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## COURSE TO FOCUS ON ALCOHOLISM

Alcoholism, a major national health problem that afflicts about nine million Americans, will be the focus of an I.U. School of Medicine continuing education course this week.

At least 50 Hoosier physicians, counselors and representatives of community and hospital treatment programs for alcoholism will attend the course, "Alcoholism and Its Medical Consequences," all day Wednesday at Fesler Hall.

Directed by Dr. Ting-Kai Li, professor of medicine, the sessions will review current knowledge about alcohol metabolism and its pathophysiologic consequences, the pathophysiology and management of alcohol-related liver disease and the nutritional aberrations associated with chronic alcohol abuse.

The problem of early detection of the alcoholic patient, current trends in treatment and the roles of community and hospital programs will be discussed.

Sponsored by the medical school's Department of Endocrinology and Metabolism, the course also will draw on out-of-state expertise. Guest faculty members will be Dr. Richard C. Bates from Michigan State University and Dr. David H. Knott from the University of Tennessee. Daniel J. Crowe, will represent the Indiana Department of Mental Health.

I.U. medical faculty members will be Dr. Philip A. Christiansen, Dr. Philip J. Snodgrass, Dr. Lawrence Lumeng and Dr. Gerald P. Johnston.
