Announcement

THE INDIANA DENTAL COLLEGE conducted its Sixteenth Annual Session in the new building recently erected by the College for its own use. A year's trial has proven that this building is perfectly adapted to the purpose of dental education. The three large lecture rooms furnish facilities for didactic work for each class at the same hour, a feature which the adherence to a graded course makes eminently desirable.

The EQUIPMENT of the College makes it one of the most complete institutions of the kind in the country. Additional Cycloid chairs were added to the operating room of the Infirmary this year, and that department is now fully furnished to care for all clinical work that presents. The operating room is 140 feet long. The windows of 80 feet of that distance face the north, the balance east and south, giving the best light for afternoon work that can be obtained. The Mechanical Laboratory is large and commodious and is equipped with electric motors for running the lathes.

The appurtenances of the Microscopical Laboratory were largely increased during the past session. Ten new monocular microscopes, and the latest form of micro-organism culture boxes, and wet and dry ster-

ilizing ovens have been added to the department. Every facility is now afforded for conventional and original investigation. The facilities for teaching Operative and Prosthetic Techniques are all that can be desired. The laboratory for this work is well lighted and thoroughly equipped.

The College has twenty-five or thirty disarticulated skeletons that are used by the students in the study of osteology.

A large stereopticon and a valuable collection of slides are used in the courses on anatomy, physiology, operative dentistry, and pathology. The other departments are maintaining their former high standard.

The COLLEGE is situated in the business center of the city, a little more than a block from the post-office and convenient to all the car lines. Indianapolis has all of the advantages of the large cities and but few of their disadvantages. It has a wide reputation as an orderly, law-abiding municipality and is as free from vice as any city of its size in the country.

The CLINICS at the Indiana Dental College are ample for all. There are 150,000 people within a radius of five miles from the College, from whom the bulk of the clinical material is derived. Some clinics come to the College from adjoining counties. The Indiana Dental College is the only Dental College within a hundred miles of Indianapolis, and hence there is no competition for clinical material.

BOARD may be obtained within five minutes' walk of the College for from \$3 to \$4.50 per week, according to the size and situation of the room and the elaborateness of the table.

The Indianapolis Public Library, the State Library at the State-House, and the Indiana Dental College Library are open to students.

This College belongs to the National Association of Dental Faculties, and conforms to all its rules and regulations.

The course extends over three scholastic years, viz.: First, or Freshman; Second, or Junior; Third, or Senior.

The seventeenth annual session will begin on Tuesday, September 24, 1895, and will close during the last week in March, 1896.



Requirements for Admission

First or Freshman Year.

A candidate for admission who has received a collegiate degree, or passed the matriculate examination of a recognized college, or who has a certificate from a normal, high, or grammar school, or a teacher's certificate, properly attested, may matriculate without examination.

A preliminary examination in the common English branches will be required of all other candidates for matriculation. This examination will include an essay of not less than 200 words, as a test for Spelling, Grammar, and Penmanship, and questions on Arithmetic, History, and Geography. The object of the examination is to test the candidate's mental fitness for the study of dentistry.

Second or Junior Year.

Students will be admitted to the second year course who present properly signed and indorsed "Intermediate Certificates" of attendance on the first year course at any reputable, recognized dental college.

A diploma from a reputable medical college will entitle its holder to enter the second or Junior class

in this College. Graduates in medicine are excused from attendance upon the lectures and examinations on general anatomy, chemistry, and physiology.

Graduates of reputable pharmaceutical schools and undergraduates of reputable medical colleges who have completed one or more years' study, will be admitted to the second or Junior class subject to the usual examinations of that grade.

Third or Senior Year.

Students will be admitted to the third, or Senior grade who present properly signed and indorsed "Intermediate Certificates" of attendance on the second year course at any reputable, recognized dental college.

Requirements for Graduation.

The candidate for graduation must be of legal age and of good moral character; he, or she, must have attended the third, or Senior year at this College; must show the requisite proficiency in practical operative and prosthetic dentistry; and lastly the candidate must pass satisfactory examinations in the various branches of study.

Tuition and Diploma Fees.

The tuition fee is \$100.00 per year. This includes matriculation fee, dissecting fee, chemical laboratory fee and lecture tickets. There are no extras. The diploma fee, payable not later than March 1st, of the third year, is \$25.00. This is returned in case the student does not graduate. The tuition fee is due in full when the student matriculates. For the benefit of those who wish to take advantage of it, the college will accept \$50.00 down and \$50.00 not later than December 1st. After December 1st \$5.00 is added to the amount of tuition due, and in no case will a student be given a diploma or an intermediate certificate at the close of the year unless all fees are paid.

The doors of this college have ever been open to women and some of our brightest students have been of the gentler sex.

Visiting dentists are always cordially welcomed at the college. It will be a pleasure to show all callers through the various departments.

When You Arrive

At the Union Station, Indianapolis, leave your trunk at the depot, take either the College avenue or Pennsylvania street car and tell the conductor to let you off at Ohio street. One block to the right, on Ohio street, will bring you to the corner of Delaware and Ohio, and to the college building.
