliance institutions from 295 in the baseline year 2013-14 to 590 in the fifth year of the initiative.

To achieve the 100 percent increase in the number of minority students earning STEM degrees, the alliance will apply three broad strategies:

- ⇒ Strengthen underrepresented minority students' academic preparation and disciplinary engagement.
- ⇒ Increase student retention and graduation.
- ⇒ Facilitate students' transition from community college to four-year institutions.

Those strategies will feature selected high-

impact practices, including mathematics placement and online review support, summer bridge programs, freshman learning communities, peer-mentoring programs, degree mapping, faculty-mentored research, and an annual research conference. The strategies target a key area that experts believe causes minority students, as well as others, to depart from STEM degree pathways: mathematics.

The alliance is committed to ensuring the minority STEM majors are assessed on their mathematical skills before enrollment and provided a structured, online math mentoring program.

The initiative is based on the National Science Foundation's Louis Stokes Alliances for Minority Participation program. The program provides funding to alliances that implement comprehensive, evidence-based, innovative and sustained strategies that ultimately result in the graduation of well-prepared, highly qualified students from underrepresented groups who pursue graduate studies or careers in STEM.



Dr. Thyvalikakath Develops App



Dr. Thankam Thyvalikakath, Associate Professor, IU School of Dentistry and the Regenstrief Institute has been in the [news](#) recently. Along with her former colleagues from the University of Pittsburgh, they developed and tested a novel mobile application enabling smartphones to capture and transmit images from inside the mouth, along with details on the dental emergency, to provide the information dentists need to make a decision on what and how urgently care is needed.

As we are keenly aware, dental emergencies often occur when dental offices are closed. Patients frequently turn to hospital emergency departments or urgent care centers. But most patients who go to these facilities are simply treated for their pain and referred to their dentist for proper care during office hours.

Seeking to improve emergency dental care, the researchers developed DentaCom, a cellphone application that enables dentists to make decisions when they cannot see the patient. "A Prototype Mobile Application for Triageing Dental Emergencies" was published in the October 2016 issue of [The Journal of the American Dental Association](#) and the app is featured on the issue's cover. The new app guides individuals with real or suspected dental emergencies through a series of questions designed to capture clinically meaningful data via familiar smartphone functions. In the study, all participants were able to complete a guided report on their dental emergency and take photos of the problem region within four minutes. All clinical infor-

mation was successfully entered by prospective patients via DentaCom.

Corey Stein, first author of the study and now a dental student at Western University of Health Sciences in California, initially conceived the idea of an app when he experienced a dental emergency. He received the American Dental Association's 2016 Robert H. Ahlstrom New Investigator Award for his work on DentaCom. In addition to Thyvalikakath and Stein, authors of the study are Xiang Xiao, Steven Levine, Titus K.L. Schleyer and Harry Hochheiser.

The study was funded in part by grants from several entities including the [National Institutes of Health](#), the [Lilly Endowment](#), the [Indiana Physician Scientist Initiative](#) and the [National Library of Medicine](#).

Congratulations to Dr. Thyvalikakath and her colleagues on developing this innovation to facilitate urgent care and treatment for dental patients.



Women's Leadership Conference



In October, Dr. Laura Romito, Associate Professor, Department of Biomedical & Applied Sciences, and Dr. Tawana Ware, Clinical Assistant Professor, Department of Pediatric Dentistry, attended the inaugural [Exceptional Executive Leadership for Women \(ExcEL\) Conference](#) sponsored by the Academy for Academic Leadership (AAL).

The ExcEL for Women Program was held at the Château Élan Winery & Resort in Braselton, Georgia. The competency-based program was attended by nearly thirty women leaders from academia and industry and was designed to offer structured training in personal and interpersonal leadership skills, diversity, administration, and active mentorship for participants seeking experience and exposure in executive positions. The event opened with a welcome dinner and presentation by AAL president, Dr. Karl Haden,

and was based on his book, *The 9 Virtues of Exceptional Leaders*. Following Dr. Haden's presentation, attendees listened to Georgia State Representative and House Minority Leader for the Georgia General Assembly Stacey Abrams, JD, share her personal and inspiring story of perseverance, resilience and growth as a leader, entrepreneur, and public servant.



Over the course of the interactive program, participants were able to self-reflect, learn from the experiences of other women leaders, share successes, and discuss in a safe environment the unique challenges that often are encountered by women in leadership roles. The facilitators for the 2016 ExcEL for Women program included Dr. Marcia Ditmyer, Assistant Dean of Assessment & Instruction and Associate Professor at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas School of Dental Medicine and AAL senior consultant; Dr. Val Gokenbach; and Dr. Felicia Tucker-Lively, Director of Professional Development for AAL. Dr. Tawana Ware, Clinical Assistant Professor, Department of Pediatric Dentistry, served on the inaugural advisory board for the event.

It's not often that one has the opportunity to set aside time specifically for personal reflection, learning and discussion about one's leadership skills, especially learning about, with and from other women who have been in significant executive roles. I was exposed to some new tools and ideas for further developing skills that can be applied in current and future roles," she said.

"It was such an honor to serve as a member of the inaugural advisory board for the ExcEL for Women Program which became a beneficial hands-on leadership workshop," Dr. Ware stated. "As a participant, I enjoyed the focus on utilizing competency-based approaches to truly evaluate both my personal and professional development while at the same time, creating plans for current and future career aspirations. 

