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PARKING GARAGE TO OPEN SOON

June 15 is the tentative date for the grand opening of the Wilson Street Parking Garage--the multi-level, 600-car facility designed to improve the parking situation for visitors, patients, faculty, staff and students at the Medical Center.

Hourly parking rates are 50¢ up to one hour; 75¢ up to two hours, \$1 up to three hours, \$1.25 up to four hours, \$1.50 up to five hours, \$1.75 up to six hours, \$2 up to 24 hours.

Monthly parking rate for faculty and department heads in the new garage is \$10 per month. Besides blue decals for surface lots, those who choose this option will receive cards that operate the gates that control entry or exit to the parking garage. Application should be made to the Safety Department for an "interim" card (until September) when new ones are issued.

The new garage is connected by tunnel to Riley Hospital, Regenstrief Health Center and the Krannert Institute of Cardiology. Another feature of the new facility is space for handicapped visitors on each level near the elevators.

Surface area parking for visitors in the Agnes Street lot (east of University Hospital) is \$1 per entry (up to 24 hours).

Meters for patients and visitors in many campus areas are 25¢ per hour from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday, or as posted.

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ENROLLMENT ARITHMETIC

With a first summer session enrollment of 7,619, IUPUI has more summer students than any other Indiana University campus. The figure, 342 more than last year's first summer session, represents a 4.7 per cent increase.

Current summer session enrollments for the I.U. System (excluding Fort Wayne, Kokomo and Richmond, which do not have first summer sessions) is 19,225, up 2.88 per cent from last year.

Statistics for other campuses are: Bloomington, 5,968, up 3.74 per cent; South Bend, 2,451, up 5.28 per cent; Northwest (Gary), 1,675, down 5.85 per cent, and Southeast (New Albany), 1,512, down 2.39 per cent.

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LUNDQUIST NAMED SPECIAL I.U. ASSISTANT

Indiana University has appointed Eldon F. Lundquist assistant to the president for regional health and vocational programs. The appointment becomes effective June 1.

A member of the Indiana General Assembly since 1961 and chairman of the State Senate Education Committee for the last five years, Lundquist announced several weeks ago he would not seek re-election to the legislature. Besides holding public office, Lundquist has been director of resource and development at Elkhart General Hospital and was the first chairman of the Indiana Vocational Technical College board of trustees.

In announcing the appointment, I.U. President John W. Ryan said: "Eldon Lundquist is uniquely qualified by training and experience to assist the university in dealing with program development in the health sciences and vocational education, two areas which are of growing importance to the people of the state."

As a presidential assistant, Lundquist will develop improved communication between I.U. and such groups as hospitals, medical associations, and local boards of health. He will serve as a co-ordinator of several plans and programs between the dean of the School of Medicine and the Statewide Medical Education Program. And he will act as liaison for the university with the Indiana Vocational Technical College regarding development of vocational programs on I.U.'s regional campuses. Also, he will serve as a special resource person to regional campus officers.

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CHERRY BLOSSOM TIME

A Japanese dental study group last week presented 20 cherry trees to the campus to signify the bond of friendship that has been established between the dental communities of I.U. and Fukuoka, Japan.

The visitors were on campus to attend a postgraduate course on "Fixed and Removable Partial Prosthodontics," one ingredient of their three-week U.S. tour which also includes visits to private practices and clinics in Washington, D.C., Los Angeles and Honolulu.

Headed by Dr. Mitsushi Toyonaga, who attended a course at the dental school six years ago, the Japanese dentists participated in the symbolic tree-planting ceremony last Thursday at the school. Also on hand for the occasion were Dr. Ralph E. McDonald, dental school dean; Dr. Ray K. Maesaka, associate professor and director of clinical dentistry, plus other dental faculty members.

The visitors were hosted by Dr. Maesaka, who generated interest among members of the study group during his lecture tour of Japan last year.

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"HOW TO" & REVIEW COURSES OFFERED

A program of four college preparation courses will be offered this summer by the Division of Continuing Studies at the IUPUI 38th Street campus. Courses include How to Study in College, Basic Math Review, Review for College Algebra, and Preparing for College Composition.

Ten sections of How to Study in College, a 10-hour sequence of effective study techniques, are scheduled throughout the summer, beginning June 7. Taught by experienced IUPUI faculty members, the course includes how to listen, taking lecture and textbook notes, writing themes and reports, preparing for tests, effective use of them, using college libraries, and what you should know about your professor.

Although the course is designed primarily for incoming college freshmen, many adults returning to college after an extended period away from formal schooling find value in it as a transition. One section is designed especially for women and another is an adult evening section. Both day and evening sections are scheduled. Cost of the course is \$25.

Basic Math Review and Review for College Algebra, five-week evening courses beginning July 20, cover mathematics fundamentals necessary for advanced work. Fee for each is \$39 for the 20-hour class. Course is taught by IUPUI associate faculty member Lucinda Ellis, a specialist in remedial mathematics.

Dr. Edwin S. Casebeer, director of the IUPUI freshman composition program, will teach Preparing for College Composition beginning August 2. Enrollees will study how to form, organize and develop theme ideas in the six-session course. Both day and evening sections are scheduled. Course fee is \$32.


