EYE RESEARCH GETS BOOST

Sight-saving eye research at the I.U. School of Medicine will again be assisted by a grant of \$5,000 from Research to Prevent Blindness, Inc. (RPB), it was announced last week by Dr. Steven C. Beering, dean. The award is to the medical school's Department of Ophthalmology, which has received annual RPB grant support totaling \$80,000 over the past 16 years.

The purpose of the RPB grant is to accelerate studies of eye diseases that destroy the sight of millions, including 1,300,000 Americans who are now functionally blind. "So devastating are the effects of eye diseases," said Dr. Fred M. Wilson, ophthalmology chairman, "that more than 10 per cent of all patients seen in the nation's medical hospitals are eye patients."

Noting that many blinding diseases cannot yet be prevented, Dr. Wilson said that modern research has produced advances that already are saving the sight of thousands who would otherwise be blind.

RPB is the nation's leading voluntary organization in support of eye research, having channeled \$28-million into laboratories throughout the country. Some 50 medical schools have received annual RPB grant support.

MEDICAL GRANTS ANNOUNCED BY LITTLE RED DOOR

Indiana University Medical Center researchers were among the seven grant recipients announced last week by the Little Red Door, local United Way cancer agency.

Those named were Dr. Varoujan A. Chalian, chairman of the Department of Maxillofacial Prosthetics in the School of Dentistry, \$7,000; Dr. Lawrence E. Einhorn, associate professor of internal medicine, hematology-oncology, \$5,000, and Dr. Roger A. Hurwitz, associate professor, pediatric cardiology, \$1,800.

Other grants were awarded to the Lobund Laboratory at the University of Notre Dame, United Ostomy Association, Inc. (Indianapolis chapter), Methodist Hospital and Planned Parenthood Association Of Indianapolis.
