## SUPER SAVERS

The IUPUI Credit Union has won a Thrift Honor Award from the National Credit Union Administration for its success in stimulating savings among small savers, it was announced recently by Louis P. Acuna, regional director for Region IV of the NCUA.

The credit union attained a monthly growth rate of 4.7 per cent in accounts under \$20,000. According to Acuna, this rate of growth was well above the average for Federal credit unions of similar size,

As of February 1, the credit union had 10,255 members with total savings of \$8,667,895. (Total assets of the credit union approach a value of \$13-million.)

The IUPUI Credit Union was chartered in February, 1956. Dr. Jack W. Lukemeyer is the current president. Other officers are Dr. Richard C. Sanborn, vice-president; Robert L. Campbell, secretary, and William Habig, treasurer. Edward Lechner is the general manager.
