To the casual observer, it must have looked as if IU School of Dentistry faculty members were heading in every direction as they hustled in small groups from one seminar room to the next at the Canyon Inn during the **23rd Annual Teaching Conference** at McCormick's Creek State Park. But all had their sights set on one common goal: To improve communication at the School of Dentistry.

During the two-day Conference near Spencer, Indiana, in September, 110 faculty members and representatives from the staff and student body tackled some of the communication problems that are typical in any organization as large and complex as the dental school, and looked for solutions together. With the theme **"What We Have Here Is a Failure to Communicate,"** the program featured keynote speaker **Dr. Gerald C. Preusz**, IU associate professor of education and of instructional development at IUSD, and introduced three major topics for discussion: Interdepartmental Patient Care, by **Dr. Carl W. Newton**, chairman of endodontics; Intercampus Communication, by **Dr. Robert A. Moon**, director of dental auxiliary education at IU-Northwest; and Responding to Recent Advances in Research, by **Dr. Ralph W. Phillips**, research professor of dental materials and **Dr. George K. Stookey**, associate dean for research and director of the Oral Health Research Institute.

Participants were divided into six groups for the afternoon workshops that followed. On day two of the Conference, workshop results were reported by **Drs. Newton, Michael L. Stropes, Bruce E. Johnson, Jack E. Schaaf, Cecil E. Brown, Jr.,** and **Professor Charles J. Palenik.** A response from Dean H. William Gilmore to suggestions and recommendations made by the faculty in the workshops will be forthcoming in the winter.

The highlight of this year's banquet was speaker **Dr. Joe Wick**, minister, world traveler--and superbly funny entertainer. The IUSD Teaching Committee, chaired by **Dr. Chris H. Miller**, has put together yet another outstanding Conference for the School of Dentistry. Secretary/Treasurer **Ms. Drew Beck** deserves special credit for tending to the many details involved in the ongoing success of this annual event.

A Helping Hand From Hygiene

When the Oral Health Research Institute initiated its largest ever adult clinical study last summer, the School of Dentistry dental hygiene clinic was the site of much of the activity. According to **Dr. Bradley B. Beiswanger**, associate professor of preventive dentistry, the researchers administered prophylaxes to 1,534 research subjects in the dental hygiene clinic, in addition to another 300 in the OHRI facilities. The story developed this way.

EXCELLENCE IN DENTAL EDUCATION

Faced with the time constraints of the program sponsor and the Institute's limited clinical facilities, the researchers turned to **Dr. Sybil Niemann**, director of dental auxiliary education, and **Prof. Evelyn Oldsen**, director of dental hygiene, for assistance. They offered not only the use of the clinic, but also the help of the dental hygiene faculty, who worked on the project part-time. Because of dental hygiene's assistance, the project had well over the minimum required number of subjects. In a letter of thanks to Dr. Niemann and Prof. Oldsen, Dr. Beiswanger said, "I believe this project is exemplary of the good work that can be accomplished when a spirit of cooperation exists between clinical and research disciplines."

45th Alumni Gathering A Winner on the Bloomington Campus

Sunshine, summer temperatures, and a hint of fall colors in the foliage provided the perfect backdrop for the Indiana University School of Dentistry Alumni Association's **45th Annual Fall Dental Conference**, held at IU-Bloomington September 24-26. With Alumni Association President **Charles E. Smith**, associate professor of pediatric dentistry, leading the way, nearly 500 Conference registrants (including alumni members with families, friends, and other supporters of IU) took part in a host of activities during the three-day conference, which featured golf and tennis, banquets and brunches, football tips from IU **Coach Bill Mallory**, and a large portion of up-to-the-minute information about dentistry.