DR. GEORGE K. STOOKEY TO RECEIVE 2017 GIES AWARD FOR INNOVATION



Dr. George K. Stookey, PhD, MS, is the recipient of the William J. Gies Award for Innovation in the Dental Educator category. The Gies Awards, named after dental education pioneer William J. Gies, Ph.D., debuted in 2008 and are the profession's preeminent recognition for individuals and organizations that exemplify the highest standards in oral health and dental education, research and leadership. The 2017 Gies Awards will be presented on March 20, 2017 at a highly anticipated ceremony to be held in conjunction with the [2017 ADEA Annual Session & Exhibition](#) in Long Beach, CA.

IU Distinguished Professor Emeritus George K. Stookey, one of the world's renowned leaders in the field of preventive dentistry, holds three IU degrees (BA'57, MSD'62, PhD '71) and received an honorary Doctor of Science degree from IU in 2014. IU awarded him the title of distinguished professor of preventive and community dentistry in 1998. Since retiring from IU in 2001, Stookey has continued to contribute to Indiana's economic development as president and CEO of Therametric Technologies, one of the first businesses in the IU Emerging Technologies Center in Indianapolis and now located in Noblesville, Indiana.



Faculty Recruitment Update

Facilitating succession planning conversations is one of the objectives within IUSD's Office of Faculty Affairs' 2015-2017 strategic goal of developing an intensive, selective leadership development program. As we close 2016 two newly posted positions are associated with that goal. In late November the search began for a chair for the department of Orthodontics and Oral Facial Genetics. Effective July 1, 2017, Dr. Katherine Kula will be stepping away from her current role as chair of the department in gradual

transition toward retirement on December 31, 2017. CAS Duo Log-in Required



Beginning January 3, 2017, all IU employees will be required to use two-step verification to log in to IU's Central Authentication Service, or CAS. Two-step login adds an extra layer of security in accessing your account and information.

To sign up for two-step login, you will first need to select your device. You can use a smartphone or tablet, a landline or simple phone, or a passcode key fob (Duo token). You will then enter in your device's information, and Duo will contact you one of

several ways: through push notifications from the Duo mobile app, phone calls or text messages, or you can generate login codes from the single-button Duo hardware token. If you choose to use the Duo app, it is available for free in both the iTunes and Google Play app stores. After downloading, follow the directions to set up two-step verification. For more information on the process of signing up for two-step login, see <https://access.iu.edu/twostep#how-it-works>.

Once you enroll in two-step login, you will receive a confirmation email. You can also find information on managing your devices at <https://access.iu.edu/twostep/Manage>. Be aware that if you are unable to login in to

two-step with Duo (e.g. your device is inoperable, lost, stolen, or not on your person) then the only support option will be for you to come in person to a campus walk-in Support Center and show a valid picture ID in order to regain access to your account. UITS support will not bypass the added security from Duo that you have enabled.

Face-to-face support for the two-step login will be provided on the IUPUI campus on December 2 from 10 am - 2 pm at the School of Liberal Arts, and on December 8 at the Business/SPEA building from 10 am - 3 pm. IUSD Building News



The Fritts Clinical Center is starting to take shape and actually is beginning to look like a build-

ing now that the concrete basement and crawlspace foundation have been poured. The builders have created an enclosure for the duct work with utility connections underway to tie into utilities on Michigan and Vermont Streets as well as our current

building. Much more steel will be arriving this month with the contractors planning to erect as much as is possible over the coming winter months. With the mild weather thus far, considerable progress can still be made.

Work on Michigan Street is underway, evidenced by the big barriers blocking the northeast and north entrances to the dental school. Access to the building continues to be a challenge with the options narrowing to the west and south entrances.

Internal renovation of room 245 continues, which includes a complete modern makeover and a full smart-technology upgrade. The room 245 project completion is expected by the end of January.

The Phase II Redesign planning is in its initial stages and will continue through the first quarter of 2017. Faculty, staff and students are generating ideas for reallocation and repurposing of the space. As the Dean likes to say, change is the only constant.

IUSD Retirement Program



In an effort to assist IUSD faculty to prepare for retirement, Dr. Michael Kowolik, Executive Associate Dean, Associate Dean for Faculty Affairs and Associate Dean for Global Engagement, hosted the inaugural IUSD Retirement Program on November 4, 2016 in DS 114. Joining Dr. Kowolik and the Office of Faculty Affairs were Emerita Professor, Dr. Sherry Queener, President of the Senior Academy, Sue Dukeman, University Benefits Office and five retired School of Dentistry faculty. The returning faculty included Dr. Chris Miller, Dr. Sue Hovijitra, Dr. Jim McDonald, Dr. Arden Christen and Professor Evelyn Oldsen. The returning faculty represented several different departments within the school including Oral Biol-

ogy (now Biomedical and Applied Sciences), Prosthodontics and Periodontics and Allied Dental Programs. More than 30 individuals attended the program.

The session began with a presentation by President of the Senior Academy, Dr. Queener. The [Senior Academy](#) hosts a number of events such as the Last Lecturer and provides many other opportunities for retired faculty to remain engaged in University life and activities.

Ms. Sue Dukeman, Retirement Plan Consultant, University Retirement Program Services, IU Bloomington, provided information on the many retirement plans and other benefits that are available to faculty. A robust panel discussion, moderated by Dr. Kowolik, followed the initial presentations. Each panelist provided an opening

statement and addressed some or all of the following points in their remarks.

- ⇒ How and when did you decide to retire and how far in advance?
- ⇒ What were your plans in specific or general, or did you have no plans?
- ⇒ How did things work out; as planned or differently than expected?
- ⇒ What advice would you give those thinking about retiring from IUSD?

There was unanimous agreement that retirement is worth working for and that maintaining one's health is important to its enjoyment. Another common piece of advice was to find what you are really passionate about and enjoy doing.
