Dear Mr. Groseclose:

Enclosed you will find our application for charter in the Future Farmers of America organization.

Also enclosed you will find a copy of the minutes of the State Convention, Future Farmers of Florida, which contains amendments to the State Constitution, also a copy of the State Constitution. I believe that with the amendments our state constitution will conform to the constitution of Future Farmers of America. Also in the minutes of the State Convention you will find the objectives which constitute our state program of work.

Since last year we did not require any state dues we naturally did not have any paid-up membership in the Future Farmers of Florida last year. This year only a few of the chapters have paid their dues to the state and national organization at this time. FUTURE FARMERS OF FLORIDA

A State Organization of Students Taking Vocational Agriculture in Florida

31

1. Foreword

The agricultural instructors of Florida at their annual conference at Gainesville, in August, 1927, voted to sponsor a State organization for students of vocational agriculture. It is only natural that boys studying vocational agriculture in Florida should band together and perfect some sort of organization in order that they may exchange experiences, make social contacts, "talk shop" that would mean very little to non-vocational students, market their products and further the interests of the group. Students in various high schools in Florida and other states have already formed organizations. The idea has become very popular in some sections, and why not? High school students who have rather definitely chosen agriculture as their vocation, who are regularly enrolled in vocational agriculture, who spend one-half of each school day together in class or shop and who are carrying out a program of supervised practice at home-- boys such as these have a sufficient common ground of interest to effect a good, permanent organization.

A state organization of students in vocational agriculture tends to keep the local organizations alive, give them an opportunity to swap experiences, pool suggestions and develop leadership. It affords an opportunity for cooperation, shows the benefits of organization and gives the officers and delegates to the state meetings training in public speaking and leadership. It furnishes inspiration to be carried back to the local chapter. The annual spring meeting of the state organization acts as a sort of spring tonic for local chapters.

For those and many other reasons a state organization of students in vocational agriculture is desirable. Perhaps the most desirable feature is the fostering of an appreciative attitude toward a cooperative organization, through participation in its activities.

The constitution and by-laws as adopted at the 1927 conference are set forth on the following pages.

11. Constitution and By-Laws

Article 1 Name and Purposes of the Organization.

Section A The name of this organization shall be the "Future Farmers of Florida". Members and local chapters are hereinafter referred to as the F.F.F.'s.

Section B The purpose for which this organization is formed are as follows:

- (1) To promote vocational agriculture in high schools of Florida.
- (2) To create more interest in intelligent agricultural pursuits in the various counties of the state.
- (3) To create and nurture a love of country life.
- (4) To provide recreation and educational entertainment for students in vocational agriculture through

state agricultural and athletic contests, vacation tours, father and son banquets, and the like.

- (5) To promote thrift.
- (6) To afford a medium for cooperative marketing and buying.
- (7) To establish the confidence of the farm boy in himself and his work.
- (8) To promote scholarship and rural leadership.

Organization

Article II

Section A F.F.F. is a state organization with local chapters in schools having organized instruction in vocational agriculture.

Section B F.F.F. chapters shall not be organized in schools where organized instruction in vocational agriculture is not given.

Section C Students shall meet, organize, adopt the state constitution as their own, elect officers, set up a program of work, and then apply to the State Secretary for membership in the state organization. The chapters and the members may then be known as F.F.F.'s.

Section D. Each chapter shall consider itself a unit in the state organization. It shall use the state constitution as its own constitution and have a like number of officers and committees performing the same duties for the chapter as the state officers and committees perform for the state organization.

Membership

Article III

Section A Membership in this society shall be active and honorary.

Section B Any student of, or former student of vocational agriculture who has been regularly enrolled in a part-time, day-unit, or all-day class is entitled to active membership upon receiving a majority vote of the members present at any chapter meeting.

Section C Instructors, school principals, superintendents, business men, farmers, and others who are helping to promote vocational agriculture, may be elected to honorary membership by a majority vote of the members present at any meeting. Honorary members shall not vote, nor shall they hold any office except that of "adviser". Honorary members rank as Florida Farmers unless they are made Florida Planters at a state meeting.