During the Continuing Education Program, presented by C.E. Director **Donald E. Arens**, a panel of experts on finance and tax laws, including IU Professor of Law **Thomas F. Sheehan**, discussed a wide variety of topics in a program entitled, "A Structured Practice Is a Successful Practice." Five IUSD faculty members presented the Saturday Morning Round Tables to a large group of alumni, as follows: **Dr. Carl W. Newton**, How to Evaluate Advances in Endodontic Technology; **Dr. James C. Setcos**, Latest Techniques in Posterior Composite Restorations; **Dr. E. Brady Hancock**, Treatment of Hypersensitivity with Iontophoresis; **Dr. Carl J. Andres**, Advances in Prosthodontics; and **Dr. Timothy J. Carlson**, Repairing Porcelain Restorations.

More than 400 people attending the Annual Banquet--the Conference's main event--helped to honor this year's award recipients. Distinguished Alumnus awards went to **Dr. Ralph G. Schimmele**, IUSD associate dean for program development and extramural programs (Class of 1952); and **Dr. George A. Welch**, a private practitioner in Rockville, Indiana, and 1951 graduate. Recognized for Distinguished Service were **Dr. Robert L. Bogan**, IUSD associate dean for student affairs (Class of 1954); and former Indiana University Director of Alumni Affairs **Frank B. Jones**. **Dr. Ralph W. Phillips**, IUSD research professor of dental materials, received the Distinguished Faculty award; and **Dr. Gary M. Ingersoll**, IU associate professor of education, was recognized as Honorary Alumnus. At the brunch the following morning, Certificates of Appreciation were presented to **Ms. Gloria H. Huxoll**, IU assistant professor of dental education on the Fort Wayne campus and dental hygiene graduate of 1952; and **Dr. James W. Huckelberry**, a retired Indianapolis practitioner and member of the Class of 1924.

The alumni put a cap on the 45th Annual Conference by heading over to the IU Football Stadium to root for the mighty Hoosiers, who defeated the Missouri Tigers 20-17.

**Dr. Tim Carlson
Gets to the Root of the Matter
With IUPUI Young Scholars**

For the fourth consecutive summer **Dr. Timothy J. Carlson**, associate professor of operative dentistry, directed the dental section of the Young Scholars Program, a special course of study offered last July to youngsters in grades four to 10. The annual event, sponsored by the IUPUI Honors Program, gives talented students an opportunity to explore a wide variety of topics covered in 10-day sessions.

"Getting to the Root of the Matter," the title of Dr. Carlson's course, included lectures by several IUSD faculty members and hands-on experience in a laboratory. As in past years, the fabricating of "vampire" teeth was a popular assignment. Other classes presented around campus included such subjects as engineering, Roman history, stagecraft, and Russian folklore.

People in the News

Dr. Raffi H. Margossian, a 1986 graduate of IUSD's three-year program in maxillofacial prosthetics and currently an advanced standing student in the predoctoral program, has won second place in the annual research paper competition of the American Academy of Maxillofacial Prosthetics. His paper, "Tarnish and Corrosion of Dental Alloys in Simulated Oral Conditions of Normal Patients and Patients Who Have Received Radiation Therapy," is based on his thesis research for the Master of Science in Dentistry degree in maxillofacial prosthetics, under the direction of Dr. Varoujan A. Chalian. The award includes a cash prize of \$500 and an opportunity for Dr. Margossian to present his paper at the Academy's annual meeting in San Diego in October.

Dr. Ralph W. Phillips, research professor of dental materials, has been named to the editorial board of the American Journal of Dentistry, a new publication appearing this fall. Edited by Dr. Franklin Garcia-Godoy of the University of Texas Department of Pediatric Dentistry, the Journal will provide general practitioners with articles of clinical relevance. Dr. Phillips has also been appointed to a new Editorial Board of Review for the Journal of the American College of Dentists, which is expanding its size and scope to include refereed scientific manuscripts.

Dr. James C. Setcos, assistant professor of dental materials (and amateur photographer par excellence), has had one of his more unusual photographs published on the cover of Dental Abstracts. Dr. Setcos used a light-diffraction lens to capture sunlight through trees for the photo, which was used as the cover on the August 1987 issue.

