

## THE NUMBERS GAME

Late registration of 639 students has raised final enrollment figures for Indiana University's eight campuses to 68,546, or 1,098 (1.6 per cent) over the first semester total of last year.

Registrar M. D. Scherer said that the total first semester enrollment, by campuses, is as follows:

Fort Wayne -- 4,640, up 238 (5.4 per cent).  
South Bend -- 5,339, down 106 (1.9 per cent).  
Northwest (Gary) -- 4,781, up 27 (.5 per cent).  
Southeast (Jeffersonville) -- 2,745, up 56 (2.1 per cent).  
Kokomo -- 2,088, down 30 (1.4 per cent).  
East (Richmond) -- 704, down 12 (1.7 per cent).  
Evansville (one class) -- 31, up 5 (19.2 per cent).  
Indianapolis (IUPUI) -- 16,938, up 358 (2.2 per cent).  
Bloomington -- 31,280, up 562 (1.8 per cent).

Students are counted for statistical purposes according to the campuses at which they are enrolled rather than by the schools in which they are enrolled: School of Medicine students at Bloomington are counted in the Bloomington figures; Graduate School students in Indianapolis are counted with the IUPUI enrollment figures.

RADIATION SAFETY OFFICE RELOCATED AND REORGANIZED

The IUPUI Radiation Safety Program has been reorganized in an effort to make it more responsive to present and future Federal and state regulatory requirements.

A Radiation Safety Council has been appointed with over-all responsibility for radiation safety in the IUPUI complex. The council co-ordinates the activities of the radiation safety committees, one for radionuclides and one for machine-produced radiation. It also makes policy decisions on matters that affect the IUPUI complex as a whole.

Dr. Henry N. Wellman has been named chairman of the Radionuclide Radiation Safety Committee and Dr. Edmund A. Franken is chairman of the Machine-Produced Radiation Safety Committee.

The committees are responsible for reviewing the radiation safety aspects of continuing and proposed uses of radiation within the IUPUI complex. The Radiation Safety Office (formerly the Radiological Control Office) is the service arm of the committees. Robert Anger has been appointed the IUPUI radiation safety officer and director of the expanded Radiation Safety Office. Ms. A. D'Andrea Browne is the associate radiation safety officer for radionuclides and Dr. Ronald Berg is the interim associate radiation safety officer for machine-produced radiation.

As part of the over-all reorganization, the Radiation Safety Office has moved from 914A Fesler Hall to Room 920 in Long Hospital Clinical Building, next to Nuclear Medicine. The phone numbers for the office are still Ext. 4797/4798.

### JANE RICHARDS NAMED TO IHETS POST

Jane G. Richards, professor of speech at Indiana State University at Terre Haute, has been named executive director of the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunication System (IHETS).

Professor Richards' new position was announced in a news conference here by C. H. Lawshe, chairman of the IHETS board of directors and Purdue University vice-president.

Professor Richards will direct the mammoth audio-visual network which now interconnects campuses of the state's post-secondary institutions as well as providing some service to some of Indiana's private colleges.

Lawshe said Mrs. Richards, wife of an ISU English professor, was selected from an extensive list of able candidates which was developed after a nation-wide search for candidates for the post.

"Indiana's institutions of higher education count themselves most fortunate to be able to attract Dr. Richards to this post," Dr. Lawshe said. "Her extensive experience both in the field of education and electronic media, coupled with her familiarity with Indiana's unique system, resulted in her unanimous choice by the IHETS board of directors."

Professor Richards succeeds Hugh Green who resigned as executive director last summer.

A native of Flint, Michigan, Professor Richards holds bachelor's and master's degrees in speech from the University of Michigan and a doctorate in education from Michigan State University. She has a wide range of professional memberships and has been active in the National Education Association and National Association of Educational Broadcasters. Last year she won ISU's Blue Key Award for teaching and the Sigma Delta Chi "Man of the Year" Award.
