


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INDIANA "ANSWERING SERVICE"

More than 50 Hoosier citizens -- librarians, educators, researchers, local government and agency representatives -- met at the Union Building Wednesday to learn all about INDIRS.

INDIRS -- The Indiana Information Retrieval System -- is an I.U. School of Business computer which happens to be the state's largest data base on facts about Indiana. The information resource is available to anyone with a question on anything from the number of miles in Indiana highways to the number of dentists' offices in a given county.

The main computer is maintained and operated through the business school on the Bloomington campus. About 30 information retrieval terminals are scattered throughout the state, with at least six in Indianapolis. The Indiana State Library has one, so does the Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce, the I.U. School of Business in Indianapolis and the IUPUI Blake Street Library.

University staffers keep the INDIRS system well-fed with information on everything from agriculture to elections and health statistics to law and crime. Data is supplied by private and governmental sources throughout the state. The system is funded in part through grants administered by the Indiana State Library.

The INDIRS terminals, which are tied into the main computer, resemble a combination telephone and typewriter. The big difference is that when a question is typed into the terminal, the computer types back an answer.

Morton J. Marcus of the I.U. School of Business research division describes INDIRS as a simple and useful data base. "With INDIRS, we can get in minutes the same information that would otherwise take hours of research."

Some new features have been added to the five-year-old INDIRS system. Now the computer not only provides raw information, but also ranks it, organizes it in terms of geographical factors and calculates results.

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TEEN-AGE ARTISTS WELCOMED

High school students with more than a passing interest in art are encouraged to attend the Summer Pre-College Art Workshop at the Herron School of Art. The program is open to students who have completed their sophomore year.

Classes are scheduled in drawing, design, three-dimensional work and printmaking and assignments are equivalent to those given to Herron freshmen. Other aspects of the program include looking at career opportunities in art, guidance in getting an art education, and field trips to the Indianapolis Museum of Art, a design studio, art gallery and printing firm.

Kevin Byrne and Aaron Law, both Herron Foundation Program faculty members, will teach the classes. Session I runs from July 5 to July 20, Session II from July 21 to August 5. Classes are held Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuition is \$50, plus the cost of art supplies, about \$25. For more information, call 923-3651.