Dr. Rosario H. Potter, professor of oral facial genetics and director of Dental Biometry and Research Computing, has been appointed to the National Institutes of Health Special Review Committee for Research Centers by the National Institute of Dental Research (NIDR), as one of 15 scientists recruited throughout the United States and Canada. The Committee met at the NIH compound in Bethesda, Maryland, in September to judge grant requests for eight Periodontal Diseases Research Centers, with a total request of \$20 million for five years. The grant applicants defended their applications at the meeting. Dr. Potter reviewed the statistics, epidemiology, and genetic aspects of the applications.

Dr. Potter was also in Washington D.C. last July as an invited NIH reviewer of 15 SBIR (Small Business Innovative Research) grants that are related to dental research and dental clinical practice, at a total request of \$750,000 for six months.

Mr. J. Barry Howell, an IUSD fourth year dental student and Seventh District trustee for the American Student Dental Association, was one of the speakers at the Second National Conference on Chemical Dependency in the Dental Profession, sponsored by the American Dental Association in Chicago August 31-September 1. Representing ASDA, Barry discussed the importance of reaching out to chemically dependent dental students through a joint effort by the ASDA and ADA organizations. A photograph of Barry accompanied a recent article on the Conference in ADA News.

Faculty practitioners of the extramural program from around the state attended the Biennial Summer Seminar, held in July at the dental school and directed by **Dr. Ralph G. Schimmele**, associate dean for program development and extramural programs. School of Dentistry participants included Dr. Robert L. Bogan, associate dean for student affairs (who spoke on recruitment and admissions); Dr. Jack E. Schaaf, associate professor of dental diagnostic sciences and director of special patient care (infectious disease clinic); Dr. Steven L. Bricker, chairman of dental diagnostic sciences (diagnostic services); Dr. Charles J. Goodacre, chairman of prosthodontics (fixed prosthodontics); and Dr. George K. Stookey, associate dean for research and director of the Oral Health Research Institute (current concepts in caries control).

Dr. Maynard K. Hine, chancellor emeritus of IUPUI and former dean of our dental school (1945-1968), recently returned to Tuscola, Illinois, to be inducted into the newly established Tuscola High School Hall of Fame. He is a 1925 graduate of the school. Dr. Hine was cited for professional excellence reflecting credit to the school and community.

Dr. Donnell C. Marlin, assistant professor of dental diagnostic sciences, has been awarded the first Certificate in Forensic Dentistry to be issued by the Indiana University School of Dentistry. Dr. Marlin has also passed the American Board of Forensic Odontology examination sponsored by the American Academy of Forensic Sciences.

A delegation of professors from Pontificia Universidade Catolica do Rio Grande do Sul, in Porto Alegre, Brazil, visited the Indiana University School of Dentistry and the IUPUI Department of Psychology in July. The group, hosted by **Dr. James R. Roche**, IUSD associate dean for academic affairs, and Dean H. William Gilmore, included teachers from the Brazilian University's dental school and psychology department. During their 10-day stay, the visitors conducted a scientific observation of clinical departments and participated in an exchange of information and experiences with many IU faculty members.

IUSD faculty members were among the dentists who participated in a local television broadcast, "**Ask the Experts**," aired on Channel 13's evening news last July. Helping to answer questions called into the TV station by viewers were **Dr. Steven L. Bricker**, chairman of dental diagnostic sciences; **Dr. A. George Wagner**, chairman, section of complete denture prosthodontics; and **Dr. Henry M. Swenson**, professor of periodontics. The panel fielded questions during the news program and for several hours afterward. According to Dr. Bricker, approximately 250 phone calls covered a large number of areas relating to dentistry. Many callers were interested in knowing when dental treatment should begin for their children. The evening of questions and answers was part of a series presented by Channel 13 last summer that included similar call-in shows for law and medicine.

