

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PARKING, THE FREEZE, AND RELATED DEVELOPMENTS

It is gratifying to report that there has been a high degree of co-operation by faculty, staff and students in complying with the parking regulations as recommended by IUPUI's Parking Committee (which includes representatives from faculty, staff and students). This co-operation is sincerely appreciated.

As a result of our efforts to obtain clarification of comments by the Cost of Living Council, we have received a ruling from the Council which supports the Parking Committee's proposed changes in parking fees. The Council ruled that our extensive improvements, which include new paving and expansion of free lots, support adoption of charges for the parking areas as originally proposed by the Parking Committee.

However, because of the freeze, the IUPUI Parking Policy Committee recommends that the rates of certain fees and charges which were to have been changed September 1, remain the same as last year, at least for the present time. These rates apply to restricted parking in green areas, metered parking and fines. Announcement was made earlier that last year's rates would be used for green areas. Enforcement of the amended regulations will begin immediately.

The IUPUI administration will seek further clarification from the Cost of Living Council on any other adjustments which may be made in the parking program but not yet implemented. We continue to request the understanding and support of all who park on our campus. Through cooperation, all will benefit.

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NSF SEEKS PROGRAMS FOR RESEARCH APPLIED TO NATIONAL NEEDS

Activities supported by RANN will seek to increase understanding of social and environmental problems and their underlying causes, and to identify opportunities and means for applying advanced technology for the benefit of society. Problems to be investigated may require the combined efforts of physical, biological engineering, and social scientists, as well as contributions from non-scientists. The key factor for eligibility to receive RANN support is the potential national impact of the anticipated results of the research and their relevance to a particular national need.
