

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CREATOR OF "RUNNING FENCE" TO BE AT HERRON, IMA

Remember that "weird and wonderful" "Running Fence" artistic/event that captured national attention last year? Christo, the Bulgarian-born artist who conceived and executed the project, will be in Indianapolis Wednesday to talk about the project and present the Indiana public premiere of a film about the work.

Christo and Albert Maysles, the filmmaker, will be at the Herron School of Art Wednesday from 3 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. to discuss "Running Fence" which was no ordinary work of art. The fence was an 18-foot high, 24-mile long white fabric construction which stretched through the hills of northern California and ended in the Pacific Ocean at Bodega Bay.

The controversial project stood only two weeks, carried a \$3-million price tag, took four years to design and execute and faced two court decisions, 17 public hearings and three years of negotiations with ranchers, state and county officials.

"Running Fence" was not the first extraordinary effort by Christo. He also has wrapped buildings and seacoasts and hung an orange nylon curtain across a valley pass.

The 1½-hour session at Herron with Christo and Maysles is free and open to all IUPUI students, faculty and staff.

The two will also be on hand in the Showalter Pavilion at the Indianapolis Museum of Art (IMA) Wednesday for the 8 p.m. showing of the film and their comments. Admission for the IMA program is \$3 for museum members, \$4 for non-members and \$2 for IUPUI students with IDs.

Wednesday's programs are being co-sponsored by the IUPUI Lectures and Convocations Committee and the IMA.

Speaking of Art. . . . -- The unusual ceramics display in the cases at the Union Building is the creation of Richard C. Scott, director of dental illustrations. Since he started taking ceramics classes last year, he has shown his work at the Talbott Street Art Fair, on the Bloomington I.U. campus, at Greenwood and Columbus. 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DEPARTMENT OF HONORS & ACCOLADES

Two members of the dental faculty are playing key roles in the 1978 campaign of the Marion County Chapter of the American Heart Association. Dr. Robert Derry, chairman of the complete denture department and director of continuing education at the school, has been named vice-chairman of fund raising and director-at-large. Dr. Maynard K. Hine, former dean of the school and now special consultant to the I.U. president, is special gifts chairman and also a director-at-large. (Last month, Dr. Hine also presented the Horace Wells Memorial Lecture in Hartford, Connecticut, and was elected to honorary membership in the Horace Wells Club, founded in 1894.