Dean's Message

With a new academic year under way all is going very well, even though we still have a ways to go with the remodeling. IUSD's students, faculty, and staff are to be commended for making the best of all the inconveniences and hardships associated with redesigning of the SB05 laboratory. As soon as the lab and locker rooms are painted--one of the few remaining touches--our spirits should lift. We extend a warm welcome to the latest addition to the 1121 West Michigan family: The Class of 1991. For the first time in many years the first year dental class is calling the dental school "home" instead of the Medical Science building. We look forward to an enjoyable year and having these students with us on a full-time basis.

Plans have been made to upgrade the dental school facility on a regular schedule. The hallways and patient reception areas are targeted for redesign-

ing, repainting, and new furniture. We need to make our building "user friendly" to complement IUSD's quality care of patients and to accommodate the additional traffic created by housing the first year dental students.

I am pleased to report that the first round of immunization for hepatitis has been completed. A total of 156 faculty and staff members who are considered at risk received their first injection of the hepatitis B vaccine in the Department of Dental Diagnostic Sciences. Special appreciation goes to **Professor Charles Palenik** and the Infection Control Committee. **Ms. Virginia Stratton** of the Student-Employee Health Service directed the immunizations. It is the policy of numerous health care organizations to immunize at-risk employees for hepatitis, and all faculty and staff must comply with the guidelines as a condition of employment.


The annual student picnic was held at our home in September. All predoctoral and auxiliary students were invited for an afternoon of fun and food. The picnic has been valuable for acquainting students with the **American Student Dental Association** and recruiting them as members. Last year an impressive 94.6 percent of the predoctoral students at Indiana University were ASDA members--a percentage we hope to continue this year. Joining ASDA is an important step for every dental student in becoming a dental professional.

The new president of Indiana University, **Dr. Thomas Ehrlich**, visited the School of Dentistry soon after assuming his duties. We presented the mission of our School and its programs to him. Dr. Ehrlich has pledged support to the dental school and has been actively communicating with faculty and students throughout the IU system. We are fortunate to have the energetic leadership of President Ehrlich.

On the national front, conservative estimates predict a doubling of the gross national product by 1995. By then the country will have survived a renaissance in business and entrepreneurship at all levels of commerce. This is a dramatic change for the country's population--the people we in the dental profession are serving. There are many adaptations that will be needed in dental education and Indiana's faculty and staff must be prepared for the challenges.

Dental School Family Plays Big Part In Pan Am Razzle-Dazzle

When 4,453 athletes from 38 countries came to town last summer for the 10th Pan American Games, the IUPUI campus rose to the myriad challenges. A total of 23 venues throughout Marion County and at other locations in the state were attended by an estimated 947,000 people. From August 9 to August 23, young men and women of varying sizes and shapes cycled, spiked, lobbed, jabbed, parried, whacked, slam dunked, hammered, rowed, stroked, and somersaulted their way to bronze, silver, and gold medals. IUPUI's first-rate facilities offered excellent sites for nine of the 30 sports, including the IU Natatorium (diving, swimming, synchronized swimming and water polo) and the Track and Field Stadium; the Indianapolis Sports Center (tennis); and the IUPUI Athletic Fields (softball) and Gymnasium (judo and taekwondo).




With only the student parking lot and New York Street (lined with parrot-colored banners) standing between the dental school and the Track and Field, the School seemed very much in the thick of the action. Our building was prominently displayed in the background on national television during CBS coverage of Carl Lewis' attempt to break Bob Beamon's world record for the long jump. (Carl jumped short of Beamon's 29-2½, but far enough at 28-8½ to set a new Pan American record.)

Many people with ties to the dental school had parts to play in the Pan Am production.

Dr. Ricardo Kriebel-Coronado, a 1981 graduate of the IUSD prosthodontics program who practices in San Jose, Costa Rica, returned to Indianapolis to coach his nation's tennis team. With a dismal Pan Am history of just one silver medal, earned in soccer in the 1950s, the Costa Rican delegation hoped at best that Silvia Poll might win a medal in swimming this year. They got their wish--and then some! Silvia won eight medals, three of them gold. Then other athletes won a silver in the marathon, two bronze in roller skating, and even Dr. Kriebel's tennis team captured a bronze in the men's doubles. The thoroughly astonished Dr. Kriebel, who has been a top seeded tennis player in Costa Rica himself, assured his old friends at the IU dental school that there would be much to celebrate back home--and lots to remember about the trip to Indianapolis.

