


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SALARY PAYMENTS

For IUPUI faculty members on academic-year (10-month) appointments, the following announcement from the Office of the I.U. Vice President and Dean for Academic Affairs is relevant:

This schedule for salary payments to persons on academic year appointments has been adopted for the remainder of 1971-72:

Nov. 1	March 1
Dec. 1	April 1
Jan. 1	May 1
Feb. 1	May 22 (Commencement)

This payment schedule supersedes the one announced last spring in which the last salary payment for the first semester occurred on December 22, instead of January 1. The change is in response to requests by faculty members who observed that a tax advantage will be realized by deferring this payment until after the 1972 calendar year begins. A December 22 payment would have resulted in eleven rather than ten salary payments this year, resulting in a higher taxable income for 1971. The January 1 paycheck will be distributed on Monday, January 3.

In most cases, 1/12 of the fringe benefit deductions are being taken during each of the ten payment periods. When an employee is reappointed for the following academic year, a fringe benefit deduction for the two summer months as well as the first month of the academic year is taken from his September 15 paycheck.