Section D There shall be three grades of active membership based upon achievement. These grades are (a) Green Hand (b) Florida Farmer, and Florida Planter. The requirements for promotion from one grade of membership to another are set forth in detail in Article IX and are a part of this constitution.

Section E Only members who have attained the grade of Florida Planter are eligible to hold state offices after 1928, but officers in the local chapters are not limited to any grade.

Officers.

Article IV

- Section A The officers of this society shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, Advisor, Reporter and Executive Committee. The officers shall perform the usual duties of their respective offices.
- Section B The executive committee shall consist of the officers of the society and three (3) active members elected by the society. This committee shall perform the usual duties of an executive committee, review and approve receipts and disbursements, act as a nominating committee and be responsible for the welfare of the organization.
- Section C (1) The officers of the state organization shall be elected at the regular spring meetings at Gainesville at the time of the State agricultural and athletic contest and each department of vocational agricultural in the state shall be represented by two delegates who shall represent the local chapter in balloting for officers and members who are nominated to be advanced to the grade of Florida Planter. Officers in the state organization shall hold office for one year.
- (2) Officers of the local chapters shall be elected at regular meetings of the locals held in December of each year and shall hold office for one year.

Article V. Meetings.

- Section A A meeting of the state organization shall be held annually at the time of the agricultural and athletic contests.
- Section B Local chapters shall hold their meetings monthly, or oftener, and at such time and place as may be decided by the executive committee of the local.

Article VI. Dues.

- Section A There shall be no dues connected with state meetings or organization.
- Section B The dues of any local chapter shall be fixed by a majority vote of the membership.

Article VII. Amendments.

- Section A Amendments to the state constitution shall be submitted in writing at the regular spring meeting. The amendments may be adopted or rejected at once by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present.
- Section B By-Laws may be adopted to fit the needs of any local chapter providing they do not conflict with the state constitution, which is also the constitution for each chapter. The constitution is the same for all chapters but a certain amount of flexibility is necessary to the proper functioning of chapters because of their varying activities. This flexibility may be attained through by-laws for each chapter.

Article VIII Pins

- Section A The pin of the society shall be the same as that for a similar organization in Denmark, an owl perched on the handle of a spade, and underneath these symbols the words "Wisdom" and "Labor".

Section B All active and honorary members shall be entitled to wear the pin. The regular pin shall be of bronze but members who shall have attained the grade of Florida Farmer may wear a silver pin and Florida Planters shall be entitled to wear a gold pin.

Article IX The Three Classes or Grades of Active Membership.

Section A Green Hand:

To be elected to membership in the F.F.F.'s a student must qualify as follows:

- (a) Fourteen years of age or the mental equivalent.
- (b) Regularly enrolled in a class in vocational agriculture.
- (c) Carry a project after making an agreement with the parent and instructor as to scope of labor and profits.
- (d) Receive a majority of the votes of the members present at a regular meeting of a local society of F.F.F.'s.

Article IX.

Section B Florida Farmers

The qualifications necessary to election to the grade of Florida Farmer are as follows:

- (a) At least one year's instruction in vocational agriculture and completion of a satisfactory program of supervised practice.
- (b) At least twenty-five dollars earned and on deposit in bank or otherwise productively invested.
- (c) Regularly enrolled in vocational agriculture with an amplified supervised practice program mapped out.
- (d) Recite from memory "The Country Boy's Creed".
- (e) Lead the class in a discussion for ten minutes whenever called upon to do so.
- (f) Receive a majority vote of the members present at a regular local meeting of F.F.F.'s.

Section C. Florida Planter

The qualifications are as follows:

- (a) At least two years of organized instruction in vocational agriculture with outstanding supervised practice work.
- (b) Outstanding qualities of leadership as shown by ability in class, school organizations, public speaking, and general activities of the society.
- (c) Planters are elected at the state meetings only. Written records of achievement shall be submitted to the State Supervisor by the local executive committee prior to February 1st. The supervisor will then look into the matter and submit his findings to the state executive committee. This committee will nominate the candidate at the regular state meeting if he is found worthy to receive the honor. The records shall be read by a member of the executive committee when the students are nominated and the delegates shall then proceed to elect those who are deemed most worthy to be Florida Planters.

