Announcements from the Chair

- Becky welcomed the group and members introduced themselves.
- Admissions and Enrollment information appears below as background information
 - We had a very positive Fall semester
 - 12th successive year with a record credit hour enrollment.
 - This shows continuing growth in our full-time students
 - 4th highest headcount (the top four are all within 99 heads). We know we will crack the 30,000 total sooner-or-later.
 - Reviewing the reports can occasionally be confusing as the official IU reports always combine Indianapolis and Columbus as IUPUI and most of us at Indianapolis focus on the Indianapolis data.
- Expanding Use and Availability of Data
 - There are a great many sources of data and other information available at the university, but are not widely known. A workshop will be put together to help familiarize the academic units and others with these sources and identify any training needs users may have in making the best possible use of the data
 - The Office of the Registrar has begun to consult with the academic units, typically with the recorder, to identify additional reporting needs. This effort has been suspended for a few months to allow Registrar staff to focus on the upgrade to the Spring release of PeopleSoft 9.0.
 - Discussion continues on developing a set of key admission and enrollment indicators that might comprise a "data dashboard."
- Continued Use of Enrollment Projections
 - In the past two years EMC has collaborated with IMIR on an initiative to provide data on the source of enrollments in each of our schools (the "induced course load") and how each school's projected headcount for future years was used to project credit hour enrollment in all schools. <http://registrar.iupui.edu/emc/projections>
 - We are not sure that the information contained in these reports was used enough to justify the effort involved, so as a result, we will discontinue asking the schools for their projected headcount.
 - Other data on the site, such as the induced course load tables, will continue to be provided as these reports are useful in helping to explain changes in total credits taught in individual schools (and in comparison with other units).

Academic Plan Action Items Related to Enrollment Management

- As committees finish their work, reports are being summarized as one-page documents and posted to the Web. Links to the full reports will also be posted to the site. http://www.iupui.edu/administration/acad_affairs/actionplan.html
- A number of reports that would have some influence on the work of the EMC already have been acted upon.
- Some committees will continue to do their work, such as the Degree Goal group which has proposed a requirement that all undergraduate degree recipients complete at least one of the following: an international component, an undergraduate research experience, or a community involvement opportunity.
 - Establishing such a requirement would make an IUPUI degree unique and more valuable to potential employers. The general concept has been endorsed by faculty.
 - The proposal needs to have the mechanics of its implementation established, such as being able to easily track completion through the degree-audit system. Work on this is underway.
 - The proposal needs some type of catchy name that helps provide a way to talk about it and to serve as a type of defining characteristic, both to students and the potential employers.
- Dean Sukhatme will appear at the October EMC to discuss the Academic Plan and other matters.

Enrollment Shaping Initiative *Becky Porter*

- A number of points were raised in the ensuing discussion
 - We had a remarkable increase in the number of admitted students this year. The numbers would have been even higher, but we closed admission two months earlier than in the past to accommodate orientation and the summer bridge program.
 - In showing the changes in weekly enrollment over the course of the registration cycle, Becky pointed to several examples of where professional schools registered cohorts, such as in Nursing, Medicine, and Kelley Direct. We are interested in knowing what else schools have done that they believed influenced their students to enroll so that those practices can be considered and possibly adapted by other units.
 - SCS found calling students who had not yet enrolled was more effective than simply sending them e-mails.
 - We need to do a better job of cultivating our alumni as sources of internships and as informal recruiters for IUPUI as well as for their financial support.
 - A number of academic units send newsletters to their alumni. Becky noted that Dean Sukhatme would like this to be something done by all IUPUI schools. The newsletter might include information about the larger campus. Units should contact Communications and Marketing for possible content or things to feature.
 - Kim Stewart-Brinston suggested the units consider inviting their alumni to some student-sponsored events. For example, Kim has talked with Stefan Davis about a program recognizing the 20th anniversary of the Norman Brown scholarships.
 - Many of our alumni have not visited the campus in years and don't have a good understanding of the current opportunities, resources, and programs.
 - Gayle Williams added that we are missing an opportunity to make use of the number of alumni parents who attend orientation programs with their children.
 - SLIS recently hosted a meeting of librarians from around the state to campus, many of whom had attended IUPUI.
 - We are focusing on beginners and on establishing a clear set of enrollment goals for the university.
 - There is a significant challenge in trying to strike a balance between maintaining access to the institution with raising the quality of our incoming students.
 - Access is broadly defined to include diversity of age, ethnicity, types of degrees sought, residency, and other factors.
 - In addition to finding the appropriate balance between quality and access, there is also a need to find the best use of institutional aid with balancing merit and need-based spending.

