

CONFERENCE PAPERS REVEAL WIDE WORLDS OF CHILDHOOD



The myriad worlds and eras of American children are being delightfully "dissected" in research papers that are coming in at a steady pace to the Childhood in American Life headquarters in Cavanaugh Hall.

Covering United States children even before there was a United States, through the 18th and 19th Centuries, with all their implications for today's American youngsters, the papers reveal a wide range of usable information.

Growing up in early New England, on a Southern plantation, in a Chicano family, the roles of the schools and the families (and the politics) -- all these fields and more will be open for public discussion during the conference, March 30-April 1 at the Children's Museum and Stouffer's.

The editor will conduct a seminar Thursday through Saturday at the School of Social Work in Cavanaugh Hall. Participating faculty members will submit manuscripts for group critique and editorial suggestions.

Program Note -- WAT-21's series on "The Newborn" continues this week with Part I of "Infant Nutrition: A Foundation for Lasting Health?" Host Dr. Richard Schreiner from Riley's Newborn Intensive Care Unit will discuss the issue with Dr. James P. Keating, chief of gastroenterology at Washington University School of Medicine and St. Louis Children's Hospital. Their discussion and "talkback" with physicians and nurses will follow a 40-minute film from Mead-Johnson & Co. The program can be seen at noon Tuesday in the regular WAT 21 viewing areas. The entire 90 minutes will be replayed at 8 p.m. Tuesday. Rome, professor of psychiatry at Mayo Medical School and immediate past president of the World Psychiatric Association, will be the guest at this month's School of Medicine Forum series. Dr. Rome, who helped bring into focus the abuse of psychiatry in political affairs in some countries, will speak Wednesday at noon in Hurty Hall C of Fesler Hall. All faculty, house staff and students are invited.

Program for High Schoolers -- Up to 150 junior and senior high school students who want to attend college will converge on the School of Dentistry Wednesday for a session especially designed for them by the Office of Admissions. The students will hear the IUPUI facts about academic programs, financial aid, application procedures, career and placement information and special programs. Easy Riders -- "Express" Yourself: Ridership on the IUPUI Downtown Express remains good, according to the Metro bus service. More than 1,700 persons rode the campus-to-downtown Express last week, the third week of the service. Remember, it costs only a dime each way. . . Shuttle Schedule Change (say that five times fast): Effective March 20, departure times for the IUPUI Shuttle Service will be five minutes later than stated in the Shuttle schedules that are available throughout campus. The change was made in response to rider requests. The Shuttle stops at Krannert Science Building, Herron, Marott and Cavanaugh -- 25¢ each way.