Many employees of the dental school joined the ranks of some 38,000 volunteers in Indiana who put Hoosier Hospitality in high gear to welcome

and assist the visitors. **Drew Beck** and **Libby Strain**, of the library staff, were two of 20,000 volunteers who formed a card section for the dazzling (and nationally televised) Pan Am opening ceremonies. Performing before a sell-out crowd at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, Drew and Libby sat alongside the 600-foot stage where a spectacular parade of singers and dancers entertained, and right across from Vice President George Bush. As part of the "advanced" card section (those who attended a pre-performance practice), Drew and Libby helped "flash" pictures of Mickey Mouse, Amigo, the Pan Am Torch, and a waving American Flag.

Also on opening day the **School of Dentistry**, along with the Pan American Health Organization, sponsored a Symposium on Oral Facial Trauma in Relation to Sports. Speakers included Dr. G.M. Gillespie, of the Pan American Health Organization's Regional Dental Administration; Dr. I. Lawrence Kerr, of the Committee on Dental Health, U.S. Olympic Committee; Dr. John R. Hildebrandt, Chief Dental Consultant, U.S. Olympic Training Center, Colorado Springs; Ms. Marge Albohm, Athletic Trainer and Coach, International Institute of Sports Medicine, Indianapolis; **Dr. Kenneth J. Spolnik**, IUSD assistant professor of endodontics; and **Dr. R. Dale Lentz** (Class of 1967), an Indianapolis oral and maxillofacial surgeon.

Fort Benjamin Harrison was transformed into the Pan American Village, home for 5,400 athletes, trainers and coaches. The Village was staffed by 3,000 volunteers, including about 60 dentists, dental hygienists and dental assistants (headed by Dr. Lentz, and by **Ms. Marsha Strong** and **Ms. Vicki Bowen**, of the IUSD faculty), who cared for the villagers in a mobile dental unit. The PAX/I Dental Care Committee, of the PAX/I Medical Services Division, was chaired by **Dr. Larry Ryan**, IUSD associate professor of dental practice administration. The provision of dental care at the Village was a joint effort: The Indiana State Board of Health supplied

the mobile unit, which was equipped by Ryker's Dental Depot and stocked with School of Dentistry supplies. All volunteer dentists were members of the Indianapolis District Dental Society.

A total of 174 patients from 31 countries were treated at the Village, plus eleven at the dental school and two in private practice. Ironically, the only significant sports-related dental injury reported during the month was not received by a Pan Am athlete, but by Dr. Larry Ryan, Dental Care Committee chairman, who fractured his cheekbone in a softball game the day of Pan Am opening ceremonies!

Dr. Gregory C. Bell, an IUSD 1961 graduate and former Olympic gold medalist, helped dedicate the Pan Am Plaza downtown, and was featured speaker at a brunch organized by the U.S. Olympic Committee at the Radisson Hotel. He remembers Wilma Rudolph, the former track star who lighted the torch at this year's opening ceremonies, when she was a "15 year old kid" competing, as he did, in the 1956 Olympics in Australia.

Ms. Shirley Shazer, of dental diagnostic sciences, spent her time volunteering as an official greeter at Indianapolis International Airport. Donning the greeter uniform of red coat and white culottes and polishing up on her "smattering" of Spanish, Shirley smiled, waved, chatted, and saw to it that our visitors' first impressions of the city were good ones. During one of her 12 shifts (4½ hours each), Shirley met former Olympic gymnast Bart Conner, who arrived to announce the games for CBS.