- We are working with IPS and others to increase the aspirations of high school students so that they understand that not only is college accessible, but it is something they can do.
- Though rankings such as *US News* continue to have an impact on our planning, they do not properly reflect the quality of the institution. For example, IUPUI's average SAT, an important component of rankings, was down 4 points this year. Indiana's SAT also dropped, so the decline at IUPUI is not surprising. IUB's increase in SAT's is due in large measure to the fact that 40% of its students are from out-of-state.
- Improving retention, while important to the institution, should not exclusively drive whom we admit. Becky added that good news on retention will be released soon and is the result of hard work in UCOL and the academic units as well as the improved quality of our beginning cohort.
- Thanks to the academic units and others for their great work in making *Step On to Campus* the success it was, with 2,160 attendees (nearly double last year's attendance) from 103 high schools across the state. We don't know of any other campus which has this kind of event or success.
 - One side benefit was the number of our own undecided students who attended some of the programming. Perhaps we should take steps in the future to invite them to components of this in the future or to programs like Campus Day where they can learn more about a number of academic programs
- In looking at the Enrollment Funnel, we know we need to expand the number of students who enter the funnel. We are taking steps such as buying lists of names from College Board, attending more recruiting events (including in bordering states), and increasing the yield of students moving from one stage of the funnel to the next. The latter is addressed by such activities as targeted scholarships and expanding the use of personalized "high-touch" communications. Chris Foley has developed a plan where prospective students will receive 30 or more messages from the university and will be working with the academic units to ensure coordination of messages. Contacts from the academic units are a key component in converting the admitted student to an enrolled one.
- One goal for the campus is expanding the number of non-resident students, both domestic and international. In order to bring the percentage of non-residents to 10% of an entering class, the campus would have to have an increase of 200% in the number of non-resident applicants and admits.
 - There is a proposal to increase the size of admission-based scholarships awarded to non-resident students. Though larger in pure dollars, they constitute about the same percentage of tuition as the similar admission-based awards for Indiana residents.
 - We are also working with housing to ensure that on-campus housing is available to non-resident students and have proposed a housing stipend to those students who apply for admission and the stipend by the deadline.

- We also recognize the importance of programming for students who want a residential college experience. This includes providing more information to them about local community resources and activities (location of a grocery store, etc.)
- Our hope is to have 2-3 students from an out-of state school attend IUPUI and be able to report back on a great experience to his or her high school friends, thus priming the pump for further applicants. A summary of the need-based awards (including the housing stipend) appears below.
- Becky noted that the funding for this proposal is not coming from our current commitments in aid to local students and noted the significant expansion of the Norm Brown program.
- Dean Sukhatme has provided initial funding to get things going, including hiring admissions staff to recruit non-resident students.
- The EMC recruiting calendar will be updated soon so that the schools are aware of activities from Admissions and what others have planned. The goal of sharing this information is to better coordinate our collective efforts.

Other discussion

- Several members expressed concern about an apparent move away from evening classes. This may be in response to a growing number of traditional-age students who are more interested in day-time classes, but we don't want to lose sight of the needs of non-traditional students.
 - Amanda Helman and her staff called all students who had not enrolled this term and were told by many of the students they could not find their needed courses in the evening. She also noted that some students were affected by the closure of the Glendale facility. Amanda reported that there are 160,000 people in the region who have some college but no degree—the perfect target audience for SCS. However, if the courses are not offered when they can take them, they will go elsewhere.
 - Becky noted that there is a proposal under development to encourage schools to consider teaching more courses in 12 week blocks. She added, however, that unless these offerings were early in the morning or on Fridays they could result in blocking other courses from being offered as the number of minutes required for a traditional lecture course would spill into two time blocks, affecting the limited classroom inventory.
- Becky reported that Mary Beth Myers recently reviewed the overall offerings for evenings and weekends in the last several years. The following shows the number of classes offered.

