Focus for the year

- From Admissions to Census: Coordinating and Improving this Critical Period of Recruitment
 - Led by Admissions, identify the communications flow from the IUPUI offices and academic units to enhance the information provided to admitted students and to increase our yield of enrolled students

Financial Aid Update *Kathy Purvis*

- Financial Aid changes in the [federal stimulus package](#) and what they mean for our students
 - We are on track for packaging freshmen in March, though there will be a reduction in the state's grant funding.
- There is financial aid still available to students, despite what is being portrayed in some of the media stories. Private student loans, which are a credit based loan through a bank, may be more difficult to obtain and will have different terms than were previously available.
 - We continue to monitor the approval rates for students at IUPUI and it appears that our students are being approved at a rate of around 68%; IUB was around 74%.
- The PRIORITY deadline for filing the FAFSA is March 10. This is the date where the student must have a FAFSA filed in order to be considered for state, institutional and campus-based funds. As you talk with students, please encourage them to file by March 10.
- The Higher Education Opportunity Act (HEOA) was signed by President Bush on August 14, 2008. This is the act that reauthorized the Higher Education Act of 1965. Much of the legislation is being reviewed at many levels. IU has a number of groups looking at various pieces and, on the federal level, the Negotiated Rule Making Process has just begun. As a result we don't look for final regulations to be published before May.
- The following aspects of the Economic stimulus impact financial aid:
 - Funding to cover a current shortfall in the [Pell Grant Program](#) and an increase in Pell Grant funding. In the law that President Bush signed in August, Pell Grant amounts were to go to \$6,000 for 2009-10 and with the law signed by President Obama, the Pell Grant maximum for 2009-10 will be \$5,350. The total increase in the maximum Pell Grant (based upon \$0 Expected Family Contribution and full-time enrollment) will be \$619 per academic year.
 - The Hope Scholarship (a tax credit) is temporarily replaced with a new \$2,500 tax credit for tuition and other expenses – including text books. The new credit will even benefit lower-income families who do not pay taxes because 40% (\$1,000) is refundable. It is also available to families with higher incomes – phased out for individuals making at least \$80,000 and couples making \$160,000.
 - The bill provided \$200 million for the federal Work study program. We are not certain at this time how this will be distributed.
 - What the stimulus plan DID NOT include was a House proposal to increase unsubsidized Stafford Loan limits by \$2,000 annually OR a Senate proposal to provide \$60 million in federal contributions for the Perkins loan program.

- Not increasing the unsubsidized loan limits hurts those students who are not poor enough to get grants, but are not wealthy enough to cover the difference on their education and pushes students into higher interest/credit based loans.
- [Perkins loans](#) have not been funded with new money by the government for at least 10 years or more. All that we loan at this time is due to what we collect from previous borrowers.
- President Obama released his FY 2010 budget and proposed changes that impact financial aid.
 - Elimination of the Federal Family Education Loan Program ([FFELP](#)) in which lenders provide the funding and process collection of student loans. (Note: IUPUI is not in the FFELP program and is in the [Direct Student Loan](#) program)
 - Increasing the maximum Pell grant for the 2010-2011 academic year to \$5,500.
 - Restructuring the Perkins Loan program and instead of allowing it to be a campus based loan program, pull it back and make it a Federal Loan Program.
 - Helping at-risk students complete college. This would be a new fund that would support innovative federal/state partnerships to help low-income students succeed and complete their college education.
 - Creating the American Opportunity Tax Credit. This is the credit that will be in effect for 2009-2010 that is replacing the Hope Credit.