- (d) Pass a regulation test in subject matter supplied by the State staff.
- (e) Earn and deposit in a bank, or productively invest at least \$200.00. This may include the twenty-five saved while advancing to the grade of Farmer .
- (f) Be familiar with parliamentary procedure by having held office in a local society.
- (g) Be able to lead a group successfully for forty minutes.
- (h) Make the high school judging team, debating team, or some athletic team representing the high school.
- (i) Show marked attainment in scholarship in all high school branches (grade 85 or above) and be an outstanding leader in school activities -- be an "all-round man."
- (j) Receive a majority vote of the delegates present in a state meeting and respond, upon election, with a speech of appreciation. (two minutes).

F. F. F. A C T I V I T I E S

In order for an organization to live the members must have something to do. A few activities that local F.F.F. chapters may engage in are suggested below.

Maintain Bulletin Board for farmers.
 Market eggs, or other farm products cooperatively.
 Father and Son banquet
 Vacation tour
 School grounds improvement
 Cooperative buying
 Stage plays and pageants
 Hold public debates on agricultural topics
 Community service
 Organize and maintain a thrift bank
 Boost the Department of Vocational Agriculture
 Put on demonstrations and exhibits at Fairs
 Community slogans
 Charts showing community standing and activities
 (Farm Survey)

Conditions vary so widely in different communities that it would not be wise to have uniform programs for all locals in the state. It is true, however, that every local should market something; should stage a Father and Son Banquet, should practice thrift, boost the department of vocational agriculture, and put on some sort of interesting exhibit at a fair. Other Activities will suggest themselves or be suggested by local conditions and needs.

Detailed suggestions as to these activities may be obtained from the State Supervisor of Vocational Agricultural Education.

THE AGRICULTURAL TEACHERS OF FLORIDA ADOPTED THIS CONSTITUTION IN 1927 AND WE WISH TO GIVE THE VIRGINIA TEACHERS FULL CREDIT AS AUTHORS. ALSO WE WISH TO EXPRESS OUR APPRECIATION OF THIS GENEROUS OFFER OF ALLOWING US TO COPY THIS CONSTITUTION.

MINUTES OF STATE CONVENTION
OF
FUTURE FARMERS OF FLORIDA

Gainesville, June 3, 1929

The meeting was called to order by the State Supervisor, J.F. Williams, Jr. after which was held the opening ceremony by the Plant City Chapter. The secretary then called the roll of delegates, followed by the invocation by Dr. E.W. Garris. Next came the welcome address by Dean B.A. Tolbert to which Gray Miley responded. This was followed by an address by Mr. J.F. Williams, Jr after which the meeting was turned over to the degree team from the Plant City Chapter, who initiated the following Florida Planters who had been unanimously elected:

This ceremony was followed by an address by Hon. Nathan Mayo at the close of which the meeting was recessed after repeating the Country Boy's Creed. After reconvening at two o'clock the meeting was opened for nominations by the temporary president, Gray Miley was nominated for President. A motion was made seconded that nominations cease. Motion carried. Gray Miley was declared unanimously elected President. Nominations for Vice President were made and after due election Maxey Walker was declared elected. William Duvel was elected secretary; Reuben Reams was unanimously elected Treasurer; Marshall Watkins was elected Reporter, and Morgan Shephard, George Strickland, and James McClellan were elected to the Executive Committee. Mr. George N. Wakefield was elected Adviser and Mr. J.F. Williams, Jr. was elected Executive Secretary-Treasurer. It was moved and seconded that Mr. Williams be authorized to affiliate the Future Farmers of Florida with the Future Farmers of America. Motion carried.

The following amendments to the State Constitution were accepted:

Amendment to Article VI - Section A: "Section A. Dues. The national and state dues to this organization shall be 25¢ per year, payable annually on Oct. 1st. Section B. Dues shall be divided as follows: National Dues - 10¢ State Dues 15¢. Section C. In order to allow for extra expense in local chapters, they shall be empowered to assess additional dues to meet their requirements. Section D. No member shall be allowed to vote or to represent his chapter in any capacity who is in arrears for more than three months.

