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Edenberg among IU faculty elected to AAAS

Five Indiana University faculty members will be elected fellows of the American Association for the Advancement of Science at the society's annual meeting in Boston on Feb. 16. The newest fellows are listed in the Oct. 26 issue of Science.

Election as an AAAS fellow is among the highest honors in American science. Scholars are selected by their peers for "scientifically or socially distinguished efforts to advance science or its applications," according to election administrators.

IU's 2007 fellows are School of Medicine biologist Howard J. Edenberg, IU Bloomington biologists Miriam E. Zolan, Thomas Kaufman and Michael Wade, and IU School of Journalism professor S. Holly Stocking.

Following are brief descriptions of the work AAAS credits as cause for each faculty member's election.

Howard J. Edenberg, PhD -- For characterization of the alcohol dehydrogenase genes and for identification of other genes and alterations in gene expression that also affect alcoholism risk. Edenberg

is a Chancellor's Professor and professor of biochemistry and molecular biology and of medical and molecular genetics at the IU School of Medicine.

Thomas Kaufman, PhD -- For distinguished contributions to developmental biology, particularly for elucidating developmental gene action and evolution, and facilitating *Drosophila* research through leadership in stock collections and databases. Kaufman is a Distinguished Professor of biology at IU Bloomington, adjunct professor of medical genetics and fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

S. Holly Stocking, PhD -- For outstanding teaching in science writing and journalism ethics, for influential research on scientific ignorance and uncertainty, and for work that has enhanced the scientist/journalist interaction and public understanding of science issues. Stocking is an associate professor at the IU School of Journalism in Bloomington.

Michael J. Wade, PhD -- For distinguished contributions to evolutionary biology, especially for theoretical and empirical work in evolutionary genetics, sexual selection and the levels of natural selection. Wade is a professor of biology at IU Bloomington.

Miriam E. Zolan, PhD -- For sustained and important research in meiosis and for outstanding contributions to genetics education. Zolan is a professor of biology at IU Bloomington.

The elections bring IU's current total of AAAS fellows to 33, more than any other institution in the state of Indiana. A complete list of the new AAAS fellows can be found at www.sciencemag.org/cgi/content/full/318/5850/586.

The American Association for the Advancement of Science is the world's largest general scientific society, and publisher of the journal *Science* (<http://www.sciencemag.org/>). AAAS was founded in 1848, and includes some 262 affiliated societies and academies of science, serving 10 million individuals.

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U.S. medical school first-year enrollment is highest ever

The 2007 entering class to U.S. medical schools is the largest in the nation's history, according to data released by the AAMC. The number of first-year enrollees totals almost 17,800 students, a 2.3 percent increase over 2006. More than 42,300 individuals applied to medical school this year, an increase of 8.2 percent. Nearly 32,000 were first-time applicants, the highest number on AAMC record.

The 2007 medical school applicant pool also included more individuals from racial and ethnic minorities. The number of black male applicants and Hispanic male applicants, for example, both increased this year by 9.2 percent.

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Medical Informatics Fellowships available

The Regenstrief Institute has openings for special research fellowships in medical informatics. This is a National Library of Medicine supported fellowship in the use of computer technology to improve the quality and delivery of health care.

Regenstrief Institute is an internationally recognized leader in medical informatics and health services research. It participates in a unique collaboration with the IUPUI School of Informatics. As part of the fellowship, participants can earn a master of science in clinical research or health informatics. Coursework in clinical research methods, clinical trials, implementation research, biostatistics, epidemiology, grant writing, research ethics, informatics, patient safety, and numerous electives is offered by outstanding IU and Purdue faculty on the IUPUI campus.

Areas of research include (but are not limited to):

- Regional health information networks
- Decision support and implementation of evidence-based practice
- Data mining and secondary analysis of clinical data

Fellowship positions are currently available and provide up to 3 years of funding for formal training and mentored clinical research. In addition to a competitive stipend, benefits include health insurance, tuition and fees, and pilot research funding. Physicians must be either board-eligible or certified in a recognized medical specialty. Applicants from clinical disciplines requiring doctoral level education to qualify as an independent practitioner must

posses the required degree (e.g. DDS, PharmD, DPT, etc.). Applicants in health systems fields that do not involve clinical certification or licensure (e.g. anthropology, sociology, computer science/medical informatics, engineering, etc.) must hold a Ph.D., or equivalent degree.

The Collaboration in Biomedical Research program, which promotes biomedical research collaboration between IUSM and Purdue University, is now in its fourth year. As a result, ProCare Hotels has contracted with 11 preferred hotels and apartment complexes to guarantee room availability even during major events in the city at significantly discounted rates. An added bonus is that any of ProCare’s concierge services can be used by out-of-town guests during their stay; from auto care to laundry service, gift purchasing to meal preparation.

This week, Malaz Boustani, MD, an IUSM geriatrician and lead author on a *Journal of the American Geriatrics Society* article, reports on findings from an IU that says elderly African Americans who are chronic users of acid-inhibiting medications in the family that includes Zantac, Pepcid and Tagamet have 2 1/2 times the normal risk of developing dementia.

Dr. Marie Savard will discuss ways patients can prepare for effective visits to their doctor's office and NPR's Joseph Shapiro will discuss the trend of patients using the Internet for health information.