Admission Update

- Applications are up with 7,100 applications on file to-date which is close to what we ended up with two years ago.
 - We have a significant increase in Hispanic applicants, a good increase in the number of African-Americans, and more out-of-state applicants.
 - Admissions is getting caught up in processing of applications as the office is currently filling two of three vacant processing positions.
 - The number of fully qualified students is up, while the number of conditional admits is down. The latter is likely due in part to the larger number of less qualified students required to participate in the expanded summer program.
 - On-line applications actually take somewhat longer to process as the materials don't come in together, resulting in waits for documents such as transcripts to tie to applications. Within the next two weeks total admits to-date should be ahead of the final total from two years ago.
- Enrollment projections should remain cautious—while we have had a decrease in conditional admits, issues with the economy, and more highly qualified students with additional educational options, we anticipate we will have a decline in yield. However, with the higher applicant and admitted totals, we anticipate flat enrollment among new students.
- We are seeing increased interest in transfers from Seattle community colleges (about 40 students so far), though we don't yet know how this will equate to enrollments. One source is through an agreement with community colleges in Seattle for dual admission. Students can identify IUPUI as their preferred baccalaureate institution on the community college application and if accepted into the program at the community college, they are provisionally accepted into IUPUI with the stipulation they maintain their GPA and other conditions.

International Admission

- The number of countries in the freshman application pool has grown from 30 different countries to about 50 different countries. We are seeing the benefits of international agreements through which students start at one institution and complete degrees in programs such as Engineering and Technology.
- Following a question that was raised at the meeting, Chris Foley followed-up with the Offices of Student Scholarships and International Affairs and confirmed that admissions-based scholarships are still being awarded to international students through June 1st under the current plan. Chris added that "...we are

not awarding them to new domestic applicants at this point, but we continue with international applicants as we know they have later deadlines.”

Constituent Relationship Management (CRM) demonstration *Chris Foley*

- Talisma was selected as the IUPUI vendor and we began implementation last fall with initial use in admissions. Big thanks to Carla Boyd, Terry Brown, and Mary Beth Myers for their efforts on this initiative.
- UITS is interested in supporting a single CRM tool across the university and a system-wide review is underway. Talisma and Hobsons (in use at IUB) were invited back for review and recommendations have been provided. The IUPUI representatives believe Talisma to be the more flexible and appropriate for moving system-wide. We have been told to proceed with our campus-specific implementation which includes handling of incoming emails, phone staff usage, and use of a knowledge base for standard answers. CRM allows us to see across student contact units, see original documents, and so far has allowed us to discontinue one of our data bases. Consistent training practices also assisted.
- Ramifications to the school for enterprise CRM—our intended funding model will change, but it becomes something that would be available for everyone to use—a concept which we would promote. Training, further development, and support needs to be considered as well.
- Schools and other units will be encouraged to move to the enterprise tool, whether for their own communications management or as a way to interact most efficiently with other offices that will use the tool (foundation, alumni, etc.).
- The next CRM functionality (known at IUPUI as UTalk) to be implemented in Admissions is event management —tours, Campus Days, Jag Days
 - Web forms to collect data.
 - Identified initial set of campus partners to develop functionality for their areas.
 - Good support from offices and from UITS.
- Next steps:
 - Provide training, look at specific things we want help with
 - What students are populating the system—prospects currently being used; we have a model that will allow suspects. (prospects initiated contacts with us; suspects are those from lists we’ve bought such as PSAT, SAT, etc.).

Chris provided a demonstration of UTalk/CRM, showing members different aspects and functionality and how it is being used in Admissions and could be used elsewhere.

- Can be customized by user profile to pull different panels and products into one view.
- In future want interface to be bi-directional between CRM and SIS. Right now only SIS to CRM.
- Use of UTalk through structured ‘campaigns’ allows us to track student status in the process of each campaign as well as communications to and from students for each.
- Working with UITS to see how many mailings were opened, bounced, click-throughs, etc.
- Use of CRM will allow us to manage data in ways we can’t now efficiently in SIS.

Identifying IUPUI’s Competitors *Chris Foley*

- We have two approaches to determine our competitors. The more accurate information is provided by querying the National Student Clearinghouse (NSC). This approach permits us to determine the enrollment destination of individuals who were admitted to IUPUI in fall 2008, but did not enroll here. An alternative approach is to determine competitors based on information from the College Board which reports where a student had SAT score reports sent.

The following table demonstrates the consistency of the two approaches through the first 8 rankings.

