

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LEGISLATIVE REPORTS VII

Senate Bills -- Legislative Action to February 12

- SB 55 -- Would appropriate \$1 million to establish a family practice training program for physicians. Passed by House, 78-11, and sent to Senate-House conference committee.
- SB 151 -- Would create a state emergency medical services commission. Passed by House, 88-6, and sent to Senate-House conference committee.
- SB 286 -- Would authorize Indiana University to acquire and operate the Fort Wayne School of Fine Arts. Defeated by House, 27-53.
- SCR 32 -- Would create a legislative study committee to examine state colleges and universities, vocational training systems, and the Higher Education Committee. Passed by Senate by voice vote and sent to House.

House Bills -- Legislative Action to February 12

- HB 1033 -- Would create an Indiana Commission for Arts and Humanities. Passed by Senate, 35-12, and sent to Governor.
- HB 1163 -- Would create a medical education loan fund designed to encourage practice in areas of acute shortages of physicians. Passed by Senate, 42-8, and sent to Governor.
- HB 1238 -- Would repeal law providing for sterilization of mentally ill patients. Passed by Senate, 45-5, and sent to Governor.

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THINK SAFE

IUPUI has strengthened and reorganized its safety programs in conformity with the provisions of the new Federal Occupational Safety and Health Law, Business Manager Arthur D. Lautzenheiser announced.

The new programs involve inspections of buildings and repairs, equipment modifications, and other steps required to meet Federal standards.

IUPUI faculty and staff are urged to report any apparent unsafe conditions to department heads and supervisors who, in turn, are urged to report them through appropriate channels. Unsafe conditions which require immediate action should be reported to the Fire Prevention and Safety Office, Ext. 7981.

The purpose of the new program is to prevent accidents. IUPUI recorded 785 reports of accidents and on-the-job illnesses during the first 10 months of 1973 and 89 of these incidents resulted in time lost from work.

At the first session, Dr. William F. May, chairman and professor of religious studies at IUB, will speak on death and dying.
