




NAGY TO TAKE WARSAW POST IN EXCHANGE PROGRAM

Warsaw will be the destination next month for Paul J. Nagy, associate professor and chairman of philosophy, when he assumes the post of associate director of the Center for American Studies at Warsaw University in Poland. The I.U. board of trustees approved Nagy's appointment as project co-ordinator in international programs last week at their meeting in Bloomington. After the one-year appointment, made possible by a grant from the U.S. Department of State, he will return to the Indianapolis campus.

While there have been many cultural, technical, and scientific exchanges between the United States and nations of the Soviet bloc, this is the first program in American studies in Eastern Europe.

The program is the result of four years of negotiation by the Bureau of Education and Cultural Affairs of the State Department, I.U., and Warsaw University. The agreement between the two schools was signed last October.

George M. Wilson, dean of international programs at I.U., pointed out that the Warsaw Exchange is one of several faculty exchange programs supervised by the Office of International Programs.

As associate director, Nagy will be the senior American at the center, the director's position being held by a member of the faculty of Warsaw University. Dr. Edwin R. Coover, assistant professor of history at I.U. Bloomington, will serve on the center's staff.

Nagy will teach introductory courses stressing the philosophical dimensions of American culture. The first semester will focus on defining our national culture and philosophical approaches to problem solving.

Nagy also intends to give occasional papers at the center to which the public will be invited and expects to invite Fulbright scholars working in Poland and Polish scholars of American studies to lecture.

Nagy said he feels his work will offer an opportunity to combine diplomacy and scholarship, laying the foundations of mutual respect and trust stemming from different traditions of scholarship and political reality.

He also will participate in an orientation program at the University of Krakow, Poland.

Nagy, who received his undergraduate degree from Fairfield (Conn.) University, earned his master's degree at Boston College and his doctorate at Fordham University. He has been at the Indianapolis campus since 1967.

EXPERTS ON TWINS TO MEET IN WASHINGTON

Dr. Joe C. Christian, professor of medical genetics at the I.U. School of Medicine, will head an Indiana "delegation" this month to the Second International Congress of Twin Studies at Washington, D.C.

The conference (August 29-September 1) is sponsored by the International Society for Twin Studies that was organized at the first world conference at Rome, Italy, in 1974. Dr. Christian presented several papers at that meeting. The organization is scheduled to meet every three years.

Dr. Christian presides over several studies of twins being made at I.U. using one of the world's largest and most active pools of twins organized for this purpose. He will chair a session on the statistical methodology of twin research. He also is chairman of a working group of the society on the methodology of research.

Others participating in the Congress will be Dr. Richard Rose, associate professor of psychology at Bloomington, and one of his graduate students, Gilbert Cardwell, who will present a paper on psychological development in twins; Patricia Welch, a psychology student at Purdue, who will present a paper on intelligence in 18-month-old twins; Dr. Michael Melnick, assistant professor of oral-facial genetics at the School of Dentistry, who will give a paper on development in 7-year-old twins.

Also Judy Miller, graduate student in the Department of Medical Genetics, who will report on the use of twins to study Vitamin C and its effect on colds, and Dr. Richard King, a former medical genetics student who recently returned from Libya, who will give a paper on the use of twins to study the effects of cholesterol.

The I.U. School of Medicine now has 1,500 pairs of twins participating in various studies. There were many other volunteers, Dr. Christian said, but they have not been used because they have not fitted into the pattern of the present research. There is still a need, he said, for identical twins who are married and who have at least one child apiece.

These family studies benefit both the families who participate and the researchers. The twins and their children receive free medical tests, and sometimes previously unknown conditions are discovered that can be treated before they become acute. Most classes begin in September. Costs vary based on length and cost of materials and instruction. More than 11,000 persons attended adult continuing education courses at IUPUI last year.