IUB, BSU, and PU-WL had >40% overlap in terms of SAT score reports. 425 students who were admitted to IUPUI enrolled at IUB with 286 enrolling at BSU and 249 at PU-WL. These 3 clearly are our primary competitors. We are in good company given these three as competitors

A 2007 [FYIU report](#) from URR on cross-application behavior within IU found the following:

The most common form of cross-application behavior is between IUB and IUPUI, accounting for 59% of all cross-applications among IU campuses. There is considerable overlap (62%) in the number of cross-applicants who are admitted to both campuses, but IUPUI enrolls a slightly higher percentage (34%) of these cross-admits than IUB (32%). Roughly one-third (34%) of all cross-applicants who are admitted to both IUB and IUPUI do not enroll at either campus.

Chris shared a report on students denied here who enrolled elsewhere (attached below). Nearly 1/3 of our denials and nearly half who enrolled were at an Ivy Tech campus. We had 14 students who were denied here who enrolled at IUB and that was ahead of three of our other campuses. This could be in special programs there and these students might have been those could have been offered the Math program here.

Bepko Scholars Program *Melissa Biddinger and Chris Foley*

There are differing opinions as to what is the most appropriate deadline by which students will be required to apply for to be a [Bepko Scholar](#). Determining the most appropriate deadline means balancing a number of important factors and perspectives. Dean Sukhatme asked that these issues be discussed at EMC and feedback from the group provided to him.

The current deadline for applications to be post-marked is December 1st. Chris Foley (Undergraduate Admissions) supports keeping this deadline while Melissa Biddinger (Bepko Scholars and Fellows Program) supports moving the deadline to November 15th. Chris and Melissa each made brief presentations to the group (see handouts), followed by Becky's polling members for their comments and recommendations.

Regardless of which application deadline is selected, the deadline for students to accept the offer of the award will remain May 1st, a date commonly used across the country for acceptances.

Maintain December 1st deadline (Chris)

Chris told members that being able to promote scholarships for high ability students provides both direct and indirect benefits to recruiting.

Direct

- To attract the best applicants to IUPUI
- To fund the education of the best students to IUPUI

Indirect

- To draw other talented students to IUPUI
- To increase the number of options we have available for strong students
- To demonstrate the campus's commitment to attracting the best students

Chris noted that once the deadline has passed for a scholarship program, we can no longer promote it to our prospective students thus negating its impact in our marketing plan to students who have not already applied for the scholarship.

Given that the application process for these scholarships is time-intensive, the effective deadline for students to know about the scholarship actually precedes the scholarship deadline by 2-4 weeks (the time required to assemble all the necessary parts of the application—statement of purpose, letters of recommendation, etc.) which takes the effective deadline for a student to make a decision to apply back to November 1st (or earlier). Chris made the case that such a deadline does not allow us the chance to promote this and similar scholarships through marketing. Even if the strongest candidates have made the decision and begun the application process early, the later deadline allows the kind of promotion that helps with the type of indirect benefits noted above.

Chris distributed a handout (see pp. 13-14 below) which showed deadlines for top-scholarships at peer institutions. 15 of the 17 institutions had deadlines of December 1st or later; 2 had deadlines of November 1st. While the list isn't always a set of our actual competitors, we can see that the general trend is for later deadlines and not earlier ones and should determine if their reasons are valid for IUPUI as well.

The second page of the handout provided data on the timing of applications from high ability students, including the dates by which different percentages have submitted applications. He noted that while 60% of high ability applications are received by December 1, the percentage was only 50% as of November 1st. Chris added that the overall quality of this pool declined only slightly in terms of high school GPA and class rank between mid-November and Mid-February, though the size of the pool effectively doubles in that period.

Finally, Chris had some concerns that the earlier deadline may have a negative impact on the number of applications we receive from high- and highest-ability minority students, their chances for high ability awards, and the resulting diversity of our incoming class. He recognizes the numbers affected are likely to be relatively small, but even a small impact can be significant in terms of our larger recruiting picture.

Move Deadline to November 15th (Melissa)

Melissa has proposed moving the application deadline forward to November 15th, noting that with Thanksgiving this is a shift of nine business days.

Melissa distributed a handout (see pp. 15-16 below) with recent recruiting and yield information for Bepko Scholars in 2004-2009, the top application sources for students in 2007 and 2009, and a summary of the dates by which students applied for the scholarships for the 2009 academic year.

Melissa differed with Chris as to the number of applicants we would lose. Looking at the actual deadline this year of December 12th and we would have missed a total of 13 students.

