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LITERARY SCHOLAR SCHEDULED TUESDAY

An outstanding literary scholar and critic will speak on the IUPUI campus this week.

Rene Wellek, Sterling professor emeritus of comparative literature at Yale University, will speak in Room 100 of the Lecture Hall Center at 8:15 p.m. Tuesday. Wellek is visiting Patten professor of comparative literature at the Indiana University Bloomington campus.

The author of a number of works on literary criticism, his Theory of Literature, co-authored with Austin Warren, is considered a classic in the field and has been translated into many languages.

Wellek's appearance here is sponsored by the Spanish and English departments of IUPUI and the Chancellor's Lectures and Convocations Committee.

Professor Wellek challenges the work of some literary critics who, he says, are not able to write but presume to tell an author how a book should have been written. He points out that many writers who have stood the test of time have had severe critics -- even Shakespeare.

He questions the lasting value of a current trend in publication -- pornography. He describes that portion of the field which is purely exploitive as despicable. "I don't think free speech can be completely free," Wellek said. "There is a trite example about shouting 'fire' in a crowded building when there is no fire. I think hard-core pornography should be kept out of the hands of minors. I think every society has the right, to a certain extent, of controlling access to the things it considers pernicious," Wellek added.

He said he believed public taste will find a compromise between the current flood of pornography and the Victorian attitudes of earlier years. Boredom will set in, Wellek said, because, "people get tired of anything that becomes obviously excessive."

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SOCIAL SERVICE LECTURE WEDNESDAY

Social workers, nurses, lawyers, psychiatrists and other interested persons are invited to hear a nationally known social worker speak on "Ecological Theory and Social Work" this week.

Dr. Carel B. Germain, professor of social work at the Columbia University School of Social Work, is the guest speaker for the school's memorial lecture at 3:15 p.m. Wednesday in the Lecture Hall Center.

Dr. Germain, whose writings have been published extensively, also has had practical experience in inpatient and outpatient psychiatric services, corrections and child welfare. She has taught and been acting dean at the University of Connecticut School of Social Work. She also has been acting director of psychiatric social work at the

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University of Maryland School of Medicine Psychiatric Institute.

"About 1,000 alumni have graduated from this school," said Dr. Richard G. Lawrence, dean of the IUPUI school, "and about 300 are expected to attend from Indiana as well as others who are interested."

Miss Ruth Copeland, associate professor at the School of Social Service, is chairman of the colloquium committee which planned the event.

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PAPER COSTS GOING -- GUESS WHAT? -- UP

A recent, partial lifting of governmental price controls on the nation's paper industry has had an immediate effect on the cost of fine printing papers. As a result, business forms such as snapout and continuous, have increased at least 10 per cent. This increase is also felt in conventional commercial printing for such items as brochures, catalogues, promotional pieces.

Complete abolishment of price controls will take effect April 30. At that time, paper spokesmen expect an additional 10 to 15 per cent increase in paper costs.

Looking to the future, a new paper pulp national contract will be negotiated in August. The best educated guess is that another 10 to 15 per cent increase in paper costs will result after the pulp contract is finalized.

Another continued change in the printing of items, especially in the snapout and continuous forms area, is the ever-lengthening "lead time" required to get these items. Current time required to secure this type of printed form is varying from three to five months.

Advice to any and all campus departments who order printing and forms which are not inventoried in IUPUI Central Stores: Plan well ahead now and for the foreseeable future.

Purchasing personnel will do all they can to insure an adequate supply of your printing needs. Your assistance in long-range projection of all "outside" printing requirements is needed.
