ACCELERATOR DEDICATION SET

Nearly 1,000 members representing the 443 Hoosier Lions Clubs are expected to be at the Medical Center today (September 15) to celebrate the successful completion of their campaign for \$750,000 to buy a linear accelerator for the School of Medicine.

The 40-Million Electron Volt Linear Accelerator, built in France by the Compaigne Generale Radiologique, is the only one of its type in the country and will produce more powerful radiation electron beams for treatment of cancer patients than any other currently available.

Dignitaries at the meeting will include Governor Otis R. Bowen, high-ranking Lions, I.U. Vice-President and IUPUI Chancellor Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., and School of Medicine Dean Steven C. Beering.

The dedication will get under way at 1:30 p.m. in a tent on the lawn of Riley Hospital with a concert by the Lions State Band. Official ceremonies start at 2:30 p.m.

The accelerator, which arrived July 29, is housed in a therapy building -- mostly underground--built near University Hospital as part of Phase II-A of the hospital. The building will be open at 10 a.m. with tours before and after the dedication.

Lions and other guests will have the chance to see what their fund-raising efforts have brought to the advancement of Hoosier medicine and medical care -- efforts that included raising nearly \$600,000 of the \$750,000 total by selling 10,088,000 pounds of grapefruit over a three-year period.

PLANS ANNOUNCED FOR WOMEN'S CENTER

Development of a Continuing Education Center for Women at IUPUI was announced this week by Chancellor Glenn W. Irwin, Jr.

The center, 1359 East 38th Street, will operate under the combined auspices of the IUPUI Continuing Education Services and the I.U.-systemwide School of Continuing Studies. Proposal for the center was submitted to university officials by Marjorie Leamnson, director of IUPUI Continuing Education Services.

"We consider the development of the Center for Women to be a major step in reaching out to a segment of this metropolitan community whose needs have previously been underserved by the university," Dr. Irwin said.

Mrs. Leamson said the center would provide counseling for women in education, job opportunities and volunteer services, besides classes, workshops and seminars in women's studies.

Initial focus of the center will be to provide career and educational information and guidance for adult women in line with their own interests and capabilities. Services of the center will be available to women of all ages and marital status.

Nancy C. Seltz, director of women's programs, School of Continuing Studies, will be the counseling consultant for the center. Doctoral degree students in counseling and guidance on the Bloomington campus also will serve as interns.

A co-ordinator for the center will be named this fall. Then a community advisory council will be appointed to help develop policies and programs and assess the needs of the women of the community.

Other activities and supporting services planned include expansion of programs for younger women and home-bound mothers, extended services for women who do not meet college entrance requirements and low-cost programs for disadvantaged women. Financial aid for part-time students, job placement services and establishment of child care facilities are part of planned future activities.

Interest in adult women's programs has increased at IUPUI and 58 per cent of the Continuing Education enrollees are women, a recent survey shows.
