


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INDIANA UNIVERSITY-PURDUE UNIVERSITY AT INDIANAPOLIS

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LEGISLATIVE REPORTS X

The General Assembly will probably make no final decisions on funding for the major and expensive units of state government, including the universities, until some concensus rises from the continuing debate on state taxes. The legislators need a decision on the levels of state taxes -- and the revenues which they will generate for the next biennium -- before they can make the decisions on how to divide the available funds.

However, figures are available to indicate the level of funding which will be appropriated for the universities during the 1971-73 biennium. The appropriations for operating and capital budgets will almost certainly be less than the universities have asked; the appropriations might possibly be more than recommended in the budget bill now before the General Assembly.

The following table lists the requested and recommended appropriations for the Indiana University operating budgets:

There are some qualifications for these figures: The amounts represent only appropriations from the state's general fund and do not include university income from other sources, such as grants and contracts and student fees; the 1971-71 budget figure does not include the operating budget for the 38th Street Campus, which was funded through Purdue University. The requested and recommended amounts for the 1971-73 biennium do include the operating request for the 38th Street Campus.

The following table lists the requested and recommended levels of funding for the University's capital budgets for the 1971-73 biennium. The figures do not include funds which might be available from sources other than the state general fund.

SENATE -- New Bills

SB 747 (Borst, Rubin) -- Creates a State University of Indianapolis. Assigned to Education Committee.

SENATE - Legislative Action

SB 2 -- Creates Commission for Higher Education for state, to regulate, review, control and coordinate growth of higher education; power is granted to approve or disapprove establishment of branches and regional campuses. Passed by Senate, 43-2, and sent to House.

SB 142 -- Exempts Indiana Vocational Technical College from provisions of Administration Act of 1961 to same extent and in same manner as the four state universities. Passed by Senate, 41-2, and sent to House.

SB 222 -- Requires denial or revocation of state scholarships for students convicted of use of illegal force during a demonstration in which they take part. Amended and passed by the Senate, 41-0, and sent to House.

SB 340 -- Repeals 1905 law prohibiting contraceptive device advertising. Passed by Senate, 42-4, and sent to House.

HOUSE -- New Bills

HB 1844 (Gaylord, Zirkle) -- Authorizes state universities to award financial aid to students on basis of financial need, academic achievement or other reasonable basis approved by governing boards. Assigned to Education Committee.

HB 1857 (Loy, Arnold) -- Provides that university facilities, tax funds and fees shall not be made available to persons or organizations advocating violence or civil disobedience; requires expulsion of persons convicted of unlawful behavior aimed at disrupting university activities; makes participation in unlawful activity grounds for withdrawal of financial aid for two years. Assigned to Education Committee.

HB 1903 (Jones) -- Creates board of regents to make and approve all policies relating to post-high school education; coordinate institutions; administers Federal aid and grant programs; appropriates \$374,000. Assigned to Public Policy Committee.

HB 1937 (Pratt, Mauzy) -- Creates Indiana Family Doctor Assistance Commission and provides financial aid to aspiring osteopathic physicians. Appropriates \$150,000. Assigned to Ways and Means Committee.

Lawrence A. Jegen III, Law School professor, will present a special program on "Lifetime and Estate Personal and Business Planning for Professional Persons" at 4 p.m. Wednesday in the Emerson Hall auditorium. Professor Jegen specializes in the areas of taxation, business associations and estate planning. He has been special counsel to the Indiana Department of Revenue. During 1969, he was chairman of the taxation section of the Indiana State Bar Association and last year was named "outstanding professor of the year" and received the Indianapolis Law School Alumni Award. He is a member of the Governor's Commission on Medical Education.

Herron School of Art students are well represented at the Festival of Arts in the Union Building at Bloomington. They've sent prints, drawings, paintings and sculptures for the exhibition, which runs through Sunday.

Coupon Counting Dept. -- The tally is up to more than 300,000, the halfway mark for the A.B.C. Club of Brandywine Township which hopes to collect 600,000 Betty Crocker coupons so they can buy a kidney dialysis machine for the Medical Center. Chairman Mrs. Richard Low says they've sent off five boxes to General Mills already, one weighing four pounds, two at five pounds and two at 11 pounds. The News Bureau has collected more than 5,000 coupons for the club. Mrs. Low is confident that they'll receive around 900,000 before it's all over and she thinks they're going to buy Dr. Kleit two machines. The coupons may be sent to the News Bureau, 104 Fesler Hall, or to Mrs. Low, Route 1, Greenfield.

The Division of Continuing Education on the Bloomington campus has developed a statewide inventory of 1,300 faculty members at 39 Indiana colleges, universities and regional campuses who are professionally qualified to take part in projects involving more than 50 community problem areas. This compilation of faculty resources is based on responses to a questionnaire from the Division and was prepared for the State of Indiana under provisions of the community service portion (Title I) of the Higher Education Act of 1965. The directory is expected to be useful to those who are planning or implementing studies or related projects aimed at solving community problems. Single copies of the two-volume "Directory of Faculty Resources for Community Problem Areas" are available for reference in the chancellor's office.