Non-Resident Admission-Based Scholarships 2008-09 proposal

Valedictorian and Salutatorian Scholarships

\$10,000 annually for 4 years

Students who have applied for admission by February 1, who are ranked first or second in their high school class may qualify for this scholarship. To be considered for renewal, students must attend full time and maintain a 3.3 GPA (no separate application is required).

Outstanding Freshman Scholarship (OFS)

\$8,000 annually for 4 years

Students who have applied for admission by February 1 who have a minimum high school GPA of 3.75 (on a 4.0 scale) with a minimum 1250 SAT (625 Math only score for international students from non-English speaking countries) or 27 ACT score may be eligible for this scholarship. To be considered for renewal, students must attend full time and maintain a 3.2 GPA (no separate application required).

Dean's Recognition Scholarship (DRS)

\$6,000 annually for 4 years

Students who have applied for admission by February 1 who have a minimum high school GPA of 3.5 (on a 4.0 scale) and who score 1150 or higher on the SAT (575 Math only score for international students from non-English speaking countries) or 25 on the ACT may be eligible for this scholarship. To be considered for renewal, students must attend full time and maintain a 3.0 GPA (no separate application required).

IUPUI Service Award

\$2,000 - 4,000 annually for 4 years

Students who have applied for admission by February 1 who have a minimum high school GPA of 3.25 (on a 4.0 scale) (or 550 Math score only for international students from non-English speaking countries) may be eligible for this scholarship. Recipients must volunteer for 20 hours of service at IUPUI events annually. To be considered for renewal, students must attend full time and maintain a 3.0 GPA (no separate application required).

International Ambassador Award

\$3,500 renewable up to 4 years

International students who apply by February 1st and are admitted as fully qualified (first-year) degree-seeking students by May 1st who submit one of the following: 1) A minimum TOEFL score of 80, 2) A minimum SAT Critical Reading Score of 450, 3) A IELTS score of 6.0, may be eligible for this award. Recipients must enroll as full-time, nonresident students at IUPUI and volunteer for 15 hours of service at IUPUI events that have an international theme. Students who qualify for other admission-based awards will not be eligible for this award.

IUPUI Housing Stipend

\$2,500 one-time award

Non-resident students who are eligible for one of the above awards (as well as submit a housing application by April 1st – tentative) will receive this one-time housing stipend.

IUPUI Study Abroad Stipend

\$2,500 one-time award

Students who meet the Valedictorian/Salutatorian or Outstanding Freshman criteria may also be considered for one-time study abroad stipend. Domestic student deadline: December 1st; International student deadline: February 1st.

The handout shows enrollment within the different schools in terms of majors and in credit hours taught