Amendment to Article III - Section B. Membership in Future Farmers of Florida shall be confined to any white male student of, or former white male student in Vocational Agriculture who has been regularly enrolled in a Part-time, Day Unit, or All Day class.

Amendment to Article IV - Section A. Duties of Officers: The President shall direct the affairs of the Chapter at all times and shall preside over all meetings from his position beneath the Rising Sun. The Vice President shall work for the organization in every way possible. He shall preside over meetings in the absence of the President and shall assist him in directing the work of the Chapter. The Vice President shall be stationed by the Plow. The Secretary shall keep accurate records of all meetings, shall carry on all correspondence for the Chapter and shall be stationed beneath the Ear of Corn. The Treasurer shall keep records of receipts and disbursements, shall encourage thrift and strive to build up the financial standing of the members and shall render a financial report at least twice a year to the Chapter. The Treasurer shall be stationed beneath the pictures of Washington and Jefferson. The Reporter shall report all meetings and all activities of the Chapter for the newspapers and shall be stationed under the American Flag. The Adviser shall advise the Chapter, its officers and Executive Committee whenever the need arises and shall be stationed beneath the picture of an Owl's nest.

Amendment to Article X - Section A. The official cap of the Future Farmers of Florida shall be the same as has been selected by the National Vocational Educational Association, except that it shall be orange with purple letters and have name of school on right side of cap.

Amendment to Article VIII. Section A. The insignia of this organization shall be made up of four symbols, namely (1) The plow, representing tillage of soil, the basis of modern agriculture. (2) The owl, representing wisdom. (3) The rising sun, representing progress. (4) A cross section of an ear of corn, representing common agricultural interest, since corn is native to America and grown in every state. The insignia shall carry the three letters "F.F.A" across the central portion of the emblem. Section B. All active, associate and honorary members shall be entitled to wear the insignia. All Greenhands are entitled to wear a bronze insignia. All Florida Farmers are entitled to wear a gold insignia. All members elected to the degree of Florida Planter are entitled to wear the gold insignia on a key base.

Amendment to Article III - Section A. Membership in this organization shall be active, associate, and honorary. Section C. Associate Membership. Any former student of vocational agriculture may be elected to associate membership upon receiving a majority vote of the members present at any Chapter meeting. Any former active member of a Future Farmers of Florida Chapter may be elected to associate membership upon receiving a majority vote of the members present at any chapter meeting. A member may retain his active membership for three years after completing his systematic instruction in vocational agriculture.

A motion was made and **seconded** that Florida Planters be required to pay for their own keys. Motion carried.

The following objectives for the State Organization were adopted:

OBJECTIVES FOR STATE FUTURE FARMERS OF FLORIDA

90% completion of Supervised Practice Program.
 \$50,000.00 in savings banks or invested in farming.
 One Father and Son Banquet.
 Every chapter to participate in some cooperative effort.
 100% of members who have paid annual state and national dues by October 1st.
 One summer camp or farm tour.

The following resolutions were adopted: Whereas, the Handbook of the Future Farmers of Florida contains information that pertains to the Future Farmers of Florida only, and some of this information was loaned to the Future Farmers of Florida through the courtesy of the Future Farmers of Virginia, and it would be detrimental to the Future Farmers of Florida and the Future Farmers of Virginia for this information to be come public; therefore,
Be it Resolved: That the Future Farmers of Florida in session at Gainesville, Florida, go on record as favoring that the information contained in the Handbook be kept secret by the members of this organization; that the Handbooks be kept out of the hands of all except those connected with the Future Farmer Movement; and that the Handbooks be considered as the property of the Future Farmers of Florida and merely loaned to the members as long as they treat the same as was intended by the authors.

The State and National prizes offered to Future Farmers of Florida were announced by Mr. J.F. Williams, Jr. A meeting of the Executive Committee was called immediately after adjournment. The State Convention of the Future Farmers of Florida adjourned with the closing ceremony by the State Officers.
