


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DEADLINE CHANGE

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GOINGS-ON "OUT THERE"

A University of Maine plan to provide free tuition, room and board to the state's Indians has been challenged in a law suit charging that preferential treatment for a particular group violates the 14th Amendment . . . Dr. Robert L. Ebel, president of the American Educational Research Association, says the time has come to allow unwilling learners to leave the educational system: "Good intentions which led us to enact compulsory school laws have trapped us . . . School attendance can be made compulsory, but learning cannot be." He suggested that all students be guaranteed 12 years of education, but that no one be forced into it . . . The City University of New York faculty union has instructed members to refuse to complete HEW questionnaires aimed at determining whether CUNY hiring practices discriminate against minorities. The union claims the requests for such information violate Constitutional guarantees for privacy . . . Michigan State University's board of trustees has voted to publicize faculty and administration salaries . . . (from University Today Newsletter)

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THREE-DAY HERRON PROGRAM SCHEDULED

Two lectures and a symposium are on the docket this week in the auditorium at the Herron School of Art. The sessions, part of the school's Visiting Artists Program, are free and open to faculty, students and friends of the school.

Wednesday's program at 5 p.m. will be a slide presentation by Duane Michals, nationally acclaimed photographer. A native of McKeesport, Pennsylvania, Michals was educated at Carnegie Tech, the University of Denver and Parsons School of Design. Though he shoots assignments for commercial magazines like Esquire, New York and Mademoiselle, he is best known for his personal work dealing with what he refers to as his "interior journey." He has created virtually a new art form--photographic sequence images.

Nathan Oliveira, professor of art at Stanford University, will present a "Slide Presentation Dealing with the Development of a Suite of Lithographs" Thursday at 5 p.m. Prints and paintings by Oliveira are included in most major American public collections, including the Whitney Museum of American Art and the Museum of Modern Art in New York City.

Participants will include Michals and Oliveira, as well as Tom Walsh, associate professor of art at Southern Illinois University; John Hooper, Canadian painter; Jerome Savage, painter and sculptor from the University of Illinois; Carol Summers, New York printmaker, and Don Trousdell, graphic designer and illustrator from Atlanta. The Friday session will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

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"CLASS COMMUNICATION" SEMINAR APRIL 7-8

A two-day faculty seminar on "Inter-Racial, Inter-Social Class Communication: Perspectives on the Problem," will be held April 7-8 in Room 509 of Cavanaugh Hall.

Sponsored by the Racial and Ethnic Affairs Committee of IUPUI, the seminar will provide specific information concerning the socio-economic and historical situations that are responsible for the communication problems and will provide the IUPUI faculty a chance to share information in an inter-disciplinary setting.

Papers will be presented by Gerry Rosenfeld, Ph.D., chairman of the Department of Anthropology at Hofstra College; Gordon Alexander, special assistant to Senator Birch Bayh; Orlando L. Taylor, Ph.D., director and chairman of the Institute of Urban Languages Research, and Ronald Williams, Ph.D., chairman of the Department of Communication Sciences, both from Federal City College in Washington, D.C.

Also Juanita Williamson, professor of English at LeMoyné-Owen College in Memphis, and Jack Daniel, Ph.D., chairman of the Department of Black Community Education Research and Development at the University of Pittsburgh.
