## MORE SUMMER SCHOLARS

h Going to school in the summer at IUPUI is an idea that has caught on with a record number of persons. Officials report that 11,388 students attended classes for credit in 21 different areas of study. That's 665 more than the 10,723 who enrolled in summer sessions in 1973.

The number of credit hours earned in both 1974 summer sessions also shows an increase -- from 45,336 to 47,172, an increase of 1,836. In percentage terms, enrollment for 1974 was 6.2 per cent higher than 1973 with earned credit hours up 4 per cent.

Neil E. Lantz, IUPUI registrar, noted that summer enrollment figures indicate a wide range of growth patterns in the various schools and divisions of the university.

He said one of the most significant enrollment increases is in graduate students. The total for both summer sessions is 3,060. When compared with the 2,321 graduate students who enrolled during the summer of 1973, it shows an increase of 31.8 per cent.

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## NEW ROCKEFELLER GRANT PROGRAM

The Rockefeller Foundation has announced a new program of awards to support works of humanistic scholarship and reflection intended to illuminate and assess the values of contemporary civilization.

The fellowships will normally extend for one year, although half-year or two-year fellowships may also be granted. The ordinary grant will range from \$10,000 to \$15,000, with none more than \$30,000. Smaller grants will be favored.

Suggested research areas include central ideas, concepts and perceptions in contemporary culture; the humanities in an international context; the formation and transformation of values; science, technology and society in the context of humanistic values; the humanities in the contemporary professions, emphasizing values and moral choices; the new dimensions of the public role of the humanities.

Deadlines for proposals are October 15 (first stage) and December 15 (second stage, when requested). Awards will be announced next March.

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WEDNESDAY: BACK TO SCHOOL

Classes at IUPUI start Wednesday (August 21) when the 1974-75 fall semester begins. Officials expect enrollment to reach a new record, more than the 17,600 students who enrolled in the fall of 1973.

For the first time students will be required to have an IUPUI identification card in order to register or pay fees. I.D. cards may be obtained in Room 144 of Cavanaugh Hall.

Walk-in registration for all classes will be held in the lobby of Cavanaugh Hall Monday and Tuesday (August 19-20) from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. each day on a schedule based on the first four letters of the registrant's last name.

Fees must be paid at the time of registration. (Students who registered in advance paid fees last week.)

Students may make changes in schedules by dropping or changing classes on August 22, 23, 26, 27 and 28. Additions to schedules may be made on August 30. Adjustments may be made at the registrar's office in Cavanaugh Hall, except on the 30th when schedule additions are to be made in the Lecture Hall Center. The final day for changes and late registration is Friday, August 30.