A top priority among Pan Am organizers was making sure that English and Spanish speaking participants saw "eye to el ojo" on all matters pertaining to the games. The Pan American Events and Language Program Office on the IUPUI campus certified more than 2,000 Spanish speakers. **Dr. Carlos Munoz-Viveros**, IUSD assistant professor of prosthodontics and dental materials, was among them. Formerly of Colombia and fluent in both languages, Dr. Munoz applied to become an official volunteer of PAX/I's interpreter corps. One of his assigned locations as an interpreter was the PAX/I control center, where he joined the "Flying Eagles," a group on call to go "anywhere, anytime." One of his duties was to escort Cuba's band, who played in the disco at the international zone of the Village. The group was supposed to be returned to their hotel at 10 pm, but they were enjoying themselves so much that it was more like 2:30 am before Dr. Munoz wrapped that assignment.

Ms. Julie LeHunt, of dental diagnostic sciences, issued badges at several centers around town and also acted as messenger at the fencing bouts. Julie says that she used plenty of gesturing to get her messages across. Her college background as a voice major helped her figure out some of what was being said, but did not prepare her sufficiently for the Peruvian weightlifter who indicated (through an interpreter) that he wanted to purchase her waist-length hair!

Many other members of the dental school family, too numerous to mention here, participated in some fashion in the 10th Pan American Games. Most will never forget the experience. The city of Indianapolis, and the state of Indiana, will always be able to look back on the Summer of 1987 with much pride, thanks to the tireless efforts of thousands of volunteers, like those from the dental school.

Gets Second Glances
In Dean's Office**

When the Office of the Dean was spruced up this summer, a table lamp given to the School of Dentistry by **Dr. Delmar Faun** ('27) several years ago was moved from the dean's inner office to the busy reception area. 

Nation's Top 20 Lecturers Include 3 With Indiana Ties

In search of the "most informative and dynamic lecturers on the dental circuit" today, 40 editorial advisers of DENTIST magazine and fellows of the Academy of General Dentistry cast their votes in a DENTIST survey, thus compiling an impressive list of national speakers. Our own **Dr. Ralph W. Phillips**, IUSD research professor of dental materials, came in near the top. Ranking Number Four on the list of 20, Dr. Phillips was cited for his presentations on dental materials. (Dr. Gordon Christensen, of Provo, Utah, Dr. Burton Press, of San Francisco, and Dr. Ronald Jordon, of London,

Ontario, were the top three.)

Two other professionals with Indiana University backgrounds also showed up on the list of the country's best presenters. **Dr. James Cottone**, a faculty member at the University of Texas in San Antonio, was voted ninth for his presentations on infectious diseases. He received the M.S. degree in oral diagnosis/oral medicine from Indiana University in 1977. Sixteenth on the list was **Dr. Franklin Weine**, of Chicago, for his lectures on endodontics. He earned an M.S.D. degree at Indiana in endodontics in 1966.

Back Home Again in Indiana

Pursuing a career in dentistry has been in the back of **Bud Healey's** mind for some time--about 20 years to be exact--ever since he was a 15-year-old kid working after school and on Saturdays at the Indiana University Preventive Dentistry Research Institute (now the Oral Health Research Institute). Although he has followed a different route from most of his classmates, Bud Healey has finally arrived at 1121 West Michigan Street, and he looks forward to life as a dental student at Indiana U.

Bud is the son of **Dr. Maurice J. Healey**, a faculty member at IUSD from 1960 until 1973 and a member of the Class of 1925, the first group to graduate from the IU School of Dentistry after Indiana Dental College was purchased by the state. Dr. Healey died this past summer in Sun City Center, Florida, where he had moved after retiring from IU. Dr. Healey was the brother of **Dr. Harry Healey**, long-time chairman of endodontics who retired in 1972, and died in 1979.

It was Bud's dad who fixed up his teenage son with a job at the PDRI. "I wanted a car, but dad said I had to work for it," Bud says. In those days the Institute was located in the dental school basement, and there Bud tackled a variety of assignments--not all of them routine. He once helped out with a fluoride study that involved examining contents of babies' diapers collected from around the state. As the one who removed the contents and placed them into an oven for baking, Bud quickly found his popularity on the wane in the basement. "They decided to move me to a more remote area of the building while I was working on that assignment," he says with a laugh.

