## **Indiana joins Schweitzer Fellows Program**

The 13th Albert Schweitzer Fellowship program in the United States came to Indiana Friday, Jan. 21, with a formal announcement at the University Place Conference Center and Hotel.

The Indiana Albert Schweitzer Fellows Program will reduce disparities in health and health care by developing "leaders in service," individuals who are dedicated to addressing the health needs of underserved communities and who inspire others through example. The program provides professional students an opportunity to develop and implement a yearlong, 200-hour service project to alleviate health disparities, as well as a \$3,000 stipend for each fellow, mentoring, monthly meetings and leadership development training.

"The Schweitzer Fellowship serves as a catalyst for positive collaboration between academic institutions and community groups and leaders," said Dr. McKeag, program director of the program. "We were asked to be involved due to (our state's) focus on health science."

Partners will include the Butler University College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences, the University of Indianapolis Krannert School of Physical Therapy, and the IU schools of dentistry, law, medicine and nursing.

### **Gonzales appointed vice president**

### **New research administration policies**

As part of its effort to create a comprehensive, accessible and standardized collection of research-related policies, the Office of Research Administration has created four new policies:

- Sponsored Programs (Grants and Contracts) and Gifts: Definitions and Administration

- Cost Sharing on Sponsored Programs
- Underwriting Grants and Contracts
- Residual Income on Fixed Price Sponsored Programs

The first three policies do not introduce any significant changes from the policies and important notices that they replace; however, there has been a significant change in *Residual Income on Fixed Price Sponsored Programs*. In the new version, funds not transferred within the required period of time will be moved to a centralized university account.

## **This Week on *Sound Medicine***

This weekend, Saturday, Jan. 22, and Sunday, Jan. 23, the IU faculty hosts of the award-winning *Sound Medicine* radio show will talk with experts about new insurance rules for Medicare patients and new guidelines for tonsillectomies.

As of Jan. 1, Medicare patients are now eligible for a free physical exam and patients will find the Medicare "doughnut hole" (or coverage gap) is partially closed. Also starting this year, insurance companies are required to spend 80 percent of their revenue on patient care and health promotion. Barbara Lewis will ask IU health-policy wonk, Aaron Carroll, MD, about the changes. Dr. Carroll directs the Center for Health Policy and Professionalism Research at IUSM.

Also new this year: Updated guidelines for deciding if children should have their tonsils removed. The American Academy of Otolaryngology now urges doctors to take a systematic approach to recommending tonsillectomies. IU pediatrician Rachel Vreeman will explain the new strategy and the reasoning behind it to Sound Medicine's David Crabb, MD. Rachel Vreeman, MD, is assistant professor of pediatrics at IUSM.

Type 1 diabetes, the kind that typically affects children and young adults, is usually treated with insulin injections. For severe cases of type 1 diabetes, a more extreme treatment option is a pancreas transplant, a procedure that essentially cures the disease. Jonathan Fridell, MD, directs pancreas transplantation IU Hospital. Dr. Fridell will explain to Sound Medicine's Kathy Miller, MD, what the procedure entails.

What does watching TV do to a child's brain? What's the best way to handle temper tantrums? University of Washington brain researcher John Medina, PhD, will consider questions like these when chatting with Dr. Miller about his new book, *Brain Rules for Babies*. Dr. Medina also directs the Brain Center for Applied Learning Research at Seattle Pacific University.

Also this week, do those "smart baby" videos really work? And learn how second-hand smoke can affect children's mental health.
