BELFAST MINISTER TO ADDRESS FACULTY

The Rev. W. Sydney Callaghan, who has been serving the Methodist Church in strife-torn Belfast, Northern Ireland, since 1968, will address the IUPUI Faculty Club this week. "Ireland: The View from Inside" will be presented at noon Thursday in the Roof Lounge at the Union Building.

A native of Dublin, Rev. Callaghan is widely known in Ireland and abroad as one of the few ministers who can speak across the divisions of the society and be heard with respect. He was appointed to Donegall Square, mother Church of Belfast Methodism nearly 10 years ago, just as civil unrest began to erupt into urban guerrilla warfare. The sectarian strife in Northern Ireland has claimed more than 1,700 lives over the last eight years.

Rev. Callaghan has distinguished himself not only through his commitment to the church, but also through community involvement, including work among mill workers, alcoholics, ex-prisoners and drug addicts, and with a suicide prevention service.

One of the few ministers listed in the Irish Who's Who, he has lectured in Europe and Africa, as well as the British Isles, and is recognized as a knowledgeable and understanding interpreter of the Irish scene.

ASKING FOR CLARIFICATION

More than 100 persons are expected to attend a "Values Clarification Workshop" Wednesday sponsored by the IUPUI Division of Continuing Studies and the IUPUI Lectures and Convocations Committee.

The three-hour afternoon program will feature Dr. Sidney B. Simon, professor in the Center for Humanistic Application of Social and Behavioral Science in Education at the University of Massachusetts. He is best known for his book, Values and Teaching, now in its 12th printing.

Values clarification is defined as a new concept in teacher education and human development using an intellectual and emotional approach for examining and developing values.

NEWS 'N' NOTES FROM HERE & THERE

New Football "Seat-uation" -- Some changes are in store for "Big Red" football fans next season. A new program, approved by the I.U. Athletics Committee and announced by Director of Intercollegiate Athletics Paul F. Dietzel, provides for season ticket sales to begin mid-March. An additional seating section in the west stands of Memorial Stadium, previously occupied by faculty and staff, will be available to the general public. University faculty and staff will move to the east stands to become part of a large I.U. cheering section. The newly assigned seating spaces to former season ticket holders will be as good or better than past yard-line allocations. The new faculty-staff area extends to about the 45-yard line, providing an additional 15-yard section of good seating space. Also, a reserved parking area behind the east side of the stadium will be available at the standard rate for faculty and staff season ticket holders. The changes are being made to "consolidate" Big Red supporters in an area that will include students, Marching Hundred band, faculty and staff. Also, according to the committee, the re-arranged seating will allow more space for those who back the I.U. total athletic program through their financial contributions.

Stand on Collective Bargaining Bill -- I.U. President John W. Ryan said last week that one part of the faculty collective bargaining bill being discussed in the General Assembly could seriously jeopardize the I.U. system. Ryan said that House Bill 1631 calls for multiple bargaining units within an institution which could result in each I.U. campus having an individual bargaining unit.

It might even mean that separate system-wide or multi-campus schools such as the medical school and SPEA would have separate bargaining units. "This proposal could result in as many as 12 different faculty bargaining units with I.U.," he said. "Such a fragmented organization, each with separate labor contracts, each with possible separate pay scales and different agreements on what constitutes a work day could very well jeopardize the concept of an Indiana University system," he noted.