- Market segmentation
 - Melissa differed with the schools Chris identified on his list of peer institutions, noting the Bepko Scholars have often applied to the top schools in the country, including Stanford. These schools pose greater competition for these students and it is important to get our offers out as soon as possible to be competitive. She believes that despite the usual May 1st deadline that students will frequently take the first strong offer from a quality institution. She also added that at least the IUB Wells award required an earlier acceptance date than May 1st.
- Changing Fall recruitment environment
 - The largest source of applicants to these programs (Bepko, Plater, Presidential) is students identified through such lists as the PSAT, SAT/ACT.
 - Students who are candidates for such awards tend to be more prepared and early planners and would not be affected as greatly by later promotions. These students don't wait until senior year to start planning.
 - Fall has not been a great time to promote and recruit these students due to the start of school and the high schools' focus on ISTEP testing. With the move of ISTEP to spring, that opens things up a bit for getting the attention of counselors and others who might identify and encourage qualified students to apply. There is not much that we can do from August forward to significantly increase our applicant pool.
 - We need to meet students where they are and match their expectations of the promotion, process, and timetables for top scholarships from other institutions. We should be in-line with those schools that have earlier application deadlines.
- Process and Yield Considerations
 - Process of selection needs more time. Using the December 1 postmarked deadline means the review process runs into the holidays. While the schools and faculty have been wonderfully cooperative, reviewing over 300 applications for three programs and the honors admissions programs during this period is a challenge. This task is added to the need to continue to serve current students. Moving to mid-November will allow additional time to complete the initial reviews and to begin to hold interviews with candidates. With high schools starting back in early January it is sometimes hard to schedule the interviews then. Moving earlier may allow interviews in the last week of December.
 - Lose efficient interview process/runs against presidential deadline (the Presidential Scholars program has a selection deadline of 15 Jan). The November deadline would have more time to read and make decisions for interviews, line up faculty for interviews for post-finals and wrap up selections by first week of January as well as provide time for a more intentional campus-visit program and the rush of the start of the term. The later deadline also poses a problem for a delayed review for other programs such as the Honors Professional Admission program.
 - Prestige factor—need to be seen and have students meet expectations for timetables from other institutions.

Comments from EMC members (*made at the meeting and in subsequent communications to Becky*)

- Several schools supported the later deadline as it brings a larger number of potential applicants. Any enticement we have, such as the continued promotion of these awards, is useful to help attract strong students. We don't want to pass up the additional opportunity to advertise and promote the institution among this population.

- Some units which traditionally draw earlier applicants, such as Engineering and Technology, supported the earlier deadline as not a significant change for the student and a way to ease processing and make selections a bit earlier. EGTC added it would work with the program to get the word out to all high achieving students it has contact with about deadlines for admissions and the top scholarships. EGTC added that the chance to make an earlier announcement of an award would be a wonderful Christmas present to the prospective student and family.
- Other units noted their applicants tend to make their college decisions later and having the scholarship deadline later is an important factor in attracting high ability students. Liberal Arts noted that only four of the applicants for IUPUI's most prestigious scholarships were Liberal Arts applicants and only two of them were interviewed. Moving the deadline earlier "raises serious concerns in the school that we will see further erosion of our ability to attract gifted students." SPEA echoed this concern in recommending against moving to the earlier date, noting that the school also has a small number of top scholarship applicants and believes it "needs as much time as possible to recruit high ability students."
- Herron added that the timing of its Portfolio day also made the later deadline much more useful in their recruiting efforts. Even if the numbers are small, they are important to the individual units.
- Several members noted that students were likely to wait until they had received anticipated scholarship offers from a number of institutions before making a decision rather than taking the first good one. They have until May 1st to accept most institutions' offers. This lessened the perceived pressure to be first out-of-the gate with an offer (and, by extension, the need for the earlier deadline).
- The institution needs to make a concerted effort, especially among international students, to make the students think further ahead for both the application and scholarship process.

After later consulting with Dean Sukhatme with the pros and cons of the issue, it was decided that we keep the deadline for the Bepko award on Dec 1st for another two years but work to build our communication and recruitment strategies to encourage students to apply by Nov 15th. After two years we will review the deadline again.