Bud spent his earnings on a 1968 Camaro convertible, which he still owns today and takes for a spin on occasion.

After graduating from Brebeuf preparatory school Bud headed for Bloomington to enroll in pre-dent classes. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in biology in 1974, but delayed decisions about dental school, returning instead to the OHRI, where he worked in clinical research under Dr. Bradley Beiswanger for the next five years. "We were doing Crest tests for Procter and Gamble then," Bud says. "While dentists examined children in schools around the state, I x-rayed them and gave topical fluoride treatments, and hauled equipment from one site to the next."

During his childhood Bud lived for awhile with his family in Biloxi, Mississippi, and he missed being near the water. He pulled up stakes and took off for Florida's west coast, and eventually wound up near Miami. During the next four years he held jobs as sales representative for a sporting goods manufacturer; sight-seeing guide pulling a coach of tourists up and down the Florida coast; and manager of a Miami Beach Burger King.

Never one to shy away from the unknown or the untried, Bud landed in Palmetto, Florida, and decided to put in a bid to rent a bait shop and restaurant located on a 400-foot pier in nearby Bradenton. "I went to the City Council meeting with my sealed bid," Bud recalls, "with no idea of what I was getting myself into. I didn't even know how much business I would have to do to cover my rent." As luck(?) would have it, Bud was high bidder. Dealing with live shrimp and blue crabs became his next career challenge. Opening day was memorable. "The power went off," Bud says, "all of the shrimp and crabs died and all of the food in the refrigerator spoiled." The shrimp tanks remained a never-ending source of worry. "I had to circulate water out of the bay into the tanks to keep the shrimp alive. The pipes were constantly getting plugged up with moss. Fortunately, I'm a scuba diver and could take care of problems myself without having to call someone in."

Snafus aside, Bud remembers his 2½ years at "Bud Healey's Bait and Tackle" fondly. With three employees to help, Bud stayed open seven days a week from 7 am until 11 pm. He cooked, waited tables (the restaurant seated 55), mopped floors, cleaned bathrooms, and repaired rods and reels. A trailer park next door was full of retirees from the Midwest who often pitched in as volunteers when the shop got busy.

One day Bud paid a visit to Florida vacationers Melissa Mau, an OHRI employee, and her mother, now Ruth Buchanan, who was a telephone pager for the School of Dentistry. "I told them that I wished I had gone to dental school," Bud says. "Ruth said, 'You still can.' Something clicked. Even though the thought had been the furthest thing from my mind that morning, I began looking into the possibilities of returning to school right away."

He gave up the bait shop and enrolled in courses in speech, business, psychology and chemistry to show IU he could adapt to student life again. He interviewed at IU in fall of 1986--then hoped...and waited.

A phone call came from his old boss and pal Brad Beiswanger, who asked him if he had \$100. "I couldn't figure out why he wanted to borrow a hundred bucks from me. Then Brad said: 'You've been accepted into dental school and that's what it costs to reserve a place in the class.'" Bud was elated.

Now, six weeks into his four-year program at IU and with several tests already under his belt, Bud feels good about his decision to come to dental school and isn't letting the age gap come between him and his classmates. (He's the one who held the party after the recent histology exam.) "Once in awhile I get reminders that I'm of a different generation," Bud says with a smile. "Not long ago a bunch of us were sitting around and somebody began talking about a big concert coming up in Indianapolis. One guy said 'U2' and I, thinking he said, 'You, too?' responded, 'No, I'm not going.' "

Bud says that his father, who was still living when Bud was accepted into dental school, never pushed him toward a career in dentistry. "He was all for it when he learned I had been accepted, but he always told me as I was growing up, 'Do what you want to do.'" It's clear that Bud has been following his dad's advice all along.


