## FINDING WHAT'S ALREADY THERE

Making the most of available resources will be the focus for a seminar on "How to Get More for Less" on Friday, September 24, in the School of Nursing Building.

Dr. Wendell F. McBurney, associate dean of Research and Sponsored Programs, will deliver introductory remarks at the two-hour session which starts at 10 a.m. in Room 112.

A series of panel discussions and presentations will include "Excess and Surplus Government Property: Hot to Get It" by Col. Maurice L. Johnson, excess property co-ordinator for I.U.; "Work Study and Other Financial Aids: Obtaining Able and Economical Help" by Shirley Boardman, director of student financial aids for IUPUI, and "The Computer: Arranging for Its Economical Use" by Edward Solinski, director of Computing Services for IUPUI.

Also "Internal Funds: The University Research Operating Committee and Other Sources--How to Tap Them" by Dr. McBurney; "Patents and Copyrights: University Assistance" by Tom McGlasson, legal counsel and secretary of the I.U. Foundation, and "Matching Funds and In-Kind Contributions: Where to Find Them and How to Include Them in the Budget" by W. Sidney Johnson, director of research contract management for IUPUI.

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## TEACHING THE TEACHERS

"Dealing with Classroom Problems," a televised college course for teachers and school administrators, will be broadcast by WFYI-TV (Channel 20) on Tuesdays from 6:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. starting September 21 and running through December 7. Viewers will be able to earn three hours of either graduate or undergraduate credit through IUPUI Division of Education.

This series, the first televised course offered by the IUPUI Division of Continuing Education, will offer a survey of the innovations in elementary and secondary education with commentary by many of the nation's leading authorities, as well as documentary footage from classrooms all over the country.

Experts on the series include Dr. Mario Fantini, author of Alternatives in Education; Dr. Thomas Gordon, Teacher Effectiveness Training; Dr. Charles Weingartner, Teaching as a Subversive Activity; Dr. Sidney Simon, Values Clarification; and Dr. William Glasser, Schools Without Failure and Reality Therapy.

The series will focus on classroom strategies and the use of such approaches as values clarification, reality therapy, confluent education and teacher effectiveness training.

Jim Thompson, one of the producers, describes the series as an examination of alternatives rather than a search for "an answer" to the concerns of modern education. "There is no one idea or approach," he notes, "that will have equal value in every high school classroom. Our objective is to present a number of ideas so that teachers may pick and choose what best helps them improve the learning climate in their own classrooms."

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DEADLINES NEARING FOR SPECIAL PROGRAMS

Competition for Rockefeller Foundation Humanities Fellowships and for National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Stipends is open.

The Rockefeller Fellowship provides a maximum of \$20,000 to persons able to devote full time to a project that will produce new works of humanistic scholarship. Awards may be held concurrently with sabbatical salaries. Deadline for submitting applications is October 1.

In the NEH program, faculty representing disciplines in the humanities are eligible for support in the amount of \$25,000 for two consecutive months next summer to support faculty projects. IUPUI applications will be screened by a faculty committee and three will be recommended to NEH for support. The Office of Research and Sponsored Programs must receive applications before October 8.