Review of IUPUI Mission-Related Goals and Action Steps

Comments:

Freshman application trends are positive from an overall number perspective as well as a diversity and ability perspective. Non-residents and international freshman applications are up as well. We are catching up in our processing of applications, but it is important for us not to expect that the growth in admits and

enrollees will be similar to that of applications. The reason for us to be cautious in predicting enrollments at this point are as follows:

- (1) The growth in applications is occurring predominantly in application types that have lower yields (e.g., higher ability, diversity, non-resident, non-Indianapolis).
- (2) The expansion of the Summer Preparatory Program will reduce the number of students admitted as well as our yield to enrolled.
- (3) The growth in students with higher academic credentials will reduce our yield on admits because there is greater competition for these students.
- (4) Our relatively small scholarship budget is not as large as those of other universities or colleges, which will reduce our yield on students.

It is unknown how much each of these will impact our final admit and yield rates. However, I would caution us in thinking that the large growth in applications will translate into growth in overall enrollees at this point in time.

As for the decline in the numbers of admits at this point (-100; -2.6% as of 2/22), I will repeat the reasons for this that were included in the notes from last week:

- (1) An increased number of applications for spring semester, which resulted in strong enrollments for the spring.
- (2) An increase in applications overall (freshman applications are currently up 28% over two years ago).
- (3) A growth in the number of applications applying earlier which means we are dealing with more applications over a shorter period of time.
- (4) An increase in the number of students who are required to attend the Summer Preparatory Program and who must return a contract before they are admitted.
- (5) An increase in the proportion of our apps which come in online and which are incomplete for longer periods of time.
- (6) Admissions currently has 3 open positions which have been held open longer due to the hiring freeze.
- (7) Delays in getting technological fixes implemented by central systems which would reduce the work required to process an application.

We are working to catch up on our processing of applications and anticipate to be back to more appropriate processing timelines within the next month.

It is too early to speak about the external transfer, intercampus transfer or returning student populations.

Benefits of top scholarship programs for recruitment

Direct

- To attract the best applicants to IUPUI
- To fund the education of the best students to IUPUI

Indirect

- To draw other talented students to IUPUI
- To increase the number of options we have available for strong students
- To demonstrate the campus's commitment to attracting the best students

Impact of the deadline

Once the deadline has passed for a scholarship program, we can no longer promote it to our prospective students thus negating its impact in our marketing plan to students who have not already applied for the scholarship. Given that the application process for these scholarships is time-intensive, the effective deadline for students to know about the scholarship actually precedes the scholarship deadline by 2-4 weeks (the time required to assemble all the necessary parts of the application—statement of purpose, letters of recommendation, etc.).

Deadlines at other universities and colleges

When reviewing the deadlines of other top-scholarship programs at other universities, the trend is for these deadlines to be December 1st and after. Though we may not be direct competitors with these institutions for these students, it is reasonable to assume that they have set their deadlines with an attempt to accomplish the goals above.



Analysis of IUPUI High Ability Application Trends (SAT >= 1300)

When defining high ability as simply having an SAT greater than 1300 (and thus the population to be “indirectly” influenced by the marketing of our top scholarships), 50% or fewer of these students have applied prior to November 17th. Only approximately 60% have applied by December 2nd. Though the numbers have grown, it still seems warranted to be cautious about moving the deadline for our top scholar apps earlier than their current dates.




For our “highest ability applicants” trends are similar to those of the high ability applicants. These are the applicants most likely to be competitive for our top-scholarship programs. Also note that the applicant pool becomes more diverse as we move further through the cycle. Unlike the high ability application trends, the trend of the highest ability seems for the bulk of these student to apply later in the cycle in recent years.

Admissions & Top Scholarship Application Time Line Comparison

A review of the entire Fall 2009 FYU applicant pool in IUIE as of February 15 reveals that a total of 11 students applied after the Bepko deadline who may have been eligible for consideration on the basis of test score results and GPA. If 41.75% of these students applied (the percentage of all eligible apps received by Admissions before the deadline that applied for Bepko consideration), then we missed a total of 4-5 additional applications.