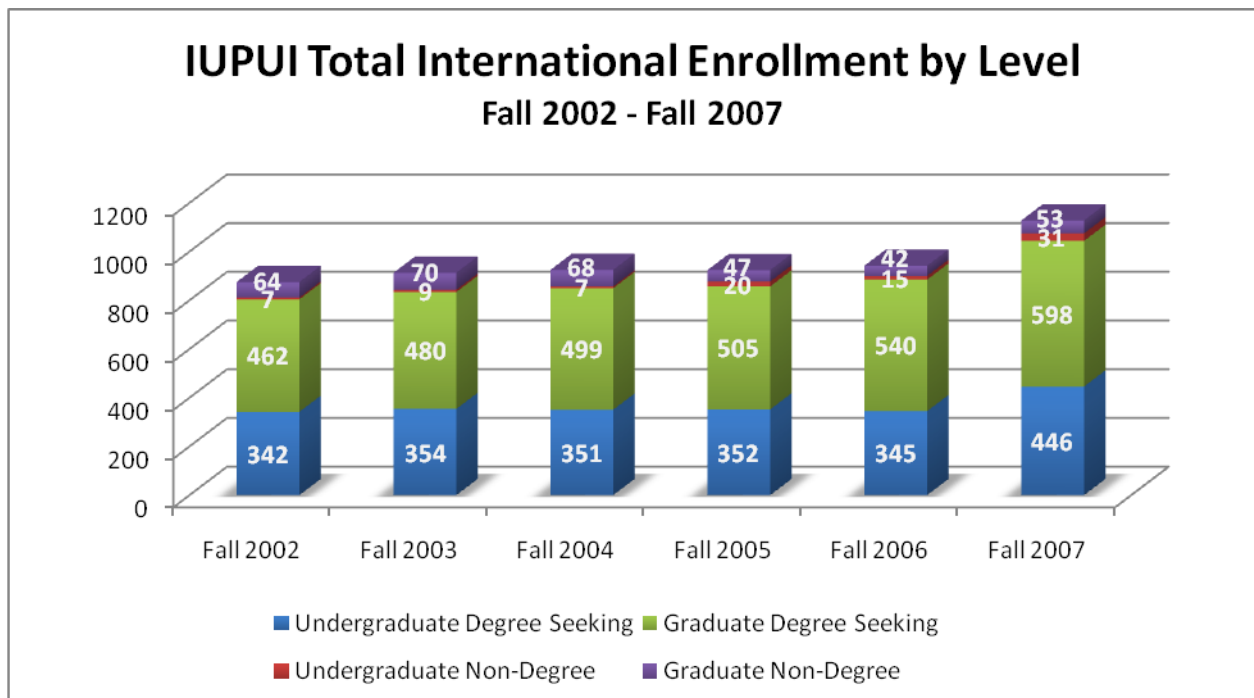
- Indianapolis is up 45 students over last year (+0.2%). Combined with IUPUC, and adjusting for students enrolled at both campuses, IUPUI is up 90 students (+0.3%). The headcount is the fourth highest in our history. (Fall 2004: 29,553)
- Indianapolis is down 125 undergraduates. Shortfalls in sophomores and freshmen are somewhat offset by growth in seniors. The flow of undergraduates is a concern for the Fall of 2008.
- The campus is up in graduate enrollment.
- Indianapolis is up 4,075 credits (+1.3%). Including IUPUC, IUPUI is up 4,839 credits (+1.5%). Both campuses will record credit hour totals this Fall.
- This is the 12th successive Fall semester with a record credit hour enrollment. In that time we have added 61,543 credits which is equal to the total credit hour production of the Southeast campus.
- Undergraduate non-resident enrollments are up 118 to 692 students (+20.6%). This is 3.7% of our undergraduates. Last year 3.0% of our undergraduates were non-residents.
- Led by a growth in international students, the number of non-resident beginners to enroll is up 61 students (+58.7%). [International beginner enrollments are up 56 students (+175%)].
- The campus is up 1,662 resident credits (+0.6%) and up 2,412 non-resident credits (+10.0%). 1,567 of the growth in non-resident credits is at the undergraduate level (+22.7%).
- Since 1996, our credits have increased 23.6% while our heads are up 10.5%. This is the result of a continuing shift toward younger, more full-time students.
- 70.8% of Indianapolis undergraduates are full-time this semester. This compares with 68.3% last year. In the Fall of 2000, 57.4% of undergraduates were full-time.

