IUPUI ANSWERS AGE-OLD QUESTION: "WHAT'LL WE DO THIS WEEKEND?"

A new college will open in Indianapolis next August -- the Weekend College at IUPUI.

The Weekend College will offer 24 credit courses on Saturdays and Sundays during the regular fall semester which will begin August 28. The courses are open to IUPUI students and to students in good academic standing at other colleges and universities.

The IUPUI Weekend College was organized for several purposes:

- For students and potential students whose work or family responsibilities leave only weekends open for education;
- For students who want to accelerate their academic programs;
- For more effective use of IUPUI classrooms.

Dr. James East, director of the Weekend College, expects an enrollment of 500 in the courses, which will run from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Saturdays and 1 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. on Sundays.

This estimate is based on experience from a pilot Weekend College project which was conducted several years ago. That project, based on a small core of English and literature courses, had exceptionally heavy enrollments and indicated a need for a permanent, more extensive Weekend College, said Dr. East.

The fall schedule includes credit courses in art, business, education, geology, psychology, speech, sociology, anthropology, economics, French, algebra, and English.

Among these are three graduate courses in education for teachers who are fulfilling requirements for masters' degrees required by state law.

Students may enroll in the Weekend College at the regularly scheduled IUPUI advance registration from July 12 through July 16, at walk-in registration August 20 and August 23, and at late registration, September 3.

Fees for Weekend College courses are the same as those for all other IUPUI courses, \$21 an undergraduate credit hour for Indiana residents and \$42 a credit hour for non-residents; \$26 a graduate credit hour for Indiana residents and \$52 for non-residents.

The Weekend College course schedule follows:

Saturdays, 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.: Art appreciation, Commercial law, History of American education (graduate), Geology, resources and man, Psychology as a social science, Introduction to sociology.

Saturdays, Noon to 2:30 p.m.: General anthropology, Introduction to management accounting, Principles of economics, Developmental reading, Social psychology, Fundamentals of speech communication.

Sundays, 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.: Philosophy of education (graduate), Developmental reading, Beginning French, Algebra, Psychology of women, Business and professional speaking.

Sundays, 4 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.: Art of the Renaissance, Psychology in teaching (graduate), Introduction to contemporary literature, Social problems.

Saturdays and Sundays, 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.: Beginning drawing and Beginning painting.

#### SCIENCE TEACHERS COMING FOR SPECIAL PROGRAM

Junior and senior high school instructors teaching the Intermediate Science Curriculum Study (ISCS) will have a chance to solve specific problems during a two-week summer program this month at IUPUI.

The program has been designed for both past participants and newcomers. The workshop, June 14-25, is sponsored by IUPUI, the National Science Foundation and the Silver Burdett Company. It is one of a few such programs in the nation and the only one in Indiana.

Dr. Wendell F. McBurney, associate dean of research and sponsored programs and director of the ISCS summer program, said participants have been encouraged to form teams -- of teachers or teachers and administrators -- to seek answers to specific or general classroom or school system problems.

Projects may include -- but are not limited to -- such subjects as: How to strengthen a weak testing system, how to build equipment storage areas, how to develop a method to assist a slow reader, how to design "rainy day" activities, how to plan excursions and how to modify ISCS activities to improve effectiveness

The program will also offer instruction and activities for teaching the ISCS curriculum with ample time for discussion and practical laboratory work.

Although the purchase order cannot be written, dated and sent to a vendor before June 15, it will be among the earliest of the new fiscal year's purchase orders to be sent. Any purchase requisitions received on or after June 15 will be charged to the 1976-77 budget.

Notes -- Each month the Personnel Division sponsors Staff Development programs ranging from insurance benefits to clerical workshops.
