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INFLATIONARY NOTE

The Chronicle of Higher Education reports that Indiana legislative appropriations for higher education have increased by 44 per cent in the last two years, but that inflation has entirely wiped out any net increase. After inflation, according to the report, state higher education appropriations have increased by zero per cent. On comparative bases, Indiana's \$247,119,000 appropriation for higher education in 1974-75 ranked 12th among the 50 states; 15th on the basis of appropriation per student; 35th on the basis of appropriation per capita; 40th on a basis of appropriation per \$1,000 of personal income; 44th in the percentage increase during the last two years; 44th in percentage increase during the last 10 years.

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BENEFITS EXTENDED

Blue Cross-Blue Shield will soon mail abstracts of benefits to all University employees who are enrolled in the health coverage, this move necessitated by several improvements in the Master Policy.

At no increase in cost, Master Policy revision will now provide immediate eligibility for another \$25,000 maximum in major medical benefits after the first \$25,000 has been reached. No proof of insurability will be required, but private duty nursing coverage will be limited.

Eighty per cent reimbursement for all covered expenses in excess of the \$100 corridor between Blue Cross-Blue Shield coverage and major medical coverage will still apply on the first \$25,000 benefit. However, on the second \$25,000 there will be a 50 per cent reimbursement, instead of the usual 80 per cent, for the services of private duty registered nurses. All other insured expenses will remain at the 80 per cent level.

The revision also will include expanded definitions of "dependent children" and "physician" providing services covered by the master policy.

The survey, reported in The Chronicle of Higher Education, reported that nearly 53 per cent earned degrees in four years; 24 per cent more earned degrees within the 10 years; 8 per cent were still working toward baccalaureate degrees and 4 per cent were in graduate or professional schools.
