"Lynn's life was art. She loved to paint," shared Clifford Hull, Thomsen's husband. "When I learned about the opportunity to create a scholarship in her memory, I knew this was something Lynn would have wanted." Thomsen passed away in January 2008 at the age of 50.

Hull established the Lynn Thomsen Outstanding Artist RISE Memorial Scholarship to recognize Thomsen's artistic accomplishments. Introduced in Fall 2010, this is Herron's first RISE scholarship and will benefit students enrolled in Herron's painting program.

Herron Honors Lilly's Legacy

As a child, Ruth Lilly attended Saturday School at the John Herron Art Institute. Later in life, she served as a board member and docent for Herron, which at the time included the permanent art collection that would become the basis of the Indianapolis Museum of Art.

Ruth Lilly died December 30, 2009. The pharmaceutical heiress's complex estate has only recently been settled. It is a moving reaffirmation of the important role Herron played in her life that she included a gift for the school.

Robertson's Prodigious Project

Jean Robertson, professor of art history, in her capacity as an Oxford University Press advisory editor for contemporary art, has edited a set of three articles and 12 artist biographies and has written the revised article on Carsten Holler, a Belgian artist who holds a doctorate in biology. She also co-authored with Craig McDaniel, associate dean and professor of fine art, the lead essay for the section on science and contemporary art. These works went live at Oxford Art Online in November. Robertson noted that the IUPUI Arts and Humanities Initiative funded some travel that helped support this



editorial work.

Design Thinking and Public Health

Helen Sanematsu, assistant professor of visual communication design, reports that her current research activities include collaborations with School of Medicine colleagues in the department of pediatrics to provide design thinking to community-based projects. The projects respectively aim to improve early childhood health, engage the Latino community and increase satisfaction with the patient experience for adolescents and young adults who undergo bariatric surgery.

In addition, Sanematsu has been active in public health projects including the production of four public service announcement videos and a 48-page booklet for the Indiana Coalition to Improve Adolescent Health and a large-scale interactive wall to inform young people about pre- and post-natal maternal and child health for the State Department of Health.






IN MEMORIAM

Robert B. Berkshire

Robert Berkshire, abstract expressionist painter and professor emeritus at Herron School of Art and Design, left us on December 17, 2010.

Berkshire was born in 1932. An Indianapolis native, he was a scholarship student at the John Herron Art Institute, graduating in 1954 with a diploma in fine arts. A Fulbright Fellowship funded his year-long studies in Italy. He earned a master's degree in fine arts from Florida State University in 1958 and returned to Indianapolis to teach at his undergraduate alma mater. He remained a beloved member of the Herron faculty until his retirement in 1996.

Berkshire painted with a verve that leapt from the canvas. In a 2002 article about an upcoming one-man show, he said "I'm interested in the space in a painting. As the images I'm working with in a painting become real to me, I like to be able to see what I'm doing by moving through the space that surrounds them. I don't want to see just what's facing me, but also what's all around and behind it."

He painted the way he lived: Large. He became one of Indianapolis' best-known painters, and he was content with that distinction. He nurtured his students well and rigorously. "Students did not find him intimidating," said his colleague, Professor Emerita Peg Fierke. "He

was easy, relaxed, approachable. He was a very charming guy, never openly competitive. He had other ways of getting where he wanted to be."

Steve Redman, B.F.A., 1967, recalls a summer he spent at the famous Provincetown art colony on a coveted Cooper Union scholarship. Berkshire was heading to Cape Cod too. "It was the best summer of my life," Redman said. "Bob had a flair. His style of living and being deeply influenced me."

Much later, Redman shared studio space with Berkshire and Herron alumna Sam Sartorius for a year. "After the Farris Building closed, we found this large garage at the Midland Antique Mall. We were the Three Musketeers for a time." Sam Sartorius, B.F.A., 2002, recalled being "immediately drawn to Robert Berkshire's passion for painting and reckless abandon attitude for the arts. As a mentor and friend he has impacted my life profoundly.

"Robert and I spent relentless hours talking about temperature of shadow, spatial aspects of painting compared to classical music or discussing the formal qualities of painting. Conversation would serpentine from deeply provocative to intellectual banter. He was always game for instigating a challenge too."

Professor Emeritus Robert Eagerton said, "The arts community has lost one of its most colorful artists, who inspired hundreds of students at Herron. He lived life to the fullest and his paintings expressed that adventure. He will be greatly missed."

Dean Valerie Eickmeier worked with Berkshire for 14 years and recalls his "zest for life, passion for art and music and his wit, as energetic as his brush strokes. His laughter could fill a room."

Through his estate planning, Berkshire made one of the first gifts to the capital campaign that moved the school from 16th and Pennsylvania streets to its new home on the IUPUI campus in 2005. The Robert B. Berkshire gallery was named in his honor.

In a visit to campus last spring, Berkshire commented about how satisfying it was to see Herron in such beautiful and well-equipped facilities. His commitment to his students will live on: His generous gift will serve as a perpetual source of funding for painting scholarships and gallery support at Herron.

A memorial remembrance of Robert will be held in the Robert B. Berkshire gallery in Eskenazi Hall on Sunday, March 6, 2011 from 3:00p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Additional details and information will be forthcoming.

Herron and the world lost an amazing light with the passing of Dr. Mark Pescovitz on Dec. 12, 2010 in a car accident. "Mark was everything to us, a part of the Herron family at every level, a student in photography, present at every visiting artist talk, a great friend personally and a dean's advisory board member. His passing stuns us all and our hearts are with his wife, Ora, and their family," said Dean Valerie Eickmeier.

In the past few weeks as Herron has been struggling to comprehend the loss, we decided to create a scholarship in his honor. In addition to Mark's medical practice and research, he was deeply interested in fine art and music. Mark became interested in photography in his teens and continued to pursue this passion and talent throughout his life. This past semester, Mark was enrolled in a photography class at Herron and was also scheduled to continue in the spring. We believe it would be most fitting to create a photography scholarship in his honor.

Jane Fortune, a long-time dean's advisory board member and a friend, generously started the contributions to establish the Mark Pescovitz M.D. Memorial Photography Scholarship endowment.