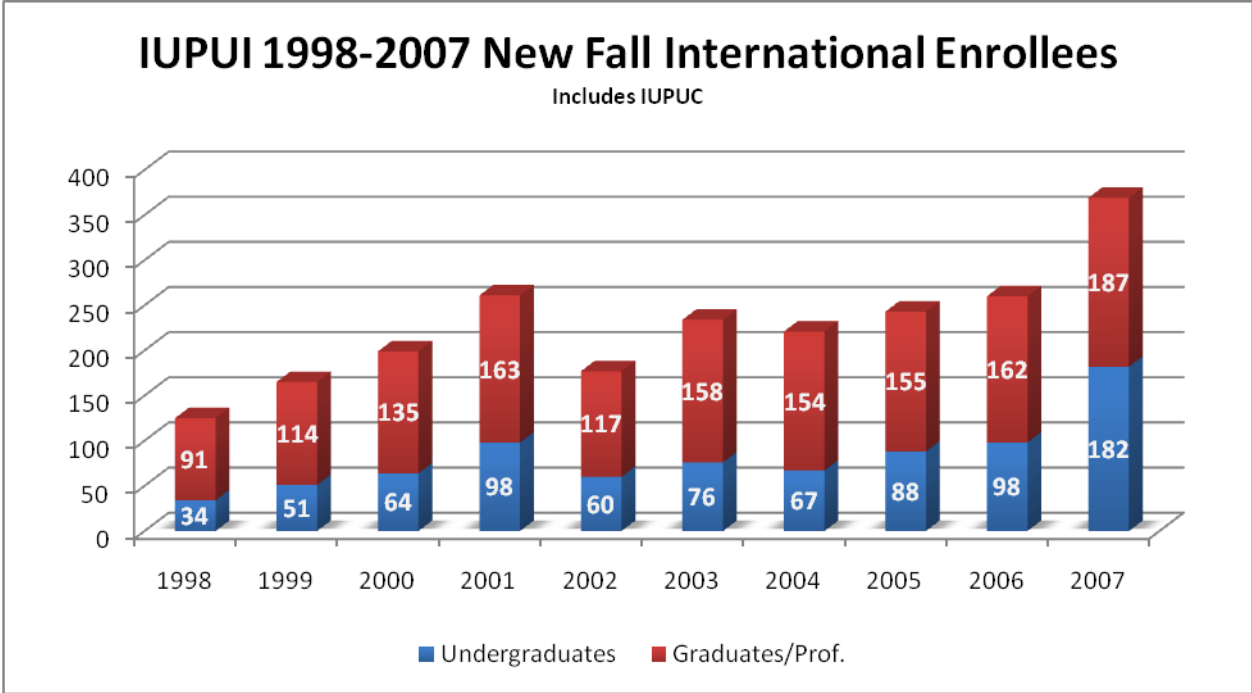
- Women constitute 58.4% of our undergraduates. This is down slightly from 58.9% last year.
- Enrollment by international students is up over last year.

- International students comprise 2.2% of undergraduate degree-seeking enrollment and 7.6% of graduate/professional degree-seeking enrollment. Overall, this represents 3.9% of total IUPUI enrollment (Indianapolis).

Undergraduate Admissions

- IUPUI had a record number of applications this year, up 13.3% over last year. This is notable as the deadline for applications was two months earlier in 2007 than 2006.
- The number of admitted students is also a record, up 12.4% over last year.
- Admission to the campus is increasingly competitive, with only 68.9% of applicants admitted. This compares with 73.4% in the Fall of 2005. The admit rate for IUB this fall is approximately 70% making us more selective than Bloomington or West Lafayette at 79%.
- IUPUI continues to attract highly qualified students. The number of admitted students in the top 10% of their high school class jumped by 24.5% this year. Those in the top one-third of their class increased 19.0% and constituted 59.4% of the admitted class.
- The average high school rank climbed three percentile to 68.
- The average SAT declined slightly, from 1004 to 1000. This tracks with the decline in Indiana SAT scores you may have seen in late August.
- Another measure of the improved quality of our applicants is the growth in number of students who took more rigorous programs while in high school. The number of students presenting International Baccalaureate results to seven. This year we had a record number of students (659) send us Advanced Placement (AP) score results, an increase of 246% since 1983.
- Already the home of the largest number of African-American students in the state, African-American beginner admits are up slightly over 2006 while other minority groups declined slightly. Total minority beginner admits were down 19 (-2.5%)
- The decline in minority beginner admits was more than offset by growth in the minority transfer admit population, up 77 (+17.7%). All minority groups were up.
- Non-resident beginner admits were up 136 (+42.4%) this year. [Domestic non-resident admits were up 58 (24.1%)].
- International beginner admits nearly doubled over last year, up 87 students (90.6%). International transfer admits are up 35 (+58.3%) A major component of the growth is from a new Saudi government supported initiative.
- The number of beginner admits who enrolled is up 143 over last year (+5.9%). The number of transfer admits who enrolled is down 111 (-6.3%).
- The yield rate, that is the percentage of admits who enroll, continues to decline; this year down to 52.1% of the admitted population (-3.3% from last year). This is

largely the result of better qualified applicants who have more educational choices. The campus needs a focused, coordinated effort to convert more of the admitted students into enrolled students.

- Another factor in the yield rate is the change in how students who previously had their admissions delayed until we could review final high school records were processed this year. 256 applicants were required to participate in a new Math Bridge program over the summer as a term of their admission. 73 participated and 69 successfully completed the program (59 completed, 10 waivers). All 256 remain in the applicant totals, but only the 69 are included in the admission totals. Others were withdrawn or denied. 65 of the 69 students who completed the program or were granted waivers are enrolled in the Fall semester.
